
School children needing dental assistance can attend the Rangeway Dental Therapy Centre in Geraldton but prior appointments must be made by contacting on 9921 4373.

Upgrading of town TV Transmission

The town's TV transmission (for WIN, GWN and the TEN network) needs to be upgraded from an MPEG2 to an MPEG 4 system. This is a required upgrade to ensure the continuity of the service, but unfortunately many older TV's are not able to decode the MPEG4 signal, and so will not be able to receive pictures and/or sound once the upgrade is completed.

For those residents and visitors who do not want to buy a new TV, a set top box (cost between about \$40 - \$70 from most reputable electronics stores) should be sufficient to decode the upgraded signal.



The Town's TV transmission was scheduled to be upgraded 30th June 2021. You may be required to rechannel your TV programs for WIN, GWN and the TEN network, as the Town's transmission is being upgraded from MPEG2 to an MPEG 4 system.


Learning Support

Students have different learning needs and an advantage of a small school is that we are quick to recognize students needing more support or a different approach. Every child is discussed regularly by the staff team, reviewing their happiness, behaviour, attendance, effort and learning progress and we work together on strategies to help where any problems are identified. We also benefit from superb support from specialist teachers in the region, who help us review evidence-based best practice, planning and programs and assist with specialist assessments to determine what will work best. This year we have also benefitted from more frequent visits from the school psychology service; our School Psychologist, Laura, is an expert in assessing students' learning needs and assisting staff to develop optimal programs for them. Our visiting team of Speech Pathologist and Occupational Therapists focus particularly on our younger students and aim to correct problems with speech, pronunciation, pencil hold, fine motor skills etc early, so as to get learning off to the best start. Please talk to your child's teacher or pop into the

office if you have any queries.

Year 8+ Camp

Our Camp in week 6 of term 2 was for students in Years 8-10 who are starting to think ahead to possible future pathways for work or study. 
spent the afternoon at the Geraldton Museum and then

Plastic free July at Monkey Mia!

Increasingly single use plastics are being restricted or banned, and for good reason! Plastic doesn't break down – it breaks up - into lots of tiny pieces that can cause harm to marine animals if eaten. Even before plastic has disintegrated into small pieces, things like plastic bags bear a remarkable resemblance to jellyfish. For animals like marine turtles that rely on jelly fish as a food source, eating a plastic bag can be a fatal dinnertime choice.

Kids can join in the fun "Plastic Free July" activities over the school holidays so ask at the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) booking office or visit the DBCA Monkey Mia shop for more information.



Shark Bay Fishing Club

Research Scientist Dr Peter Coulson from Science and Resource Assessment at Fisheries (DPIRD) recently came to Denham to present their recent research findings using shark deterrents. 20 people came to hear the findings as well as check out the latest shark deterents on the market including magnetic SharkBanz, orca whale mimicking noises technology (acoustic) and other deep sea electronic pulse options.

Title: Testing deterrents to mitigate shark depredation in line fishing across Western Australian fishing sectors

Funding: Recreational Fishing Initiative Fund and DPIRD

Project objectives: Project consisted of three components;

- Survey recreational fishers and charter operators to identify shark deterrents that have been developed and currently being successfully used.
- Test a range of shark deterrents during at sea trials to establish the level of effectiveness of each technique at reducing shark depredation during line fishing operations.
- Series of presentations on project outcomes to recreational fishers in regional centres.

Results:

 Survey of recreational fishers indicated that moving spots and stopping fishing were the main ways

- anglers minimised shark bite-offs. It wa suggested people should move every 30 minutes.
- 2. Three deterrent devices were trailed, a magnetic, an electric and an acoustic based deterrent.
- Tests were undertaken in waters around Exmouth and the Murion Islands and off the Montebello Islands with video footage also taken.
- Deterrent devices did not stop the occurrence of shark depredation, but did reduce the proportion of fish lost to sharks.
- 5. The behaviour of sharks in the presence of deterrents differed and effect of the deterrent was influence by shark abundance.
- 6. Shark species responsible for depredation included 5-6 "whaler" species and the sicklefin lemon shark.
- Large cods are also responsible for fish bite-offs which was seen in video footage taken whilst testing

Seagrass science inspires Malgana artist

athaagudu (two waters), also known as Shark Bay, is the traditional country of the Malgana people. It is also home to expansive seagrass (wirriya jalyanu) meadows. Two large temperate species make up over 4000 km² of seagrass meadows in this World Heritage site.

