Shire President's Report - April 2021

Annual Electors' Meeting

The AGM of electors took place at the Recreation Centre on 17 March with the local residents in attendance resolving that Council investigate the installation of signage which will restrict vehicle access to beaches within the Denham townsite area.

Beach Emergency Numbers Signage Program (BEN)

As advised several months ago, the State Government extended funding for the BEN signage program to be available to some local governments north of Geraldton, to add to those already installed in the South-West and Metro area. Council agreed at the March meeting to participate in this program in the Shark Bay area and to collaborate with local emergency services and Parks and Wildlife Service to identify which beach locations should have the signage installed. A coded sign which is installed in a highly visible location on a beach will pinpoint the beach so emergency services can respond urgently to the precise location in the event of an incident. A maximum of \$50,000 can be applied for by each eligible local government to implement the program.

Grant Funding

The Shire has applied for \$2.5m via the Building Better Regions Infrastructure Funding for the construction of 12 new aged care units to extend the current Herald Denham pensioner units and has also applied for a further \$20,000 from the Department of Communities to replace the current roofs.

Clean-up Australia Day

In early March, 43 local community members participated in the annual clean-up day – the largest number of volunteers for several years. Rubbish was collected

Upgrading of town TV Transmission

The town's TV transmission (for WIN, GWN and the TEN network) needs to be upgraded from an MPEG2 to an MPEG 4 system. This is a required upgrade to ensure the continuity of the service, but unfortunately many older TV's are not able to decode the MPEG4 signal, and so will not be able to receive pictures and/or sound once the upgrade is completed.

For those residents and visitors who do not want to buy a new TV, a set top box (cost between about \$40 - \$70 from most reputable electronics stores) should be sufficient to decode the upgraded signal.

To give everyone time to get ready for this change, the Shire has arranged to delay the upgrade of the system until 30 June 2021.

Maintenance dredging at Denham is planned to commence in late April to restore depths of navigation channels and ensure safe access to the Denham Maritime Facility.

The project will involve dredging approximately 20,000 cubic metres of sand from the basin and entrance channel over a period of 4 months.

The dredged material will be deposited on the beach north-west of the Denham Seaside Caravan Park. Sand deposited on the beach is likely to be naturally discoloured. However, it will bleach in the sun after placement and there will be no long-term impact.

Dredging works are permitted to occur Monday to Friday from 6am to 6pm, and on Saturdays from 6am to 4pm. No works will occur during the school holiday periods.

Skippers operating in the area and people accessing the beach should be aware of the special safety arrangements implemented for the dredging and sand replenishment works. During the pumping operation, sections of the beach may be temporarily closed to ensure public safety.

Marine Rescue Shark Bay was well prepared for the arrival of Tropical Cyclone Seroja. We used sandbags and plastic sheeting to stop water coming in under the roller doors at our shed and put Tamala Rose on our mooring with triple ropes. We came through unscathed but our Marine Rescue cousins in Kalbarri sustained extensive damage to their building and equipment from the wind and tidal surge. Water engulfed their office and storage shed to a depth of over a metre and they have a lot of work ahead to get their facility back to an operational state as well as dealing with their own personal losses and repairs.

We are looking forward to the Fishing Fiesta in May. Our new vessel will be on display to the public for the first time. We hope to have a set of platform stairs built by then so people can get a close look at a state of the art Rescue Vessel. Come down for a look and meet the volunteers who give up their time to help out on the water when things go wrong. We will also be conducting a flare display on the opening night of Fiesta. Bring the family and learn how to use your boats flares and see them in action.

There was a very unfortunate tragedy recently involving a vessel colliding with Ransonnet Rock at the south end of Dirk Hartog

Island. One person sustained critical injuries and another person was declared deceased at the scene. Marine Rescue volunteers assisted police in transporting the victims to the waiting Ambulance in Denham. Our thanks to all those who assisted on the night and our thoughts are with the friends and family of the victims.

Incidents such as this are a stark reminder to all of us that go boating that the ocean can be a very unforgiving playground and we must do all we can to ensure the safety of our vessel and passengers. Do as you do when in your car, drive to the conditions and stay alert. Keep watch at all times for potential hazards. Make sure your vessel and equipment are well maintained to ensure you have an enjoyable and trouble free day out on the water.

