## **Executive Officer's Report**







Keeping up with the cost of living

Times are tough for many Western Australians right now, so lots of households will be looking at ways to manage their rising living costs and keep on top of bills.

To help consumers manage their living expenses, the Australian Securities and Investment Commission's (ASIC) Moneysmart service has developed a cost of living 'hub' on its website.

The hub contains information to help consumers make a plan, including how to prepare a budget to track where money is spent, prioritise what matters most and identify any expenses that can be reduced.

With interest rates on the rise, some consumers may be concerned about meeting their mortgage repayments. Taking action straight away can stop a small problem from becoming a big one, so these consumers are urged to talk to their lender as soon as possible. The hub talks through the steps to apply for a financial hardship variation, which may involve changing the loan's terms, or temporarily pausing or reducing repayments.

Financial hardship assistance may also be available for those struggling to pay their rent, utility bills, credit cards, loans and insurance premiums, so these consumers are also advised to contact their providers sooner rather than later to discuss possible options.

Further advice is provided on how consumers can save for an emergency fund to cover urgent or unexpected costs for things like car repairs, unexpected travel or an urgent medical bill.

For those living on a low income, the hub provides guidance on what financial support is available, as well as exploring practical ways to manage costs, such as automating regular bill payments and paying large bills in smaller instalments.



Consumers needing help to get debt under control and their finances back on track can talk to a financial counsellor, who can help prioritise bills and repayments. The National Debt Helpline provides a free,

confidential financial counselling service on 1800 007 007.

There is also advice on where to turn in a crisis for help with food, housing, bills and emergency support, plus a reminder that help is available via Beyond Blue on 1300 22 46 36 if financial stress is impacting on mental health. 

# BAITING TO PROTECT NATIVE WILDLIFE


Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's Western Shield program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.


The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.

## Astrotourism WA

A Total Eclipse of the Moon! Coming to Your Skies 8th November!

For natural cosmic phenomena, you don't get more remarkable than a Total Lunar Eclipse! A total lunar eclipse occurs, when the Sun and Moon are perfectly aligned in their orbits, with the Earth in the middle. As the Moon travels around the far side of the Earth, it passes directly into the shadow of the Earth.

### Why does the Moon turn Red?

To add to the magic of it all, the Moon turns a copperyred during a total eclipse, earning it the nickname of 'Blood Moon'. As the Moon passes into the full shadow of the Earth, called the umbra, the Sun's light passes through the atmosphere of our planet and is scattered, losing most of the blue light. This means that the light that reaches the lunar surface is predominantly red in colour. This effect is known as Rayleigh Scattering and this is also how our sunsets are created.

When to look?

From 7.00pm to 8.50pm, 8<sup>th</sup> of November.

Which direction to look?

In WA, the Moon will rise, mid-eclipse, starting low in the eastern horizon.

Enjoy the magical transformation of the bright full Moon into a slowly darkening coppery ball, hanging mysteriously in space.

Another colourful grouping occurs on the 11th of November

Mars will be forming an Orange Triangle with two red super giant stars, Betelgeuse and Aldebaran. The Moon lies right next to Mars, adding to this special spectacle.

When to look? After 10pm, on the 11<sup>th</sup> of November.

Which direction to look? North-east.

## Shire President's Report

### Shark Bay World Heritage Discovery Centre

The number of visitors through the Discovery Centre during the month of September was consistent with the peak WA travel period when State borders were closed due to Covid restrictions, despite the Centre being closed for three Sundays due to staff shortages.

On the 29th September, there were 587 visitors recorded – the highest daily amount of the calendar year so far, with a total of 53,607 visitors to date.

### **Dugong Interactive Zone**

The Centre's new permanent display, located in the World Heritage area of the displays within the complex, has been finalised and is now open. Installation of this attraction was a collaborative project with Hungry Sky software developers and was supported by a Lotterywest funding grant.