From far above the crystalclear blue-green water has dark 'black' stripes created by wire weed (*Amphibolis antarctica*). Under the water the colour palette comes alive with the vibrant emerald greens of ribbon weed (*Posidonia australis*) and rich deep purples of sun-drenched wire weed.

Let us take you on a highresolution journey to the surface of seagrass leaves and the individual cells giving life and colour within them.

The bright green chloroplasts are the engine room powering photosynthesis, while the dark pink to purple anthocyanin pigments provide sun protection to wire weed

plants living in extremely high light environments.

Exploring the anatomical structures of seagrasses (and comparative works with eucalypt species) provides inspiration for environmental science student and emerging Malgana artist, Tiahna Oxenham.

In keeping with cultural heritage protocols, art works are created from plant material collected on Malgana country, keeping her connection to country alive.

Fresh seagrass collections were made in Shark Bay waters, with permission from the Malgana Aboriginal Corporation to remove plants from country. The collections included ribbon weed (Posidonia australis) and wire weed (Amphibolis antarctica).

A glimpse onto the surface of seagrass leaves shows the beautiful, repeated shapes of tightly packed


epidermal cells - the cells that protect the leaf from the outside world. Vibrant green chloroplasts are visible in the ribbon weed cells.

Transverse sections were prepared from living seagrass leaves by carefully sectioning leaves to the thickness of a single cell, almost invisible to the naked eye, using a sharp feather blade. The thin and delicate sections were mounted on glass slides.

All sections were inspected under a high-resolution compound microscope to capture images of the internal cells. No staining was necessary to highlight the different cell types, as the cells distinctly and naturally fluoresce.


Seagrasses do not have stomata the pores in the leaves that regulate gas transfer and water loss through epidermal cells in terrestrial plants.

Instead, gas diffuses directly from the sea water through the outer wall of epidermal cells, where most of the chloroplasts are found. Thin-walled mesophyll cells encircle large, dark air-lacunae. They are full of air for gas exchange and give leaves buoyancy, which assists in the synchronous waving or 'monami' of seagrass leaves in response to water movement.

The epidermal cells of wire weed are often brightly coloured pink to purple, with stripes of orange cells giving away the location of vascular bundles. The tightly arranged bundle sheath cells fluoresce golden and encase the vascular tissues – the transport system for critical substances and nutrients that sustain plant life.

The first of four artworks to be completed in this 'seagrass under the microscope' series was included in a portfolio featuring seagrass-inspired artworks by multiple artists at the Wirriya Jalyanu (seagrass) Festival in Denham, Shark Bay on 8 April 2021.

The festival is a celebration of Malgana language, art and science of Shark Bay's seagrass ecosystems. An earlier work inspired by ribbon weed fruit (*Posidonia australis*) was featured on promotional material for the festival.

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Marine Rescue Shark Bay

It has been a quiet month as far as jobs go for the volunteers at Marine Rescue Shark Bay with only a couple of breakdown tows required but there has been plenty going on behind the scenes.

Seven of our members took part in a two day Seamanship training course in Denham with DFES trainers, Simon Miller and Dan Goodlad. This course is part of the training pathway to becoming recognized rescue vessel crews. It teaches the volunteers some of the skills they will use in their roles such as knot tying and rope splicing, vessel berthing and anchoring etc.

Our group was successful in applying for a \$1000 grant from the Shire of Shark Bay Community Assistance Grants Fund. The money will be used to purchase a new barbecue for our meetings and social get togethers at the shed. Thanks to the Shire for their generosity.

In other exciting news DFES has announced that Tamala Rose is to be replaced. Their risk assessment for this area has found that we should have a recue vessel in the 10 to 12 metre size range to safely carry out the types of tasks we are asked to do.

A sub-committee will be formed to work out what type of vessel the group wants to have built. It could be a monohull, catamaran, RHIB style or another air rider like Tamala Rose. The group decides all aspects of the new vessel, so it is quite a lengthy and detailed process. Watch this space for future updates.

WA Statewide recreational fishing rule changes



From 1 July 2021 we are introducing new rules for recreational fishing in Western Australia which will help manage potential impacts on demersal finfish due to increased fishing activity.