SES Shark Bay - Bye bye Seroja bye bye

Well, that was one cyclone we did not want to come to this town, wasn't it? The Shark Bay SES unit wishes to thank the community for their cooperation and responsiveness in the days leading up to the cyclones' passing us just to the South. We realize that a lot of the community and businesses were adversely affected by the warnings and evacuation orders that were imposed as a result of the State of Emergency that was declared for the Shires of Shark Bay, Northampton and Geraldton.

When we see what happened to Kalbarri, Northampton and other towns in the mid-west, one can realize just why those warnings and orders were put in place. With the cyclone travelling almost parallel to the coast, a small variation of a degree or two would have meant a difference of a few hundred kilometers difference in landfall. When it crossed the coast near Kalbarri, I believe the cyclone was rated at a high cat3 system with wind speeds in excess of 175kph which was a bit higher than what was forecast.

When a system becomes a Category 3 tropical cyclone it is reclassified as a Severe tropical cyclone and has wind speeds of 64-85 kn (74-98 mph; 119-157 km/h). A Category 4 severe tropical cyclone has winds of 86-110 kn (99-130 mph; 157-200 km/h).

It appears as if most of the community felt a greater need for preparedness as the unit gave out nearly 2,000 sand bags. This was almost three times the number people used during cyclone Olwyn.

After the wind had faded on the Sunday evening, our unit received a request for a team to travel to Kalbarri to assist with the storm damage there. We sent a team of four people down and they stayed there for 5 days. This was a great effort as they had already put in a few days work here in town in preparation for the cyclone.

The unit has had a "hot debrief" and have compiled a list of things done well as well as a list of things to do that would improve our performance next time. We are planning to hold a community debrief with a sausage sizzle to allow input from the community as well as allow a two-way flow of information. We feel that this will provide an opportunity to explain why certain actions and decisions were taken. We look forward to a good attendance as the DFES regional Superintendent has indicated that he would like to attend depending on commitments with the incident response. A tentative date has been indicated for sometime in the second week of May.

The members of the unit would like to acknowledge and thank those people that donated food and goodies for the volunteers to enjoy. A big thanks to Genni at Shark Bay Supermarket, Belle at the Café, Thelma at Bay Lodge and Fay Castling. We also wish to thank the great efforts of our fellow volunteers from Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service, Marine Rescue WA and St John's Ambulance.


The Firies assisted with the community response to requests for assistance on the Monday after the Shark Bay SES response team had left. They even assisted by

When to call the SES

The State Emergency Service (SES) is a volunteer division of the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES), Western Australia's leading Hazard Management Agency (HMA) for natural disasters. SES volunteers play a vital role in responding to natural disasters and emergencies on behalf of the community.

What is the SES telephone number? 132 500

Before you call the SES think about the following:

- The nature of your enquiry and whether the SES is appropriate for your needs
- Call triple zero (000) for fire and life threatening emergencies call
- Call 132 500 for urgent property repairs that you cannot fix yourself.

Due to the high level of demand during a natural disaster people need to remain patient and be prepared to wait.

- 1. Speak slowly and clearly.
- 2. Tell us exactly where to come.
- 3. All requests are prioritised by urgency.
- 4. Major structural damage will be attended to first.
- 5. Avoid clogging up emergency hotlines with unrelated requests.

What will the SES help me with?

- Assisting with significant structural damage like collapsed roofs or ceilings
- Making temporary emergency repairs to homes and buildings
- Removing fallen trees that have damaged homes and cars
- Sandbagging areas in danger of flooding
- Pumping out flood water
- Rescuing trapped or injured people, and helping people relocate if they are in danger

What won't the SES help me with?

- · Clearing debris and organising permanent repairs.
- Attending to broken fences, trees that have fallen on fences or if there is debris around your property or in your pool.
- Basic repairs that you can manage yourself.



NUGGETS NOTES

When I came here to Denham in the early 60's we were pretty isolated, any rain closed both the road and the airstrip. The then Flying Doctor Service had a few smaller planes and were often busy elsewhere. Stella Rowley, our resident nurse often had to cope, with no advice or assistance. I was working for Planet Fisheries when the management decided to build a large cool room using local labour. Part of the construction consisted of a double wall between which a mixture of chemicals was poured. It was supposed to set into an insulating foam. Trouble was no one told us that while setting it gave off lethal fumes. Very soon four workers were suffering flu like symptoms. Then Desy, the elderly foreman collapsed. Stella contacted Carnarvon by phone and was advised to get him to the Overlander where they would meet her with a doctor. They had further to come but had mostly bitumen. We had none. No ambulance either! The best vehicle available was Bill's, the Publicans new Ford Station Wagon. We loaded Desy on a mattress in the back, together with Stella and some make shift oxygen supply. I knocked up in the factory work shop, and Bill took off. Bill told us later that Desy's heart stopped twice on the way out and Stella managed to bring him back. The Carnarvon ambulance was waiting at the Overlander. They would not risk our road, but they got Desy to hospital in time. That was just one of the lives that Stella possibly saved. written by Nugget McClymans