### Beats in the Bay Festival

This inaugural festival was held on Saturday1st October on the Denham Foreshore, with around 1,500 people attending during the course of the event. Positive comments have been received from local residents, business owners and tourists for all the varied forms of entertainment and age groups which were catered for. As a new event, there were some lessons to be learnt, which will be incorporated into next year's festival. If you have constructive feedback regarding next year's event, contact Ash at the Shire office.

### **Grant Funded Projects**

Work is continuing on the following local community programs;

- Installation of Beach Emergency Numbers (BEN) signage
- Installation of hard shade shelters in the foreshore adventure park
- Matting and beach wheelchairs
   accessibility to town beach area
- New reticulation and resurfaced lawn areas - town oval and foreshore
- Installation of additional solar streetlights and CCTV cameras.

Funding has been confirmed for the projects below;

- \$25,000 Department of Communities for Child Care staff accommodation
- \$70,000 Department of Transport for dual use pathway along Stella Rowley Drive
- \$2.35m Coastal Risk Management - upgrade/extend Denham foreshore seawall.

## **Shark Bay School News**

Public School Review Report

We have received our 2022 Public School Review Report which validates our ongoing commitment to excellence and continual improvement. Key findings:



The school recognizes the value of establishing strong connections from Kindergarten to secondary education programs. It pays particular attention to the interests and values of the local community. Staff, students, parents and community partners participated in conversations throughout the validation visit. Students impressed with their knowledge and understanding of what makes a good school. Students value the care shown by staff. The school builds relationships with external and allied agencies providing a rich vein of extra-curricular experiences. There is deep and profound respect for local Aboriginal culture and history which permeates all levels of school activity.

There are strong overtones of student care, inclusion and acceptance of difference demonstrated by staff and students. A comprehensive school behaviour policy, in combination with a restorative 'script', underscore the calm and respectful relationships that have been generated between staff and students. There is clear evidence of professionally trusting relationships modelled by the Principal. This builds collegiate and collaborative interactions between staff, who are united in their efforts for ongoing school improvement and success. The school has effective processes to ensure that expenditure is responsive to the needs of students. The high quality building infrastructure has been carefully managed to ensure there is a strong sense of belonging and care for students.

Pedagogical change has been progressively introduced in a timely and strategic manner. This ensures staff can adapt their teaching practices to deliver coherent curriculum content, underpinned by a healthy regard for the impact of data. There is robust analysis and reflection of data, resulting in targeted interventions across all year levels. Individual student data profiles create valuable student monitoring and transition planning from year to year.

### **National Quality Standard**

In addition to the Public School Review Process, schools are assessed with regard to their Early Years services under the National Quality System (NQS). Shark Bay School has completed the audit process and welcomed visiting reviewers on Wednesday 26th October.

### National School Opinion Survey (NSOS)

Another aspect of our school's self-reflection and continual aspiration to improve is the NSOS, which we run annually. Unfortunately, the response rate this year was quite low, restricting meaningful data analysis, but the parental feedback that was received, was very positive and encouraging of the school's efforts. We thank everyone who participated, and ideas and suggestions will be used to add value to planning. Many thanks to all the staff, Council and P&C members and parents who contributed to our school assessment and improvement processes this year.

Midwest Region Recognition of Excellence 2022

Our staff team was pleased to nominate Miss Hanna Parsons, our full-time Early Years teacher, for recognition of excellence to be published in the Midwest Times. Hanna's colleagues recognize that., as the only full-time team member in our wonderful but complex Early Years block, Hanna's role extends

beyond teaching to coordinating and leading planning with colleagues, professionals visiting and parents to optimize support for students and to leading the team's reflective practice improvement. Hanna seems to thrive on being busy and we all





appreciate her tremendous professionalism and dedication to the students. 'Caring' about both student achievement and well-being is recognized as a strength in our school and Hanna is a wonderful example of that commitment in our staff. Thank you, Hanna, and congratulations!

