#### Coordinator's Report







#### The Annual General meeting (AGM)

is an important event for every organisation. It gives its members, the general public

and the committee a broad overview of the organisation's current directions, financial health and confirms its purpose. It is also the time to revitalize the organisation through the official engagement of members into key elected positions.

Most importantly, the organisation should try to make the AGM a positive experience where people go away firmly committed to the organisation and its goals.

#### Benefits of holding an AGM

An annual general meeting will assist your organisation to: <u>Comply with government regulations</u>

If you are an incorporated association, the legislation in most Australian states requires you to hold an AGM.

#### **Elections**

At the meeting you need to validly elect key office-bearers. Usually the legislation will specify the election of what is called the Public Officer. Depending on the size and nature of the organisation, the AGM is the time to publicly elect the Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson, Secretary, and Treasurer and other board and management committees' members.

#### Presentation of Accounts

You will need to present the annual accounts to the members in a standard format. Again, legislation in most states provides that you must have your accounts audited if your budget is above a certain level. If you are below this



level, you can still have your accounts audited; it may be more expensive,

but it provides some assurance that nothing has been overlooked that is likely to damage the organisation.

#### **Documentation**

Most Australian states require you to send in an annual report after your AGM. The content varies from state to state - some just want the accounts, some ask for a list of office bearers, some charge extra for the forms or the lodgment.

#### · Be transparent

Whether you are an incorporated association or not, organisations need to be accountable to the public and to their members. This is your opportunity to report on the results of your strategic plan. Did you achieve all your expected outcomes over the past year and what you do you plan to do in the next as a result.

#### Communicate with members

The AGM provides a good opportunity for the office bearers and the management to interact with the membership - to answer their questions and seek their views. Ordinary members are able to raise their concerns and participate. There should, of course, be opportunities for members to be involved throughout the year, but the AGM provides a minimum safety net to make certain that this is not overlooked in the rush of work. You may wish to send special invitations to local dignitaries, local members, and donors and prospective donors.

#### • Raise awareness

In some cases the AGM can be used to gain publicity for the organisation. For example if you have a guest speaker or an announcement that you think may be of more general interest than just to your own membership. You could prepare and circulate a press release. (See

the Ourcommunity.com.au's helpsheet on Preparing a Press Release).

This must be handled with care - as many AGM's can bring up quite sensitive issues, that you may not wish to publicise. You must weigh up your priorities for promoting the organisation carefully.

#### **Preparation for an AGM**

The AGM is usually organised by the Secretary, with assistance from the rest of the organisation, but this can be altered if someone else volunteers. It is important, though, that everybody in the organisation knows who is responsible.



#### Date

The date of the AGM may be set by the legislation - within three months of the end of the financial year, for example and even if it is not, it is still a good idea to have the meeting in August or September, while the financial statements are still fresh.

#### Advertisement

If you are an incorporated association, the legislation in most Australian states requires that you advertise your AGM to your members two weeks or a month beforehand, by mail. There used to be a requirement that you also advertise it in a newspaper circulating in your area.

Though an advertisement is not now required by law, you may consider doing it anyway to encourage public involvement and an inclusive atmosphere. A small block in the classifieds is enough. Give the name of the association and the place, date and time of the meeting.

#### Office bearers and Committee

Confirm which of your current officebearers will be re-nominating for the coming year and who will be retiring. Check your constitution to see if anybody's ineligible to stand.

If there are vacancies, make sure that you have approached people who are willing to fill them and remember that there may be people who come forward at the meeting itself.

Most importantly try to ensure that you have enough good nominations to fill the available positions.

If people are to be nominated in their absence have them sign a document saying that they are willing to stand.



#### **Auditor**

If you are required or decide to present an audit of your accounts at the AGM, leave enough time for the auditor to go through your books and prepare your accounts. Make an appointment well in advance; this is a busy time for auditors. Ensure that the auditor knows the exact date of the AGM.

Have a nomination ready for the position of next year's auditor from somebody who you have approached and who is willing to act.

#### **Publicity**

If you are intending to put on a bit of a show for your members or the press - with a guest speaker, a video showing, or an important announcement - organise it well in advance so that you can be sure that everybody knows what they are supposed to be doing and you have all the necessary technical equipment in good working order.

#### Meeting papers

Prepare the following documents and post them out to all members and office bearers in advance of the meeting:

- A set of accounts balance sheet and financial statement - in the required format.
- Annual Report

The organisation's annual report must contain the accounts, and should contain

- a summary of the year's activities
- a record of the year's achievements
- a preview of what is planned for the next year
- a restatement of the organisation's vision.
- Agenda consisting of:
  - Welcome by chairperson
  - Apologies
  - Confirmation of minutes of the previous AGM

- Business arising from the minutes
- Chairperson's report
- Treasurer's report and presentation of audited financial statement
- Election of Office Bearers
- General business
- · Guest speaker (if any)
- Date of next meeting (if known)
- Close
- Minutes

The relevant minutes are the minutes from the previous AGM, not the previous Committee meeting.

#### Meeting procedure

The procedures at the AGM are basically the same as those at an ordinary committee meeting.

#### **Motions**

Motions must be moved

- to accept the minutes of the last AGM
- to approve the Chairperson's report (the Annual Report)
- to approve the Treasurer's report (the Financial Statement)

Motions must be seconded, and a vote (generally a show of hands) taken.

#### **Nominations**

Nominations must be called for from the floor for Office bearers - Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer - and Committee members. If more than one person nominates for any office, or if there are more nominations than there are committee places, there must be an election. Election can be through a show of hands or by secret ballot.

#### Special procedural provisions

The only special procedural provisions at an AGM are that:

- the quorum may be different (consult your constitution)
- if the position of Chairperson is being contested, the Chairperson should stand down from the Chair during the election and be replaced



by an acting Chairperson (someone who is not standing for any position) specially elected just for the period of the election)

#### Guest speaker

Guest speakers can be people you want to impress those at the meeting, or people you want to be impressed by the meeting, or both.

#### Other entertainment

If your organisation lends itself to visual presentation, consider preparing a display of your work during the year.

#### After the AGM

#### **Documentation**

Make sure that the minutes are written up shortly after the meeting. If (as sometimes happens) they are left to the evening before the mailout, the Secretary may have difficulty finding last year's notes.

Ensure that you send any necessary documentation, for example the audited statement and change of public officer to the appropriate state/territory government department.



#### Handover

Retiring office bearers must hand over the operations to the new person, together with all documents, rubber stamps, bank details, etc. Retiring officers should also give their successors briefings describing key processes and current priorities and challenges.

#### Banking

If any of the people who are retiring from the Committee are signatories to the organisation's bank account, try and have the necessary forms on hand so that the new signatories can be authorised after the meeting.



#### Daily Blessings Hatha Yoga

A little bit about Ayurveda.....

Yogis believe we all have certain dominant energies – doshas. Vata (air/ether), Pitta (fire) and Kapha (earth/water). We may be dominant in one or be combinations of – Bi-doshic or even Tri-doshic.

At the very basic level, Vata types are lean/slim, arty/philosophers, always cold, dry skin/hair, shy; Pitta types are of medium musculature/athletic, leaders/competitive, boisterous/extroverted, oily skin/hair and always hot! Kapha types are nurturing/cruisy, practical/dependable, soft flesh/prone to being overweight, moist skin.




As winter is upon us, even though it's warm by southern standards, our Kapha energy rises. The urge to curl up in the sun and indulge in a cuppa and some 'carby' treat is irresistible! To balance the sluggish, cold, water logged (oh and mucus!) tendencies of Kapha we add the fire of Pitta dosha. Dynamic yoga asana which heats the the body and stimulate the agni (digestive fire), loads of stimulating foods...yes chilli and more chilli, ginger, spices, chai tea. Other Pitta foods are animal proteins. Slow cooked super nourishing, easy to digest meals with few, if any Kapha foods (these are polished grains, processed foods, sugar, dairy). Sattvic (clean, nourishing, vitamin and mineral rich) foods should be consumed at every meal, vegetables, fruit, nuts/seeds and unprocessed oils.

So if you'd like to boost your immune system and feel energetic this winter – experiment, research and have a play with these concepts.

- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour
- A very sick child



#### PUBLIC NOTICE – DECLARED BUSHFIRE PRONE AREAS

The Fire and Emergency Services Commissioner has declared certain areas within the Shire of Shark Bay as "bushfire prone" – mapping available on <a href="www.dfes.wa.gov.au">www.dfes.wa.gov.au</a> It includes parts of Denham townsite, Nanga, Hamelin Pool, Dirk Hartog Island, and Monkey Mia.

The Western Australian Planning Commission has released a number of documents which outline planning requirements for new development on land identified as bushfire prone.

A new State Planning Policy, *State Planning Policy 3.7 Planning in Bushfire Prone Areas* (SPP 3.7) was gazetted on Monday 7 December 2016.

If your land is within a bushfire prone area you may be required to lodge a site specific Bushfire Attack Level (BAL) assessment with any planning or building permit application.

A BAL assessment is an assessment set out in Australian Standard 3959 Construction of Buildings in Bushfire Prone Areas. A BAL assessment determines a proposed buildings potential for bushfire exposure. For habitable buildings, a BAL assessment is used to establish the construction requirements that can be used to improve the protection of a building from bushfire attack.

As of the 8 April 2016, all planning applications for a dwelling on lots greater than 1100m<sup>2</sup> are required to include a Bushfire Attack Level (BAL) Assessment, all building permit applications for habitable buildings and some outbuildings will also require a BAL assessment. A BAL assessment will also be required for commercial and industrial development in a "bushfire prone" area.

If a development does not require planning approval, a BAL assessment may still be required as part of the separate building permit process.


Where a BAL rating between 12.5 and 29 is identified, there may also be a requirement for a Bushfire Management Plan to be endorsed jointly by the Shire and state authority for emergency services.

Please be advised that the Shire has not declared the bushfire prone areas, however is obligated to enforce new requirements introduced by State Government.







#### Winter Warmer Recipe



#### Leek and potato soup

Ingredients

1 tbs olive oil

20g butter

2 leeks, white part only, coarsely chopped

2 (about 400g) sebago potatoes, peeled, coarsely chopped

6 cups (1.5 litres) chicken stock

1/2 cup (125ml) thin cream

2 tbs olive oil, extra

1 small leek, extra, white part only, cut into matchsticks Crusty bread, to serve

#### Method

Heat the oil and butter in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add the leek and potato and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until leek softens slightly. Add the chicken stock and bring to a simmer. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 15 minutes or until potato is tender. Remove from heat and set aside for 5 minutes to cool slightly.

Transfer half the mixture to the jug of a blender and blend until smooth. Transfer to a clean saucepan. Repeat with the remaining potato mixture. Add the cream and stir to combine. Place over low heat and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until heated through.

Meanwhile heat the extra oil in a medium frying pan over medium-high heat. Add the exta leek and cook for 1-2 minutes or until lightly golden and crisp. Use a slotted spoon to transfer to a plate lined with paper towel.

Ladle the soup among serving bowls. Top soup with leek straws and serve immediately with crusty bread, if desired.

#### Tip of the day

You can substitute white whole-wheat flour for up to half the regular flour called for in recipes to get the vitamins and nutrients found in whole-wheat flour--but with a lighter, subtler taste.

#### Introduction

This document outlines the information for consideration by agencies, stakeholders and community and industry groups regarding applications submitted by Pan Holdings Pty Ltd (Pan) for an aquaculture licence and lease.

#### **Background**

On 19 January 2016, Pan applied to the Department of Fisheries for an aquaculture licence and an aquaculture lease in waters of Nanga, Shark Bay.

