





Marine Rescue Shark Bay

Several calls for assistance were answered by Marine Rescue Shark Bay volunteers during September. All jobs resulted in successful outcomes with broken down boats and their occupants returned safely to Denham.

Five of our members attended the annual Department of Fire and Emergency Services conference at the Crown entertainment complex in Perth which was held earlier in the month. These events are a great opportunity to meet other volunteers from around the state as well as attending various workshops and talks by keynote speakers.

One of the highlights was a tour of Stirling Naval Base on Garden Island. Navy personnel demonstrated their firefighting techniques on a helicopter wreck and inside a replica ship hull before sending the volunteers into the ship to try and stop it sinking as they flooded it with seawater.

The gala ball and awards ceremony on the Saturday night was attended by about 600 volunteer and career emergency service members. Albany Marine Rescue was awarded

the prestigious Outstanding Group Achievement Award for locating and rescuing a fisherman who spent two hours in the water after being washed off rocks.



Several of our members are going to Geraldton this month to take part in a weekend Sea Survival course. All travel, accommodation and meal costs are covered by DFES when volunteers leave home to attend training.

Our group AGM will be held at 5.30 pm on the 30th of October in the groups shed with a bbq to follow. Everyone is welcome to attend. Come along if you would like to get involved and meet the members. No special skills are required as we have training pathways in place that cover all the requirements for people to become fully qualified Marine Rescue Skippers. Shark Bay Bowling Club Carnival 2021



Conservation Matters

The Dirk Hartog Island National Park Return to 1616 Ecological Restoration Project plans to re-establish 13 native animal species to the island. Three threatened species including the banded and rufous hare-wallabies and the Shark Bay bandicoot have now established populations on the island and work is currently being done to repopulate the island with another three threatened animal species. These include the greater stick-nest rat, Shark Bay mouse and dibbler which brings the tally to six native animal species. The Return to 1616 project has been celebrating this milestone over the last few months with the Biodiversity Festival 2021 including lots of fun activities for everyone.

The festival began in May with the Celebrate Shark Bay Photographic Competition. The competition commemorated the 30th Anniversary of Shark Bay's World Heritage Area listing and the contribution made to biodiversity by the Return to 1616 project.

Next "cab off the rank" after the photo competition was free art classes with renowned artist Angela Rossen who was engaged to provide workshops for the Denham community focussing on the biodiversity of Dirk Hartog Island National Park.

The Shark Bay school children worked on individual artwork pieces as well as producing their "piece de resistance" a magnificent tryptic artwork in three pieces depicting the biodiversity of Dirk Hartog Island National Park.

Coral Coast Vets - Snake Aware

With the arrival of Summer shortly comes snakes! They are on the move already and are full of venom as they haven't bitten since hibernation. Please be aware that a baby snake is no less venomous than an adult snake and should be treated with the same respect and care.


The dugite, gwarder and tiger snakes are found in the Gascoyne region. All of these snakes are particulary venomous.

What can we do to protect our pets? Unfortunately, a snake in a dog or cats eyes are especially fun to play with or hunt. Chasing or playing with a snake massively increases their chances of being bitten at least once and often more than once as the snake defends itself. If you find your pet playing with a snake, try and call your pet away or scare the snake away. Please make sure you are not putting yourself in danger. If your pet has killed the snake (and you are 100% sure it is dead), quickly get your dog or cat and the very dead snake into the car and start driving to the vet. Call the vet on the way to let them know you have a possible snake bite victim in the car on the way in. Try to keep your pet as still as possible, this slows the venom moving through the body.

Even if your pet hasn't been bitten it is best for them to be observed closely for a few hours after a possible bite so that treatment can be started a soon as possible. Rapid treatment greatly increases your pets chance of survival around 80%. With no treatment death is definite for dogs and highly likely for cats. Identifying the snake helps us chose the correct antivenom to treat your pet. There are tests we can do to identify the snake so it's not the end of the world if the snake doesn't make it to the hospital.

Depending on where the location of the bite is, how active your pet is after the bite and when the snake last bit will depend on how quickly your pet will start show signs of envenomation. The commonly seen signs are:

- Excessive salivation
- Dilated pupils

- Weakness or collapse of the back end that gradually worsens until animal is paralysed
- Vomiting
- Shaking or muscle twitching
- Blood in the urine

A snakes venom rapidly travels around the body causing damage to the nervous system and vital organs. It also affects clotting of the blood which can cause bleeding that cannot be controlled. Treatment is intensive with around the clock care.

To reduce the chances of snakes visiting your yard:

- Solid fences like colourbond make it difficult for snakes to get in
- Keep your grass short
- Sensible gardens. Don' let your garden get overgrown or provide hiding places for snakes and
- Rodent baits snakes hunt for rodents so make sure you keep these under control. Be careful to place baits where your pet cannot get to them or use traps.
- Limit access to water. Snakes are attracted to water sources especially during the dry times.