However, on behalf of the Shark Bay community we extend a warm hearted welcome to our new police officer Deb, who has come to us from her Exmouth posting.




## Fisheries WA

Over the holiday period the Denham team issued six infringement notices ranging from \$200 to \$500 for offences relating to the possession of undersize blackspot tusk fish, undersize pink snapper, undersize tarwhine and excess bag limit of school mackerel and mud whelk shells as well as three written warnings for undersize blue swimmer crabs, undersize tarwhine and lobsters that had the head removed. This is a good time to remind fishers to take care to release undersize fish immediately with as little harm as possible and to be familiar with the fishing rules before going fishing.

On Friday the 7<sup>th</sup> of October Fisheries Officers from Denham and Carnarvon teamed up to conduct a roadside checkpoint at Overlander Roadhouse which intercepted travellers travelling from Shark Bay, Carnarvon, Coral Bay, Exmouth and the Pilbara. During this operation Fisheries Officers spoke to 675 travellers and inspected over 40 vessels that were heading south. A focus of this operation was to verify fin fish possession limits and we were pleased to see all travellers were abiding by the possession limit rules on this day. However, one infringement was issued for undersize tusk fish and a warning issued for lobsters with the head removed that were identified as a result of the roadside checkpoint.

### Into balloon fishing?

The new Environmental Protection (Prohibited Plastics and Balloons) Regulations 2018 state that it is an offence to release a balloon into the air.



This new regulation aims to prevent plastics from entering

the environment where they can be ingested by wildlife, break down into microplastics, and pollute our land and waterways.

Although balloon fishing is not illegal, the regulations will apply if the balloon is released either intentionally, by cutting it loose, or otherwise and the balloon tie to the main line breaks.

### Report wrong practices

Seen someone try to flog recreationally caught crays on Facebook Marketplace? Dumping Nemo in the local river? Thinking bag limits are just a suggestion?

For those who follow the rules to ensure we have fish for the future, there's nothing more frustrating than seeing someone engaging in selfish and illegal behaviour.

This can include exceeding bag or possession limits, fishing in closed areas, using excessive amounts of gear or using illegal nets.

You can now report illegal fishers to our compliance officers, direct from your favourite fishing spot, using @ CrimeStoppers online.

Past reports made to FishWatch have resulted in successful apprehensions, so by reporting to FishWatch you're helping to protect our valuable fisheries and aquatic resources.

Please note car and boat regos as well as dates, times and locations and provide specific details on what you saw.

## Cancer Council WA

### National Cervical Screening Program (NCSP)

As of 1st July 2022, all women, and people with a cervix under the National Cervical Screening Program (NCSP) can collect their own sample for cervical screening. The change gives participants a choice in screening method – either clinician-collected or self-collected. Universal access to self-collection has the potential to mitigate some of the cultural and personal barriers that may discourage some people from screening.

There are now two options for your Cervical Screening Test.

You can now choose to:



Collect your own sample; or

 Have a healthcare provider collect your sample.

Discuss your cervical screening options with a healthcare provider.

October was Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Women spend so much time looking after others that we forget about ourselves. Make sure you look out for breast cancer symptoms to be around longer for your family.

In 2019, 1,890 females in WA were diagnosed with breast cancer, accounting for almost a third of all female cancer cases, and sadly 252 women in WA died from the disease.

Everyone's breasts are different. It is important that you get to know what your breasts look and feel like. If you notice pain or discomfort, a lump or hard area in your breast or underarm, or a change in the breast's size, shape, look or feel, it's important to tell your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker straight away.

## Consumer Watch

<u>Don't pay for consumer complaint service when it's available</u> for free

- Concern that consumers are paying for freely available services and information
- Fee-charging consumer and tenant advocates are advertising on social media
- \$5 million in redress achieved mostly in areas of retail, travel and motor vehicles

WA consumers who pay for complaint conciliation services promoted by people via social media pages and advertisements are paying for a service that is available for free.

One of the main functions of Consumer Protection is to offer a free conciliation service for consumers who are in dispute with a trader, with the aim of resolving the complaint mostly by getting a full or partial refund paid.

In 2021-2022, about 2,000 WA consumers received redress totalling more than \$5 million and, in the previous financial year, about 2,800 consumers were returned almost \$7.5 million. The successful resolutions mostly related to the areas of retail, travel and motor vehicles.

Commissioner for Consumer Protection Gary Newcombe said he is concerned that consumers who are not aware of this free service may end up paying for a private advocate who doesn't have the necessary knowledge or experience.

"It has come to our notice that some people are promoting consumer and tenancy advocacy services via social media and charge a fee when they don't have the experience or track record that we have," Mr Newcombe said.

"While this is not illegal, consumers need to be aware that these same services are offered by Consumer Protection at no cost to the complainant and we have a high success rate in achieving a resolution, usually in the form of a refund. We also have the power to enforce consumer laws in WA and ensure that consumer guarantees are met.

"As regulators of the Australian Consumer Law and other legislation in WA, it's important that we are aware of any bad behaviour by traders and can take legal action if the situation warrants it. This is not something a private advocate can do.


"There are also tenant advocates on social media who may not have full knowledge of tenancy laws in WA or the necessary skills to delicately and amicably resolve disputes with landlords or agents, particularly in the current tight rental market.

"So consumers and tenants may be putting themselves at risk by dealing with possibly inexperienced and unqualified private advocates. It also doesn't make sense to pay for a service that is already offered for free."

There are also many websites that charge a fee to do an online search for information, often from government agencies, that is publicly available for free or at a much lower cost. For example:

 Vehicle registration status checks and expiry reminders are services that are offered at no cost by the WA Department of Transport via their DoTDirect online services;  Fuel price information is available to WA motorists at no charge on the FuelWatch website;

 The Personal Property Securities Register (PPSR), formerly known as REVS Checks, provides



 Finding lost or unclaimed superannuation is free on the Australian Taxation Office website or via a MyGov account.

Consumer and tenant complaints can be lodged online via the Consumer Protection website, or enquiries can be made by email consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au or by calling 1300 30 40 54.

### Renters experiencing financial difficulty

As living costs rise, many tenants may find themselves in a difficult financial position and struggle to pay rent.

We urge tenants who miss (or expect to miss) a rental payment to explain their situation to their landlord or real estate agent as soon as possible to hopefully avoid stressful breach notices, potential court action and even eviction.

A landlord might agree to a rent reduction for a period of time, waive a payment or agree to defer payment over a longer timeframe while you get back on your feet.

Your landlord's willingness to help may depend on their own financial position and whether you've been a responsible tenant, however it could be in their interest to negotiate a solution.

In shared tenancies, the landlord might let you assign the agreement to a replacement co-tenant, or allow you to sublet the property to another tenant to help share the cost. It is wise to avoid pay-day loans or buy now pay later schemes to pay your rent. They might look like an easy way out, but can make a difficult financial situation worse.

If you have a periodic tenancy, you can provide 21 days' written notice to terminate the agreement. Remember that it is usually easier to move from one rental into another, rather than try to find a new tenancy once court action or an eviction process has commenced.

Should you fail to pay rent, a landlord can either issue a breach notice requiring you to pay the outstanding amount in 14 days, or a termination notice giving you seven days to vacate. A landlord cannot force you out of a property by changing the locks or tampering with the water and power supply.

If you don't pay all rent owing by the due date and don't move out, the landlord must apply to the Magistrates Court for an order to vacate. A tenant can ask the magistrate to delay the termination for 30 days if they're likely to suffer hardship (such as being unable to find other accommodation).