"Hey, Mum! I made a sea turtle cupcake!! Buyungurra is the name for sea turtle! Sea turtles eat seagrass," said a child attending the inaugural Wirriya Jalyanu Seagrass Festival.

Shark Bay residents and visitors attended this family festival held on April 8th at Denham Town Hall. It was the closing celebration for a two-year collaboration between the Malgana Aboriginal Corporation and the University of Western Australia supported through the Australian Government's National

Environmental Science Program (NESP), where a seagrass restoration program was developed in response to the 2011 marine heat wave.

Seagrass is an important element of the Shark Bay World Heritage Site. Meadows formed by several species of these flowering plants make up habitat for dugongs (wuthuga), turtles (buyungurra), and fish (djiljit).

The festival organisers aimed to promote greater understanding about the seagrass ecosystem with

activities based on topics in marine science and Malgana language, together with archaeology, cooking, visual art, dance, and land management.

Well attended public science talks were held in the Town Hall on Wednesday, 7th of April and provided a context for the festival events the following day. The three presenters spoke passionately about their research. UWA's Prof Gary Kendrick spoke about seagrass ecosystems: the foundation of Shark Bay's fragile marine environment and the impacts

of heat waves. Malgana woman and artist Bianca McNeair spoke about turtle tagging fieldwork with Malgana women on Wirruwanna (Dirk Hartog Island), and UWA researcher Dr Ana Sequeira spoke about tracking the movements of turtles and dugongs, showing us just how far these animals can travel.

The festival was formally opened by Auntie Ada Fossa who welcomed all to Malgana Country, assisted by daughter, Patricia Oakley. Together with Amrit Kendrick as MC, Patricia lead the festival committee along with Dr Elizabeth Sinclair (UWA), Michelle Judd (Bush Heritage) and other key volunteers.

The Malgana language workshop for children was the first festival event. They learned to count and say the names of animals that live in the seagrass habitats. Kym Oakley and Kelly Osborne taught the words for turtle, mullet (mulgarda), shark (thaaka), dolphin (yinabuga) and dugong (wuthuga). The kids enjoyed colouring in the marine creatures. Their artwork

will be part of an upcoming dual language children's book in Malgana and English.

The Festival atmosphere was heralded by bright colourful banners of turtles and dugongs previously created by the Shark Bay Arts Council. They also facilitated a community glassmosaic artwork. The 1500mm x 750mm creation was unveiled at the festival. Twenty members attended innovative skilldevelopment workshops as a remote learning class

"The festival was a great mix of science, education, art, and creativity. There were many engaging stalls and presenters that brought wirriya jalyanu to the forefront. It was great to learn about a part of our country that we all take for granted and to see how locals are protecting and preserving this resource."

distributed between Denham, Carnarvon and Perth. Glass artists Sally Capewell and Sabrina Dowling Giudici facilitated the local workshops via Zoom with Shayne Thomson. 18 panels were patchworked into a large installation, featuring recycled glass. A permanent public viewing location is being sought for this mosaic artwork.

The festival introduced artwork of emerging local Indigenous artist, Tiahna Oxenham. Her 'Seagrass Seeds' artwork is featured in visual material representing the festival. Other artists who displayed seacountry inspired artworks were Nadje Roelefs (felting), Kelly Osborne (jewellery), Sally Capewell (basketry) and Marta Sánchez Alarcón (mandalas), along with some great art and

Seagrass information displays were staffed by Malgana Rangers Sean McNeair, Richard Cross, and Alex Dodd, together with UWA researchers Prof Gary Kendrick, Dr Elizabeth Sinclair, Dr John Statton and Dr Marion Cambridge, and DBCA staff Dr Simone Strydom, Kieran Cross, Dr Kathy Murray, and Marta Espinheira. They were kept busy sharing their knowledge about seagrasses, the impacts on them, identifying different species, and restoration methods.