Please also remember that snakes live in sand dunes at the beach and have even been seen under seaweed. Keep your dogs down on the beach and discourage them from running through the dunes.

It is important to to know that a snake bite is not a death sentence. They are worth treating and your pet could go on to a long and fun filled life.

We have saved snake bite victims that have travelled to Carnarvon for treatment in the past. It is important that you call Coral Coast Vets (9941 1555) before leaving town so as we can advise you as to how to best prepare your pet for travel.

The DRSABCD Action Plan is the first step when providing first aid. Use this to assess the immediate situation. DOWNLOAD THE DRSABCD FACT SHEET.

All known or suspected snake bites must be treated as potentially life-threatening, and medical aid should be sought urgently.

WARNING

Do not wash venom off the skin or clothes because it may assist identification.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Signs of a snake bite are not always visible and, in some cases, the patient may not have felt anything. Symptoms may not appear for an hour or more after the person has been bitten.

Depending on the type of snake, signs and symptoms may include some or all of the following:

- immediate or delayed pain at the bite site
- swelling, bruising or local bleeding
- bite marks (usually on a limb) that may vary from obvious puncture wounds to scratches that may be almost invisible
- swollen and tender glands in the groin or armpit of the bitten limb
- faintness, dizziness
- nausea and vomiting
- headache
- abdominal pain
- oozing of blood from the bite site or gums
- double or blurred vision
- drooping eyelids
- difficulty in speaking or swallowing
- limb weakness or paralysis
- difficulty in breathing
- occasionally, initial collapse or confusion followed by partial or complete recovery.

WHAT TO DO

- 1 Follow DRSABCD.
- 2 Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3 Lie the patient down and ask them to keep still.
- **4** Reassure the patient.
- 5 Apply a pressure bandage as soon as possible:
 - if on a limb, apply a broad pressure bandage (crepe preferred) over the bite site (90% of snake bites occur on a limb)
 - apply a firm crepe or elasticised roller bandage (10–15 centimetres wide), starting just above the fingers or toes and moving upwards on the bitten limb as far as can be reached. Use clothing or other material if a roller bandage is not available
 - apply the bandage as tightly as possible to the limb.
- 6 Immobilise the bandaged limb using splints.
- 7 Keep the patient lying down and completely still.
- 8 Write down the time of the bite and when the bandage was applied. If possible, mark the location of the bite site (if known) on the skin with a pen, or photograph the site.
- **9** Stay with the patient until medical aid arrives.








Purple Bra Day 2021

IT IS ALMOST CHRISTMAS AND CYCLONE SEASON

It is hard to believe, but there are only a dozen or so weekends until Christmas, and then we can get our fix of hot cross buns on Boxing day. However, before then I hope that everyone has done your usual this time of year cyclone preparations or at least have thought about getting around to it.

Each year we suggest that all residents do an assessment of their dwellings to make sure that there are no corroded rafter brackets or loose roofing sheets to ensure that you have the best possible chance of minimising any damage that may happen. Whilst you are in the cyclone preparation mode, it is wise to put some thought into starting to prepare your survival kit.

We suggest that you;

- Check your insurance cover, is it adequate and will it cover any repairs or replacement bearing in mind today costs?
- Have you made plans for your pets, where will you house them during any red alert?
- Do you know where your important documents are and are they in a safe and waterproof place?
- Secure a supply of your prescription medicine?
- How about stocking up on some water and long life or canned foods
- Do you have anything to keep you and your family amused if the power is cut? (no screen time or flat devices)
- Do you have any back up power for your phone?
- DFES suggests that you consider having a battery powered radio so you can listen to the latest information about the cyclone if the power does go out
- Don't forget the outdoor furniture and kids play equipment, those items need to be stored inside or secured to prevent them becoming deadly flying objects.

Seroja was not all that long ago and is still in our thoughts. There were many good lessons that were learnt from that little breeze, our community responded well to that threat and people took responsibility to prepare their homes just in case. Our SES unit will continue to assist the community prepare for any threat and will keep everyone informed when a threat appears.

Since Seroja, the Shire has been fortunate to obtain funding for some fixed satellite broadband facilities to enable communication with the outside world at least for our emergency services in the event of another communication blackout.

OTHER MORE ENJOYABLE HAPPENINGS

Three of our SES members attended the annual Fire and Emergency Services conference early in September. Our members participated in several workshops pre conference that dealt with topics such as preparing the community response to incidents and improving resilience, using social media to advantage and improving communication skills. As well they listened to several interesting keynote speakers and forums before dealing with more mundane things like the implications of the OH&S legislation will have on volunteers. On the Saturday, members attended the annual awards

presentation dinner when volunteers were recognized for their achievements. One of our newest members Sherry commented "WAFES Conference was clearly well planned and coordinated. As a first time participant as a SES volunteer, it was so refreshing to meet so many wonderful people and see the WA crew acknowledged for their great achievements.

It was a great opportunity to learn more about all the important work done by both the SES and WAFES together."

WHAT DO YOU GET FROM BEEN AN EMERGENCY S E R V I C E S VOLUNTEER?