The changes will have a minimal impact on day trip fishers and are a proactive management response to issues raised by the WA fishing community.

What are the main rule changes?

- Trip limits the possession limit on a fishing trip is 10kg of finfish fillets from any species, no skin required, plus and additional 10kg of large pelagic species such as mackerel, tuna and shark, stored separately with skin attached.
- The existing possession limit of 20kg of fillets of any species will continue to apply at a person's principal place of residence. The possession limit of 10kg of finfish fillets and one day's bag limit of whole fish; or two days' bag limit of whole fish remains unchanged.
- Passengers on extended live aboard charter tours are exempt from the trip limit and can still accumulate up to 20kg of fillets of any species provided the fish are labelled with the person's full name, the name of the charter boat and the date the tour ended.
- Filleting at sea the 30cm minimum fillet length for fish filleted at sea has been removed, however, fillets of any species transported or stored at sea must have skin attached for species identification.
- Definition of whole fish the definition of a whole fish or fish trunk has been amended to allow for large pelagic species to be cut in two pieces and still be considered as one fish for storage and possession limit purposes.
- Release weights the master of a

boat fishing for demersal finfish by line anywhere in the State must be in possession of a release weight, including both recreational and charter skippers. This rule previously only applied in the West Coast Region.

Why have the rules changed?

Demersal finfish are typically long-lived and highly vulnerable to increases in fishing pressure. As a result of COVID-19 related travel restrictions in 2020 and 2021 there has been a significant increase in recreational fishing participation, particularly in the Gascoyne and Pilbara areas. As a result, the community has raised a number of concerns that the additional fishing activity may negatively impact the stocks of slow growing demersal species, such as pink snapper and emperors, in proximity to popular areas.

DPIRD has introduced the new rules to help protect ocean resources and ensure sustainability to maintain quality fishing experiences for current and future generations.

How was the recreational fishing community consulted on these changes?

Peak recreational fishing body Recfishwest consulted with the fishing community andundertook a survey of its members to canvas their views and gauge the level of support for various management changes. In addition to the survey, multiple reports were received through various channels from community groups.

When will the rules be implemented and reviewed?

DPIRD has reviewed Recfishwest's recommendations and the Minister for Fisheries has approved amendments to the Fish Resources Management Regulations 1995. The new rules will come into effect on 1 July 2021 and will be reviewed after 12 months.

Where can I find out more information about the rules? DPIRD offices can provide advice and copies of the Recreational fishing guide.

Alternatively, you can find more about the rules and other recreational fishing issues from the Department's website – which also has office contact details. Some of your questions answered...

Q. If the new rules are to protect demersal species, why can't nearshore species fillets make up my 20kg possession limit, after I've hit my demersal cap of 10kg – mulloway for example. Why can it only be 10kg of pelagic species fillets?

A. The new 10kg fillet possession limit has been introduced as a proactive management response to recent increases in recreational fishing participation across the state resulting from COVID related travel restrictions. The new 'trip limit' is designed to ensure the available catch of all species is shared amongst recreational fishers.

Given there is less sustainability concern for large pelagic species (such as mackerel, tuna and shark), and that fillets of these species are readily identifiable from fillets of other fish species, an allowance of an additional 10kg of fillets has been made. To ensure fisheries officers are able to enforce this allowance, all fillets of large pelagic fish in excess of your initial 10kg trip limit must have the skin attached for identification purposes.

Q. What is a large pelagic finfish?

A. Finfish are categorised according to their aquatic habitat. The complete list of large pelagic finfish, which includes mackerel, tuna and shark is listed in the Recreational fishing guide. You can also find out which species belong to the large pelagic finfish category by visiting the online rules fish.wa.gov.au/rules or on the Recfishwest app.

Q. Can I choose to make up my trip limit of 20kg of fillets with only pelagic fish?

A. Yes, you can. Under the new rules a person can accumulate up to the trip limit of 10kg of fillets of any species (including large pelagic fish), plus an additional 10kg of fillets of large pelagic fish with the skin attached.

Q. If I want to skin my fish before freezing them, when can I remove the skin?

A. Fillets may not be transported at sea with the skin off. Once you reach the mainland, you can remove the skin from up to 10kg of fillets of any species. However, the skin must remain attached to any fillets of large pelagic fish that exceed your 10kg trip limit until you return to your principal place of residence.

Q. I live in a regional area, but want to bring fish back to my family in Perth occasionally. Am I still restricted to only 10kg of demersal fish when travelling to Perth, even though I'm not on a fishing trip?

A. The new 10kg trip limit applies to all fillets stored by a person other than at their principal place of residence. As you are travelling and not at your principal place of residence, you cannot have more than 10kg of demersal fillets per person. 10kg of fillets is still a generous amount of fish for a family, making 50 x 200 gram meals.

Q. What if I catch a big deep-drop demersal like a bass grouper and I get more than 10 kilos of fillets off it? Transporting fish like this whole in good condition is not practical. What am I supposed to do with the excess fillets? A. When targeting large demersal fish like bass groper you need to be mindful of the new 10kg trip limit and plan ahead if you choose to fillet your fish prior to returning to your principal place of residence. If you are going to target these large fish, be prepared to share your catch and all stop fishing once each person travelling with you has reached their 10kg trip limit. You don't need to be the person who caught the fish to be in possession of a 10kg trip limit of fillets.

for a number of months, does that count as my "place of residence", allowing me to have more than 10kg of demersal fillets in my possession limit?

A. No – your 'principal place of residence' does not include a stay in a caravan, tent, vehicle or boat. Therefore the trip limit of 10kg of finfish would still apply.

Q. How is DPIRD going to monitor the change in recreational catch since COVID travel restrictions to inform the review of these rules after 12 months?

A. DPIRD is currently undertaking a 12 month survey of recreational boat based fishing across Western Australia. The results of this survey will be available in early 2022 and will be compared against previous surveys, as well as current fisheries management strategies. DPIRD will consider the outcomes of this process in consultation with Recfishwest, when reviewing future management requirements.

Q. Do these rule changes just apply to the North of the

A. No – the new rules apply on a state-wide basis.

Q. What evidence do we have to support the anecdotal reports of increased fishing?

A. Reports from regional towns have indicated that accommodation has been fully booked outside of the usual peak holiday periods, tackle stores are experiencing record sales and greater than average levels of offal are requiring disposal at local fish cleaning stations.

This anecdotal evidence of increased fishing effort is supported by DPIRD's quantifiable data as follows:

- During 2020/21 there was a significant increase in the number of recreational fishing licences issued.
- Boat ramp camera data indicates a significant increase in the number of boat launches at key boat ramps throughout this period, compared to previous years, in particular in the West Coast, Gascoyne and Pilbara regions.

Q. What is DPIRD doing at a fisheries management level to address the shark bite-off problem - given it could be argued it's a bigger sustainability threat to demersal fish stocks than increased domestic tourism?

A. There are a number of contributing factors likely to be associated with the increasing reports of shark bite-offs (or depredation) and therefore the development of suitable mitigation measures is complex. Accordingly, a number of projects are currently being undertaken by DPIRD to better understand and address shark depredation across the State. These projects include a Recreational Fishing Initiatives Fund (RFIF) study to identify and test mitigation strategies and the effectiveness of shark deterrent devices that use acoustic, electronic or electromagnetic technologies. A series of presentations on the results of the RFIF project are being held in regional areas in the northwest of the State and Perth in mid-2021. Any measures designed to reduce depredation need to be considered in the context of the overall shark resource in order to avoid potential unintended sustainability impacts. This includes recognising that the status of some of the shark species believed to be involved in depredation are currently in recovery or listed as protected species.

Q. If I am staying for an extended stay in a static caravan




reminder that incidents of all nature can occur in our community at any time, so volunteers with all capabilitites are essential and needed by all groups.







If you call the Shark Bay Health Centre after hours you will be transferred through to Health Direct where a Registered Nurse will ask you a number of questions to determine whether you need further emergency assessment by the Shark Bay nurse. If you require further assessment, your call will be put through to the local nurse.

Examples of an EMERGENCY include:

- · Breathing difficulties
- Chest pain
- Severe abdominal pain
- Bleeding that can't be controlled with first aid
- Convulsions and fits
- Deep lacerations
- · Eye or ear injuries
- Uncontrolled high fever
- Loss of consciousness
- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour
- A very sick child