Les Oakley from 2 Deadly Food & Fitness introduced festival goers to native bush foods. His cooking demonstration was well received as participants young and old made their own

damper. Jade Pervan further delighted the festival children with archaeology activities.

Land management activities were led by Bush Heritage land managers, Michelle and Ken Judd from Hamelin Station. A mock pitfall trap was set up, so budding ecologists could learn how to trap and measure a toy goanna.

UPDATES FROM DIRK HARTOG ISLAND NATIONAL PARK



Good summer rains have drenched Dirk Hartog Island with life giving moisture and as winter approaches, the need for weed management is vital. The Return to 1616 Ecological Restoration Project on Dirk Hartog Island National Park is joined by a team to help out. Good news on dibblers in this issue and lots of 'behind the scenes' work is being done to safeguard greater stick-nest rats on their upcoming, oneway, all expenses paid, trip to the island.

Caught on candid camera

Over the past year and a half, 57 dibblers bred at Perth Zoo have been reintroduced to Dirk Hartog Island by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA). Dibblers are listed as Endangered on the national threatened species list and are the fourth species to be translocated as part of the Return to 1616 Ecological Restoration Project.


Keeping track of small numbers of these tiny carnivores is challenging, and the installation of motion sensing cameras has proven valuable. Can you see the dibbler in the bottom right of the photo below? It has been attracted to a lure that contains a bait specially formulated to attract small animals.



This photo taken by Jan Barrle was captured near their release site nearly nine months after their release and caused great excitement amongst the DBCA team as it was the first remote camera image of dibblers to be found since their reintroduction.

More translocations are planned in the future in order to boost population

numbers, so stay tuned for more dibbler news!



Global Gypsy donation

Over the past few years, tour operator Global Gypsy Tours has been involved with science safaris to Dirk Hartog Island National Park. Their 'gypsy' clients have been involved over recent years with a range of island conservation activities including assisting the DBCA scientists in their program to monitor small vertebrate animals such as native mice, skinks and geckoes. Global Gypsy Tours directors Jeremy Perks and Jan Barrie say their clients love being able to conserve WA's precious wildlife.

But their commitment to conservation doesn't stop there. The Global Gypsies recently donated \$1,000 worth of equipment to Perth Zoo to assist with the dibbler breeding program for the Return to 1616 ecological restoration project.

Dibblers are currently being bred at Perth Zoo and scheduled to make their one-way flight to Dirk Hartog Island National Park later this year, to join dibblers previously bred at Perth Zoo and reintroduced in 2019 and 2020.

Space Invaders

Dirk Hartog Island National Park in spring can be beautiful, but good rainfall in 2020 produced an above average and stunning wildflower season. Good rainfall however, is a double-edged sword. It also supports weeds.

Native animals in the national park are dependent on native plants for their food and shelter. Over the last 150 years, weeds have become established and spread on the island. They are the ultimate "space invaders", threatening the ecosystem by proliferating out of all proportion and leaving no room for native plants.

In 2012 a baseline weed survey was conducted on the island. From this study, weed species were identified and prioritised to help create a strategy for managing weeds. You've heard the saying "one year's seed is seven year's weeds"? Well for the long-lived seed of lupins, it's twenty years. Ignore them for just one year and you'll have weeds

for another 20. These are the sorts of weeds that need to be prioritised.

Nine of the most important weeds were singled out as a top priority. Of these, six were targeted for eradication and include lupins, Japanese pepper, wild radish, castor oil, couch and ruby dock. Two weeds, ice plant and false sow thistle, were marked for ongoing control in designated 'weed management areas'.

But management of existing weeds is one thing, detecting and preventing the introduction of new weed species is another extremely important part of the war on weeds. Sites that receive a lot of visitors such as campsites and 'day use' areas are at high risk of weedy invaders that can "hitch a ride" on cars, in clothing and camping equipment. These are designated 'weed surveillance areas' and monitored regularly for new weeds.

Given the abundance of weeds, and the size of the island, this is a huge job and in 2020, Shark Bay's local Malgana Land and Sea Rangers with coordinator Sean McNair joined the battle to protect the island. They teamed up with DBCA's Brad Lyons from Denham and staff members from Swan Coastal District who made the journey to share their weed management knowledge. Together the team worked on removing weeds such as castor oil plants and lupins, as well as spraying and monitoring for new weeds that may be introduced such as golden crownbeard (Verbesina encelioides). This highly invasive weed has become common in other areas and is now in Denham.