## Living with History

### **Horse Traders**

Jim Lee Chung was an old friend of my little mate Fred Yee. He ran his own blacksmithing business in Onslow for many years. When old age caught up with him, he retired to Roebourne to live. Being a handy old bloke he earned a few extra bob in various ways, one of which was the making of very sturdy leather sandals which were very popular and sold well. No thongs in those days!

Another of Jim's popular lines was wheel and flint-type cigarette lighters which he made from the brass barrels of old tyre pumps. Jim's own lighter was a huge job that must have held a year's supply of fuel. As the old chap always sat in the front row at the open air pictures, the audience missed quite a bit of the show as they were frequently blinded by the smoke and glare whenever Jim lit up.

Doug, the manager of Warambie Station, was in need of a light draught horse. He heard that Jim owned one that was running on the town common. On his next trip to town, he approached Jim and offered to buy the horse. The old bloke was reluctant to sell and Doug got the impression that the horse was not fit as Jim kept insisting that "he not lookee well". After driving out on the common to have a look at the horse, Doug returned and despite Jim's further protests that "he not lookee too well", insisted on buying the horse. When he arrived home he proudly displayed his bargain to Will the overseer, meanwhile boasting to all and sundry how he had out-witted the wily celestial who insisted that the horse did not look well. Will carefully examined the horse and then turned to Doug. "Old Jim was right you know", he said, "he doesn't look too well. He's only got one flamin' eye."

When one of those honest old Chinese man told you something you had better believe it.

### Kid Soldiers

When the '39-'45 war broke out many youngsters put their ages up and attempted to enlist. Quite a few of us were successful. In my unit alone there were five of us who had our sixteenth birthdays overseas. We were lucky in one way. Most of the early intake were sometimes rough but usually decent men who treated us well and kept an eye on us.

After two years service in the Middle East, we were pretty seasoned and able to look after ourselves when we reached New Guinea. By this time in Australia, eighteen year olds were being called up. They had the option of joining AIF or staying in the Militia, but it made no difference. At that time New Guinea was Australian Territory so militia could be sent there.

We early birds mostly came from hard up families and had to battle at an early age. These newcomers were different. They had not had the chance to learn the survival skills that we had. Some of their officers left a lot to be desired also. Despite this, the Militia or "Chocos" as they were known, were the first to face the Japs on the Kukoda Track. Those kids did their share and more.

### Country Cop

Bob, the senior policeman in Wittenoom, was a typical country cop. Always cheery and helpful. He had the ability

to handle some pretty rough men with the minimum of trouble. Bob had some troubles of his own. His wife had to go south for medical reasons and Bob was left to look after his twelve-year-old daughter.

I often spent an evening at Bob's house, yarning over a beer. One such night we were sitting in the



kitchen when a figure appeared at the door. Bob never turned a hair. "Hello George," he said, and "What do you want?". "A drink of water," replied the bloke. "Okay, help yourself," said Bob. Aside, he said to me "I might need a hand here. The last time I saw this bloke, he was locked up for assaulting his wife."

After the chap had his drink, he quietly accompanied us back to the jail where we found he had kicked a sheet of iron out of the wall to escape. Bob got his prisoner to drag his mattress over by the heavy iron barred door. "You'll be right there mate. I'll see you in the morning." Said Bob. When I saw Bob the next day, I asked him how his prisoner was and was he to be charged for breaking out. "No" said Bob," Too much flaming paerwork. I gave him a hammer and nails and he fixed the cell up okay." As I said before, a typical country cop!

Sadly Bob's daughter died, aged 30, another victim of Wittenoom asbestos. I learned later that Bob's prisoner was what was known as a "New Australian" and had a history of violence. In those days, if you committed an offence, you went to jail.

### **Examples of an EMERGENCY include:**

- Chest pain
- Severe abdominal pain
- Bleeding that can't be controlled with first aid
- Convulsions and fits
- **Deep lacerations**
- Eye or ear injuries
- Uncontrolled high fever
- Loss of consciousness
- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour
- A very sick child