Well often it is a lot of grief and inconvenience, having to deal with inductions and continual training as well as the inevitable call outs at the most inconvenient times. Having to miss planned family events because someone out there needs your assistance. Yes, it can be hot or cold, wet and windy, day or night when you are asked to respond to a call for assistance. BUT you know that someone out there NEEDS you.

Every now and then, the people we assist make a "connection" that lasts. Sure, people offer their thanks at the time and then mostly go on their way back to their life. Seven years ago, on the 27th September the emergency services in Denham were called to assist a group of people that were fishing south of Steep Point. 5 were washed off the cliff ledge they were fishing from and ended up in the water. The marine rescue group, the SES unit, Police and Parks and Wildlife were involved in the search and rescue effort as was St Johns volunteers. Four of the five people were rescued and the other was never found. Each year since, the people that survived have contacted me to say, "Thanks for giving them another chance at life." This year is no exception, their message is below.

CATCH AND RELEASE ESSENTIAL PRACTICES

1. KEEP ON POINT

Barbless and circle hooks drastically decrease the damage caused to the fish and increase its chance of survival.



2. AVOID EXHAUSTION

Fish can die from over-exhaustion, so reduce the fight-time by using an appropriately sized line class and release them in a stronger condition.



3. PROTECT THE SLIME

The slimy coating found on fish is its main deterrent against infection and disease. Removing this coating can leave a fish susceptible to infection. Use wet hands, or wet gloves when handling fish to prevent the loss of its protective slime.

4. HANDS OFF EYES AND GILLS

Keep fingers and hands clear of fish eyes and gills. Fish gills contain fragile blood vessels which are easily damaged by human hands.



5. USE THE RIGHT TOOLS FOR THE JOB

Tangle-free rubber nets are best used to reduce the damage done to a fish's body.

When billfishing, using a 'snooter' to loop the fish's bill will help maintain safe control of it while removing the hooks, taking photos and reviving the fish.



6. SNAP YOUR CATCH SAFELY

Billfish should not be removed from the water for a photo. It is difficult to support their large bodies out of the water and it can cause fatal damage to a billfish's organs and skeletal structures. Use a 'selfie stick' for great photos, while keeping the fish in the water and minimising the stress on the fish.



7. SWIM, REVIVE, RELEASE THEM ALIVE

Revive the fish by swimming it next to the boat white in gear to keep water flowing over its gills. Release weights give fish with barotrauma the best chance of survival.





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

After Hours Emergencies

EMERGENCY

If you call the Shark Bay Health Centre after hours you will be transferred through to Health Direct where a Registered Nurse will ask you a number of questions to determine whether you need further emergency assessment by the Shark Bay nurse. If you require further assessment, your call will be put through to the local nurse.

Examples of an EMERGENCY include:

- · Breathing difficulties
- Chest pain
- Severe abdominal pain
- Bleeding that can't be controlled with first aid
- · Convulsions and fits
- Deep lacerations
- Eye or ear injuries
- · Uncontrolled high fever
- Loss of consciousness
- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour
- · A very sick child

Inscription Post

Super choice rules will change from 1 November

You'll have an extra step to take if you have new employees who start from 1 November 2021 and they don't choose a super fund.

You may now need to request their 'stapled super fund' details from us.

A stapled super fund is an existing super account of an employee that follows them as they change jobs.

This change aims to stop your new employees paying extra account fees for unintended super accounts set up when they start a new job.

What you need to know

You may need to request stapled super fund details when:

- your new employee starts on or after 1 November 2021
- you need to make super guarantee payments for that employee, and
- your employee is eligible to choose a super fund but doesn't

You may still need to request stapled super fund details for some employees even though you don't need to offer them a choice of super fund. This includes if your employees are temporary residents or they're covered by an Enterprise Agreement or Workplace Determination made before 1 January 2021.

You and your representatives can request stapled super fund details for your employees if you have full access to Online services for business. You need to review and update these accesses to protect the privacy and safety of your employees' personal information.

You must meet your choice of super fund requirements and any stapled super fund obligations by the quarterly due date or you may face penalties.

What you need to do from 1 November 2021

Step 1: Offer your eligible employees a choice of super fund

You need to give your eligible new employees a Super standard choice form and pay their super into the account they tell you on the form. Most employees are eligible to choose what fund their super goes into.

There is no change to this step of your super obligations.

Step 2: Request stapled super fund details

If your employee doesn't choose a super fund, you may need to log into our Online services and go to 'Employee Super Accounts' to request their stapled super fund details. Your agent or other tax professional can do this for you.

We will provide your employee's stapled super fund details after we have confirmed that you are their employer.

If we provide a stapled super fund result for your employee, you must pay your employee's super using the stapled super fund details we provide you.

Step 3: Pay super into a default fund

You can pay into a default fund, or another fund that meets the choice of fund obligations if:

- your employee doesn't choose a super fund, and
- we have advised you that they don't have a stapled super fund.