To safeguard the flora and fauna of Dirk Hartog Island National Park, the Malgana Ranger team plans to continue weed management into the future in partnership with DBCA. Weed management can be a hard job and to be successful it needs the coordinated efforts of DBCA, Malgana Rangers and all island visitors. Support the weed busting team and follow the island protection brochure information when preparing for your next island adventure.

Tricky stickies

Greater stick-nest rats or "stickies" are a native rodent that was once widespread across south and western arid Australia. As their name suggests, stickies have a predilection for building houses out of sticks for shelter from predators and the environment. Although there were originally two species of stick-nest rats, only the greater stick-nest rat has survived and as a result of introduced animals such as feral cats and grazing animals, their continued existence is tenuous at best. They persist only on offshore islands or fenced enclosures on the mainland. Dirk Hartog Island National Park is large and free of feral predators and offers a lifeline for these unique native rats providing the perfect opportunity to significantly increase their numbers.

Their reintroduction is planned for May and there is a mountain of "behind the scenes" work currently being undertaken to support their journey and ensure its success.

To allow scientists to monitor their progress in their new environment some of the newly introduced 'stickies' need to wear radio collars for a period of time. Unlike buying "off the rack" clothing in your local shopping centre, fitting a collar to a sticky is tricky business. Collars need to be specially designed and tested in a safe environment. A snug fitting collar is important to the welfare of the animals and can make a huge difference to how well collars stay in place and provide the vital information on how well they're adjusting to their new home.

The collar trial began with an upgrade to enclosures at the Peron Homestead late last year. The newly renovated "sticky suite" was provided with all they could want, including a deep sandy floor and lots of sticks and vegetation of various sizes. A pair of "Adam and Eve" stickies were then caught and transported from Salutation island to the stick-nest rat homestead "Hilton". Impressed with their new abode, both were soon rearranging their furniture (sticks) to begin the job of building a new nest. To ensure the stickies are kept in the very best of health over this radio collar trial period, they must be tended seven days a week, rain, hail or shine for months. Twice daily 'room service' provides them with fresh food consisting of browsing plants, seeds, fruits and vegetables as well as shelter and nest building material. Old food and droppings are cleaned out daily. This is a labour of love that has been welcomed by Parks and Wildlife staff in Denham to help ensure their island relocation is successful.

Once the radio collar trial is complete, our "Adam and Eve"

will join other recruits from Salutation Island in late May for their island escape. They'll be accompanied by piles of sticks and woody debris or 'proto-nests' to build their new homes to ensure they have the best start in their new life on Dirk Hartog Island National Park.

A sign of things to come?

This bush stone-curlew (Burhinus grallarius) seemed in a mood for a photo shoot and its sighting was an early Christmas present for DBCA staff last December on Dirk Hartog Island National Park. Scattered records of bush stone-curlews on the island date back about 100 years and although this is only a single occurrence, more and more sightings of ground dwelling birds are being noticed by DBCA staff and anecdotal evidence is mounting to suggest their numbers are on the rise.

Populations of bush stone-curlews on the mainland continue to decline and their distribution has continued to shrink. Whilst there were no systematic bird surveys prior to the introduction of feral cats on Dirk Hartog Island, there is evidence to suggest that bird species nesting on or near to the ground are harmed by feral cats. The national park provides them with the perfect feral predator free environment and the vegetation regrowth following removal of goats and sheep has provided more habitat, shelter and food.

There are many factors that can contribute to increased sightings of ground dwelling birds, such as the flourishing vegetation that follows good rainfall, so it's still early days. However, increasing sightings of ground dwelling birds are an exciting change and may be a sign of their recovery as a result of the Return to 1616 Ecological Restoration Project.

5. Donations


The Shed welcomes donations of useful items such as tools and equipment. The Shed is not happy to be a repository of items which have no further use and should have been taken to the tip.


The Friendly Hub

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

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

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

If you call the Shark Bay Health Centre after hours you will be transferred through to Health Direct where a Registered Nurse will ask you a number of questions to determine whether you need further emergency assessment by the Shark Bay nurse. If you require further assessment, your call will be put through to the local nurse.

Examples of an EMERGENCY include:

- · Breathing difficulties
- Chest pain
- Severe abdominal pain
- Bleeding that can't be controlled with first aid
- Convulsions and fits
- Deep lacerations
- · Eye or ear injuries
- · Uncontrolled high fever
- Loss of consciousness
- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour
