

- keep brands consistent across all digital and print platforms including websites, social media, flyers and email signatures etc. This includes same font, same colours and good quality photos;
- on your website, put the most important things at the top and also ensue Google Analytics is installed so you can keep track of where and what people searched for on your website;
- list your business on "Google Business" which may take a few weeks to wait for it to be set up. Once that is completed you can then also list your business on "Bing Places for Business". These are statistically the two biggest search engines in Australia; and
- · use videos to educate and entertain.

### **Vounteers in Clubs Workshops**

After completing the recent Volunteers in Clubs workshops with Katie from Crazy Communitites, there were a few interesting points we took note of that we thought we would pass on to our community. These include:

- when being reimbursed for club/group purchases, the purchaser must sign the receipt, then have the treasurer and one other committee individual sign the receipt which is kept on file by the treasuer;
- when making "out of session" decisions (between committee meetings), these need to be minuted in the next meeting minutes. Normally addressed in the agenda

after asking for the confirmation of previous meeting minutes, also have a section to confirm "out of session decisions" (and list the decisions);

- create a induction pack for new committee members at AGM's or those filing casual vacancy positions. This induction pack could include the groups constitution, the past 6 months meeting minutes (to get them up to date with recent decisions and discussions), the contact details of other committee members, volunteers and the goups stakeholders, the code of conduct, any policies, rules, by laws and a list of the groups regular activities and or events etc; and
- all organisations must maintain a up-to-date list of their financial members. You are however only required to keep their email address on file, you don't actually need to have all their contact details.



Maintenance dredging at Denham is planned to commence in late April to restore depths of navigation channels and ensure safe access to the Denham Maritime Facility.

The project will involve dredging approximately 20,000 cubic metres of sand from the basin and entrance channel over a period of 4 months.

The dredged material will be deposited on the beach north-west of the Denham Seaside Caravan Park. Sand deposited on the beach is likely to be naturally discoloured. However, it will bleach in the sun after placement and there will be no long-term impact.

Dredging works are permitted to occur Monday to Friday from 6am to 6pm, and on Saturdays from 6am to 4pm. No works will occur during the school holiday periods.

Skippers operating in the area and people accessing the beach should be aware of the special safety arrangements implemented for the dredging and sand replenishment works. During the pumping operation, sections of the beach may be temporarily closed to ensure public safety.

# What happened to the seagrasses?

The waters of Shark Bay warmed up in the Summer of 2010 and into Autumn 2011, so much so, that many seagrass plants lost their leaves and died. Sea surface temperatures were up to 5°C above average summer temperatures.

When large amounts of seagrass die, a cascade of effects occur throughout the food web, with grazing dugongs (wuthuga) and turtles (buyungurra), omnivorous crabs (gurab), carnivores including sea snakes, and filter feeding scallops all losing their homes and food.

Scientists have been at work to understand the best way to assist the recovery of these lost and damaged meadows. They have been working with Malgana Rangers to field test restoration methods and bring the meadows back to full health.




pranks included having paper fish placed on their backs and being referred to as "poisson d'avril" (April fish), said to symbolize a young, easily caught fish and a gullible person.

# A persuasive argument by a local school child.....

### Climate Change Is Killing Our Wildlife

So tell me, what matters to you? I'll give you a few moments.

Think of something that matters enough for you to be able to write over 800 words on the topic. Enough that you would get up and use your voice to tell the world about it.

Well like a lot of you just now, at first, I had a lot of trouble answering this question. Reading through competition submissions of everyday people like yourselves extraordinary everyday people - answering this same question, I believed I was disadvantaged. I thought, I don't have any disabilities, I don't live somewhere with extreme weather conditions such as drought and I'm not part of the LGBTQ+ community nor any other major movement. Like a lot of people my age, I'm also not very interested in politics or the economy (surprise!), and I haven't had any eye-opening experiences while living in a small isolated town. Honestly, I'm the one thing which most of you adults nowadays roll their eyes at; just an average kid who escapes reality using video games and is just trying to make it through to graduation by the skin of my nose while having no motivation to do any homework (I haven't done any since year 7, but that's our little secret) and dealing with a serious procrastination problem.

I didn't think I had anything worth talking about which would interest you; the people of the world. And let's be honest, would you really want to sit here and listen to me argue about why Overwatch is better than Fortnite? Or that Dare should make a new recipe for their mocha iced coffee because it tastes like the potions which I made as kid comprised of dirt, chalk and water from the back hose? Yeah, I didn't think so. But while entertaining myself with a TV show on a warm Friday night, I came to a realization; I've got some of the biggest advantages of all; ambition, a special place and the knowledge that our biodiversity is disappearing.