#### **Proposal**

Pan proposes to establish an aquaculture operation in a 400.6 hectare area within Shark Bay. Proposed Species are:

- Rock oyster (Saccostrea glomerata, Saccostrea cucullata, Saccostrea scyphophilla);
- Black-lipped pearl oyster (Pinctada margaritifera);
- Akoya pearl oyster (Pinctada fucata);
- Shark Bay pearl oyster (Pinctada albina);
- Penguin shell (Pteria penguin);
- Clams/cockles (Family Veneridae species of Venus clams endemic to Shark Bay, including Callista inpar, Gomphina undulosa, Callista planatella, Antigona lamellaris, Circe rivularis, Circe sulcate, Paphia crassisulca, Paphia semirugata, Pitar nancyae);
- Sea cucumbers/sandfish (Holothuria scabra & other endemic Holothuria/Stricopus species);
- Sponges (Spongidae (Order Dictyoceratida), Irinildae (Order Dictyoceratida), Thorectidae (Order Dictyoceratida), Hymedesmiliidae (Order Poecilosclerida), Latrunculliidae (Order Poecilosclerida), Mycalidae (Order Poecilosclerida), Raspailiidae (Order Poecilosclerida)); and
- Abalone (Roe's (Haliotis roei)).

#### **Source of Stock and Methods**

Rock oysters, pearl oysters and abalone may be obtained from existing shellfish hatcheries where there is the capacity to spawn and culture the desired species from local Shark Bay broodstock. Pan is also investigating the feasibility of a small multi-species hatchery close to the site with the aim to supply broodstock to the Shark Bay marine aquaculture farm in the future.

All other species will be sourced locally.

Various methodologies for farming the species will be tested at the site. Pan intends to utilise surface/sub-surface longlines and/or fencelines/racks with baskets and/or panels as the culture methods for rock and pearl oysters. Sponges, which can be grown alongside/within an existing set up, may be attached directly to longlines, or in baskets.

Common culture methods of clams/cockles include bottom cages or bottom bags, which will be trialled if a licence is obtained.

Sea cucumbers are likely to be "ranched", where juveniles are introduced into the site and grown out. Ranching requires minimal material costs; however, a larger lease area is required, which would suit the proposed site at Nanga Bay.

Abalone is likely to be cultured using grow-out structures. Juvenile abalone will be stocked on to purpose-made habitat structures deployed on sandy areas of the proposed area.

Figure 1: Proposed site (marine area only)


#### **Risks**

The proposed site is located in an area excluded from the Shark Bay Marine Park (SBMP). Waters immediately beyond the proposed site are "general use" areas, which allow for commercial activities including aquaculture. Nonetheless, aquaculture at the proposed site will need to ensure that no water pollution will occur in the SBMP.

There will be no requirement to feed bivalves, sea cucumbers, abalone and sponges being stocked at the site. Therefore, the aquaculture of the proposed species is considered to pose no significant environmental or ecological issues, with identified risks accommodated by Pan's Management and Environmental Monitoring Plan (MEMP).

#### Broken Heart Syndrome (is TRUE and NOT a myth)

Broken Heart Syndrome is commonly said in "jest", I found out it is a real medical condition.

Over the past 3 months my mum and eldest brother passed away. The day after notification of my brother's death, my eldest sister complained of chest pains. She ended up in Harvey Hospital, transferred to Bunbury then flown to Perth by the Flying Doctors. As it was chest pains, it was immediately treated as a heart attack. Many tests were done and the conclusion was it was not a heart attack but a case of Broken Heart Syndrome due to the stress of losing our mum and brother. I just want to alert others of this condition:- Judy Britza

**Definition:**Broken heart syndrome is temporary heart condition that's often brought on by stressful situations, such as the death of a loved one. People with Broken heart syndrome may have sudden chest pain or think they're having a heart attack. In broken heart syndrome, there's a temporary disruption of your heart's normal pumping function, while the remainder of the heart functions normally or with even more forceful contractions.

Broken heart syndrome may be caused by the heart's reaction to a surge of stress hormones. The condition may also be called takatsubo cardiomyopathy, apical ballooning syndrome or stress cardiomyopathy by doctors.

The symptoms of broken heart syndrome are treatable, and the condition usually reverses itself in about a week or so.

Risks: Broken heart syndrome affects women far more often than men. It appears that most people who have broken heart syndrome are women 50 or older.

Symptoms: Chest pain & shortness of breath

#### How is broken heart syndrome different from a heart attack?

Heart attacks are generally caused by a complete or near complete blockage of a heart artery. This blockage is due to a blood clot forming at the site of narrowing from fatty buildup in the wall of the artery. In broken heart syndrome, the heart arteries are not blocked, although blood flow in the arteries of the heart may be reduced.

#### Tests and diagnosis:

If your doctor suspects you have broken heart syndrome, he or she may use some or all of these exams and tests to make a diagnosis:

Personal history and physical exam, Exectrocardiogram (WCG), Chest Z-ray, Exhocardiogram, Blood tests, Coronary ampiogram.

#### Prevention:

There's a small chance broken heart syndrome can happen again after a first5 episode. There's no proven therapy to prevent additional episodes. Recognizing and managing stress in your life also is very important.


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## Seth's fishing report

Steep Point was an early start to our fishing day. We had to get up at 5am, have some breaky then set up my gear. I went on our boat Yellow Canary with Uncle Brett, Mum. It was pretty rough that day as we fished in 75 meters of water. On mum's first drop she caught a Nor-West Blow fish. It was funny. Then on my first drop I caught a double header of Passion Cod that I caught on my smorgasbord of bait on the electric reel and rod. They were good eating. I didn't feel to good, but I wasn't sea sick, I had a bad headache. I only felt better after moving a bit. All I needed to do was vomit and then I was good.


We went closer to the rock cliffs and fished in about 20-30 meters of water. We could see people float fishing off the cliffs. Our spot was near a big ledge and rock, what we now call Coronation Rock because on Mum's first drop she hooked up to a fish that took her straight under a ledge. Uncle Brett used his skills and got it out. It ended up being a nice Coronation Trout. Then I dropped in my line and had probably the best fish of the day but I got sharked. "Sharks only eat good fish" Mum tells me.

When we got to the cliff spot there was big seaweed patches floating. Uncle Brett reckons he saw Dolphin Fish swimming under the weed so we stopped and dropped our lines in. Lots of whales swam past heading up to Turtle Bay and it was funny because every time Mum got her camera out they went under the water. We saw a big cargo ship heading to Geraldton to.

On another day we went on an adventure to Herald and Louisa Bay. We started trawling and after 30 seconds I was already on. I got a little excited and went to hard, and pulled the hooks from the fish's mouth so it got off. Then Uncle Brett let another rod out and it went off after 4 minutes. We thought it got off but it turned out to be a tiny lizard fish which was 27cm. We saw lots of giant Tusky's which must have been fully grown and super huge.

Me, Mum, Uncle Brett, Dad, Tayla, Kade and Mia went squidding out the front of Denham. Kade caught the first squid on a goldie colour jig. Then Dad hooked and landed a monster squid and we were wondering if it was heavier than the squid I caught and won heaviest squid at the Fishing Fiesta for. It wasn't heavier, it was only 550 grams. Mia caught a squid which fell off just at the boat but Dad was quick and grabbed it in the water with his hands.

So back to fishing again seeya soon.

# England spearheads the lead in severing the chains that shackled the British to the European Union. Herewith some secular facts & Biblical insights.

Defence. Britain has the largest, best equipped, efficient & most respected Army in Western Europe. Had Britain stayed in the E.U. Brussels had plans in motion for the absorption of Britain's over 400 year old standing Army into an EU Force with the Oath of Allegiance to the Monarchy dropped. Such a proposal is of course anathema to the average Briton.

*Immigration*. With successive waves of North African & Middle East

Moslems passing the 1 million mark flooding into Europe, Britain – as with the other European countries – is

increasingly apprehensive of not

just the terrorist threat but the already overstretched welfare bill. Further, the nigh-on impossible ability to control this 'invasion' by Middle East refugees has revealed just how little Sovereignty the E.U. member States have left with which to control their borders. Brussels determines the quotas.

Background. The E.U. started as a proposed European Alliance of 10 member Countries with the main intent of averting a repeat of the 1st& 2nd World Wars. A shared currency & open frontiers with 'free' trade between those 10 member countries would ensure another major conflict would be a thing of the past. All citizens of these 10 countries would share a common citizenship & accompanying E.U. Passport. It sounded good – a multi-cultural idyll of every one living happily together. Such grandiose plans for Societies have to rely heavily on Socialist ideals. The thing is one cannot actually use the word Socialist or Socialism in this day & age.. That wording brings uncomfortable images to the minds of the entrepreneurs of any society i.e. ....the common good ... equality ...shared resources ... Hitler used the word to describe his utopian State - NationAlsoZiaISM but back of it was a ruthless right wing Fascist driven elitism.

Karl Marx gave the world the opportunity for a similar idealistic society called Communism but lest the root word Commune with the implications back then of individualism curtailed, the Russian ideology was called the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. Its manifesto was the of the idealism of the international Brotherhood of Mankind... a shared Utopian dream of a classless society...Like Hitler's Mein Kampf & his accompanying oratory skills, the content of Karl Marx's Das Kapital when spoken by eloquent men &





women hypnotised & swayed the masses who both men – as a reality of the human condition pointed out by Jesus – found could be easily led like sheep. And in both cases the sheep were led to their slaughter.

The end reality of the Communist dream

under similar power hungry megalomaniacs was an estimated death toll of between **85 to 100 million civilians in the USSR gulags as opposed to the figure of 11 million civilians under Hitler's regime**). (Note I have not included the additional millions of men & women in the respective Armed Forces.)

Thus since World War 2 the operative word is **Democracy**. Like Communism & Socialism the ideals are & do sound fine But if expounded upon & exercised by Godless men & women the fine ideals turn to ashes in the mouths of the followers.

#### **DUYFKEN SET FOR WEST COAST VOYAGE** TO CELEBRATE 400TH LANDING ANNIVERSARY

to Bunbury and then up to Dirk Hartog Island as part of call and thousands of school children who are studying the State Government's celebration of the first recorded evidence of Europeans to set foot on Western Australia 400 years ago.

The Duyfken, built in Fremantle and launched in 1999 at a cost of \$3.7 million is an authentic replica of the little Dutch ship built around 1595, which was the first historically recorded ship to make the voyage to Australia some 10 years before Dirk Hartog arrived in his ship the Eendracht.

WA Premier Colin Barnett says it's fitting the Duyfken is involved in the celebration of the 400th anniversary of Dutch VOC captain Dirk Hartog's landing at Dirk Hartog Island off Shark Bay on the WA coast. "The anniversary provides a real opportunity for Australians to learn more about the Dirk Hartog story and our early maritime history," he said.

The ship departs Fremantle on August 20, for Bunbury, then Mandurah, Hillarys, Jurien Bay, Dongara, Geraldton and Denham before heading to Cape Inscription on Dirk Hartog Island. Members of the public are also being given an opportunity to buy a berth aboard the ship for each leg of the journey at \$250 for each 24-hour period. A ceremony is planned at Cape Inscription where a plaque will be unveiled.

Mr Barnett is expected to attend the ceremony and it's anticipated a flotilla of boats will accompany the Duyfken as she moors off Dirk Hartog Island. After a four-day festival in Denham the ship will sail back to Fremantle, arriving on Sunday November 6.

#### Details of the Duyfken voyage

Departs Fremantle on August 20 for Bunbury then Mandurah, Hillarys, Jurien Bay, Dongara, Geraldton (the ship is in Geraldton from October 8 to 16) and Denham (the ship is in Denham from October 19 to 24) before heading to Cape Inscription

on Dirk Hartog Island.

A replica of the Dutch ship Duyfken will sail from Fremantle The Duyfken will be open for public tours at each port of the State's European History will be visiting the ship as part of the curriculum.

> School groups and members of the general public will be able to go aboard and discover the challenges experienced by the 'Dutchies' in their quest to grow the trade from the East Indies.

> Tickets are available from Ticketek at \$12.74 for people aged 17 and over and \$5.10 for five to 16 year-olds. Lotterywest has funded repairs to enable the Duyfken to make her commemorative journey as part of the celebrations.