Shark Bay was added to the World Heritage list in 1991 and is one of only nineteen World Heritage Areas across the whole of Australia. This spectacular place was given this title for several reasons including natural beauty, exceptional coastal scenery, an abundance of marine fauna, a meeting point of climates and our lush seagrass banks. But the most important reason is that Shark Bay World Heritage Area is home to a great richness of wildlife, including five of Australia's 26 endangered mammals.

I've lived in Shark Bay my entire life and, as boring as it seems after this many years, like majority of the locals here, I can't deny that this place is special. The waters are warm and full of marine life which support our dominant fishing, tour and seafood businesses. There are animals here that you

might never see in the wild anywhere else, such as the mallee fowl, which I was only able to see for the first time last year. The town itself is significantly cleaner than anywhere I've been

before because we aim to keep it



beautiful and keep our wildlife safe. But just like rest of the world, like every other World Heritage Area and every other beautiful untouched place, like every animal's home and every ecosystem, our little paradise is being destroyed.

So what matters to me, you ask?

To me, what matters is the conservation of, not just Shark Bay's or Australia's, but the world's wildlife - Our wildlife - and standing up against climate change.

By the time I could hold myself upright on my wobbly legs and babble sounds to the point where anyone who heard would convince themselves that I spoke, I was watching and helping my mum rehabilitate and treat some of Australia's most gentle animals. One of which was the Greater Bilby which is listed as a 'vulnerable' species with less than 10,000 bilbies left in the world. It felt amazing knowing that I was part of something special and I was making a difference, even if it was small. Since then my dream has always been to become a vet. Helping the world's animals is all I've ever wanted to do. And now it's more important than ever that we take action.

Climate change is the most worrying threat to our wildlife today. It has been brewing like a storm for decades, and now that it's effects are becoming more serious and apparent, it won't be so easy to fix. Did you know that in 1880, NASA began keeping record of the global temperature, and since then, the years 2020 and 2016 have tied for the warmest year on record? So as you can see, the effects of this man-made disaster are getting worse, and the solution is us; we have to work together.

Climate change is the biggest threat to wildlife because it doesn't pick and choose like predators and poachers. It doesn't have favourites or a hit-list. Climate change is worldwide and is effecting every animal that walks, swims, hops and flies. It's eating away at the planet's ice and robbing polar bears of their homes. It's cooking koalas and other bushland creatures in its pot of destruction. It's warming the oceans and causing stress to coral, important habitat to marine life, leading to coral bleaching. Climate change is a powerful and merciless force that we've all contributed to, but with everyone's help we can rain on its parade before it rains on ours.

So how can we help?

It starts in your home. In your bathroom, in your kitchen, in your driveway. It starts at your dining table and on your walls and ceilings. It begins with you. Use renewable

energy to power your house and ensure to properly insulate to avoid using heating and cooling as much as possible. Ditch your fridge and other appliances and replace them with energy efficient ones. Reduce your water consumption/waste by taking shorter showers and turning the tap off while you're not actively using the water. Buy water-efficient appliances and fixtures. Make less food waste by eating the food you buy and composting scraps. Ditch the incandescent light bulbs and switch to LED ones. Unplug devices, chargers, cords and appliances when they're not in use. Try use fuel-efficient vehicles to save fuel and money, and maintain your vehicles, for example, by keeping tires properly inflated. Recycle as much waste as possible. Maybe some of these things are not an

option for you? Consider supporting other people and organisations who support our wildlife directly. Follow them on social media, share their posts and information. Spread awareness to other people who can help. Donate; every dollar makes a change.

Even if it's small. Even if you think you're just one little person and nothing will change if you contribute. Even if you don't see the transformation overnight, or in a week, or a month. It all counts.

Our wildlife needs us. And it needs us now.

# **Conservation Matters - Monkey Mia**

Happy Holidays! Below is a message from Parks and Wildlife Service on how to have a safe and happy experience in Monkey Mia.

A friendly reminder Entry permits are required by all visitors to Monkey Mia, including RAC resort guests. Locals just show us your driver's licence or proof of residency to get your free local pass!

### **Dolphin Experiences:**

We recommend arriving for a 7:45am start and can do up to three dolphin experiences before midday, dependent on when the dolphin choose to visit. Participation in dolphin experiences is included in your entry permit. Please present your entry permit to receive a token to join in.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions a maximum of 250 tokens will be issued for each experience. Markers are laid out on the beach to manage social distancing and visitors are encouraged to socially distance on the reserve.

Please complete the SafeWA contact register for your time in Monkey Mia.

### Respecting the wildlife:

The dolphins often return to hunt and rest in the shallows of Monkey Mia. For your safety, and to abide by wildlife regulations, if you see dolphins approaching exit the water completely, or move 50m away. If you look closely you may even be able to see the fish the dolphins are hunting or watch the calves learning these skills!

Emus and pelicans are regularly seen in Monkey Mia (and round Denham). We ask everyone to give them plenty of space and not to offer or entice birds with food/water. Emus in the past were demonstrating aggressive behaviour towards people and dogs as a result from unlawful feeding and we don't want this to happen again. Pelicans have also recently been entangled in fishing line after associating people fishing/boating with food. Here is the fishing gear we luckily removed from a pelican last week.



If you see injured wildlife please report it to a Parks & Wildlife Service office or call Wildcare Helpline on 9474 9055

### **Boating:**

For a safe and enjoyable boating experience at Monkey Mia please see the new signage located at the boat ramp or pick up a copy of the Monkey Mia boating guide and marine reserve brochure. Reminder there is a 5 knot-speed zone and a recreation zone. The RecFishWest app is a great resource for all your bag and size limits and marine park zones in one place.

# **Graham Egan**



Born: Sydney, 23 April 1948

Graham was from a what could be called a fairly tough home back-ground, running away once at the age of 12 and leaving the second time at the age of 14.

It comes as no surprise to those of us that knew Graham that there was a fairly defiant and determined streak evident from an early age and coupled with his Irish temperament was not readily stood over nor slow to use his fists if he thought necessary.

He enjoyed the company of his fellow man and with his ever ready sense of humour fitted in well with the shearers and drovers of the sheep and cattle stations of the outback.

After a stint in the Alice and the back-blocks of the Northern Territory he wound up in South Australia where truck driving filled the bill for a while. But as though filling the sentiments of the Irish ballad of the wild colonial boy, roaming was an integral part of Graham's makeup. However I am glad to say he never actually became a bush-ranger although I suspect the idea would have had some appeal had he come out to Australia a hundred years ago.

Amongst other things this by now quite burly little bloke joined a travelling Circus with one of Sharman's boxing troupes for a couple of seasons. He undoubtedly won some and lost some the name of the game with fairground boxing bouts was to give the crowd their money's worth. Graham was no slouch when it came to giving the crowd a run for their money.

But when time came for a change he opted for a less painful way of earning a quid on the Indian Pacific railway in the dining car with the Ghan. In terms of catering skills that proved an invaluable experience as we shall allude to later.

Always game to give something a go there was a time in Graham's life when - wait for it - he helped a mate establish a small independent, annual horse racing show to become a well-known local event called the Jandakot Race Meeting. Probably of no surprise, Graham would ride dressed as a Gaucho with an enormous Mexican sombrero. Far from being an embarrassed teen ager - as Kerry his daughter then was - she muttered 'cool, man, so cool....'

Likewise never one to shirk a community event if there

was a generous attitude with the beer, especially if spiked with something of an adrenaline rush, he did a stint with the Coogee Volunteer Fire Brigade.

He was not really the marrying kind but filled this role long enough to marry a Patricia Mitchell (Nee Ridley) which enabled a very delightful daughter, Kerry, whom you see here today, to emerge on the scene.

With his somewhat nomadic life, it's hard for me - as likewise members of his family - to put together precise dates of Graham's life. But all I know is Graham like so many others here today was coming up to Shark Bay some few years before actually dropping anchor here. He inevitably made his mark.

I don't have to remind locals of his annual Christmas distribution of sweets and soft drinks not too discreetly disguised as Santa, his exuberant and energetic involvement with the annual Fishing Fiesta and similarly his involvement with the Seniors weekly morning tea and bun get-together. His home made cakes were a real treat as were some of the controversial dramas that seemed to eddy around him.

These I won't go into detail here, but as I conclude I want to say this. In my 50 year career here in Shark Bay fighting a variety of controversial causes I found I either emerged as flavour of the month with some, or as popular as a pork chop in a synagogue with a lynching mob hard on my heals. Graham always made me feel a lot better as he too was prone to similar turns of events.

Kerry – I want you to know your Dad was not only a colourful character but also contributed a delightful splash of colour to Shark Bay. Totally unafraid of saying his piece he was one of those men whom you could say would rather do you a good turn than otherwise. There was no malice nor pettiness in him and Shark Bay will be the poorer for his absence but the richer for the memory of him.

God bless you mate as likewise the family and the little dog you left behind.





If you call the Shark Bay Health Centre after hours you will be transferred through to Health Direct where a Registered Nurse will ask you a number of questions to determine whether you need further emergency assessment by the Shark Bay nurse. If you require further assessment, your call will be put through to the local nurse.

### **Examples of an EMERGENCY include:**

- · Breathing difficulties
- Chest pain
- Severe abdominal pain
- Bleeding that can't be controlled with first aid
- Convulsions and fits
- Deep lacerations
- Eye or ear injuries
- Uncontrolled high fever
- Loss of consciousness
- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour
- A very sick child
