Executive Officer's Report

Free training opportunities

1. Questions your not-for-profit should be asking about finances is a webinar being held on Wednesday 7th September, 10.30am to 11.15am in our Communty Resource Centre (CRC) meeting room.

Overseeing the finances is one of the most important tasks you have as a board member. Financial literacy will put your organisation in the best position to promote and fulfil your organisation's mission. If you don't understand how the finances work, you'll be at risk of getting caught up if anything goes wrong. And as we have seen over the past few years, things can (and will) go wrong!

In this webinar we'll be exploring:

- the questions you should be asking and the reports you should be seeing
- how to read, understand and act upon financial papers
- ways to build financial matters into decision-making processes.

2. *Cyber Update: Keeping Safe Online* is a webinar being held on Friday 9th September, 10.30am to 11.15am in our CRC meeting room.

In today's online world, cyber security incidents continue to increase in both volume and complexity. Simple and practical advice is essential to help your not-for-profit or community group stay safe online and stay ahead of the curve. Understand how you can adopt foundational controls to create a cyber-aware and resilient culture within your organisation.

Designed to provide practical insights and tools for the Australian market, this webinar will cover:

- getting the basics of cyber security right
- understanding the ins and outs of email payment fraud
- questions that need to be askes to better understand your organisation's risk posture
- sources of government cyber security guidance.

3. Candice Evans, Senior Regional Officer for Consumer Protection will be providing a *ScamNet presentation* at the Shark Bay Bowling, Sport and Recreation Club on Wednesday 14th September during the weekly Friendly Hub morning tea session at 10am.

Scammers try to steal your money or personal information — they are modern day fraudsters. Find out how to protect yourself by attending this session.

Candice will also be available to answer questions and provide advice regarding Consumer Rights, Housing and Accommodation, Scams and Motor Vehicles in the CRC meeting room that afternoon. Please don't be embarassed, protect yourself and find out your rights.

4. A representative from RSM Bird Cameron will be running *Bookkeeping Essentials with Xero* on the 14th September in our CRC meeting room at 12pm.

Get Online Week

In the first half of October 2022 we will be encouraging our community to visit our Tech Time workshops on Thurdays





to learn how to scan QR Codes in preparation for our Get Online Week event. What's a QR Code? Well it's a machine-readable code consisting of an array of black and white squares, typically used for storing URLs or other information



for reading by the camera on a smartphone. Restuarants are often seen using these QR codes in the city for customers to access their menus and even order at tables as well as used by event organisers to direct interested traffic off marketing material directly to their event website.

During Get Online Week we propose to display posters around our community (on noticeboards, in the Inscription Post newsletter, on Facebook and web pages) to encourage our local community to practice scanning QR codes with an app on their own device. Those participating will be eligible to receive a reward once completing our challenge.

Mental Health Awareness Walk

In partnership with our local police and the Shire of Shark Bay we have been working on a project to create awareness for Mental Health Week in October. We will be holding a 24 hour non stop Mental Health Awareness Walk in Denham over the weekend of the 22nd October (similar to Relay for Life). Participants will be walking, riding a bike, pushing prams, jogging, walking their dogs (or whatever they choose) around the town oval in teams or individually.

We encourage our community to support this important awareness program. Challenge your friends to join your team and roster on as a walker over the 24 hour period. Maybe you want to carry a weighted backpack, a batten or another object as a symbol of your support to those carrying their own mental health burdens. You might only be interested or available to join after work for an hour or in the morning whilst you take your dog for its daily walk. Any contribution will be appreciated and recognised.

The Shire has kindly offered to provide the food and drinks for participants during this time frame as well as local emergency services donating a few lights to scatter around the oval for those continuing the walk into the night and early morning. Those needing some time to rest their eyes are welcome to bring along their swags and camp chairs whist they wait their stints, spectate and support those continuing the journey.

Keep your eyes posted for more information as October approaches but you are more then welcome to register your interest to participate in whatever capacity you can offer with us at the Community Resource Centre.

Seniors week is on our radar ($6^{th} - 13^{th}$ November) and we are proposing some great activities and inclusions over several days this year. New Fire Danger Rating System

Shire of Shark Bay residents are advised that the current Fire Danger Rating system will be changing to a new Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) backed up by a new Fire Behaviour Index (FBI) from 1 September 2022.

The change will see ratings decrease from six to four and will be displayed in a uniform format on signage across the nation. Across the country fire and emergency services are applying nationally consistent colours, signs, and terminology. This means that wherever you go in Australia, and whatever the season or fuels you're surrounded with, you can understand the level of threat and what you need to do to stay safe.

Gascoyne Development Commission

A new round of the Local Capability Fund (LCF) has now opened to support local businesses in the Gascoyne and Pilbara, in preparation for the Total Solar Eclipse (TSE) event on 20 April 2023.

Exmouth has been identified as one of the best land-based places in the world to view the eclipse, with the Exmouth Peninsula set to experience total darkness.

Grants of 75 per cent of costs up to a maximum of \$25,000, are available to eligible businesses and can be utilised to procure planning and business advice, improve internal business systems, train employees, acquire new equipment or machinery, and support specific operational costs.

myGov is changing soon, making it easier for you

Your myGov account gives you access to a range of government online services. It will soon be changing on the 5th September and will have a fresh new look and more features, making it easier for you to access services you need.

When myGov changes, you won't need to change anything you currently do. You will still:

- find myGov at the same website address my.gov.au
- sign in the same way, using your current sign-in details
- have access to all your linked services, including the ATO
- access ATO online services the same way
- receive ATO messages to your myGov inbox
- go to ATO online services to view reminders, messages and information relating to your tax and super
- lodge your business activity statement (BAS) through ATO online services if you're a sole trader.

Curious? You can visit the myGov Beta website, a trial site that lets you explore and get familiar with some of the new features which include more information about government payments and services

Remember, your myGov account is different to the myGovID app. You can use the myGovID app to sign in to your myGov account by entering or accepting a 4-digit code.

When myGov changes, people won't need to do anything different. They'll find it at the same web address (my. gov.au), use their same sign in details and all their linked myGov services will stay the same.



Shark Bay School News

I attended a Midwest Principals Meeting in Geraldton recently, an occasion when public school leaders shared information about new directions and priorities across the state. A couple of current priorities across the system include strongly promoting student attendance at school, and ensuring a positive, restorative approach to managing student behaviour. It was good to reflect that we are very much in line with current best practice in terms of student behaviour and engagement and that our student attendance figures compare favourably with most other schools in our region. However, we have room to improve attendance further and it is something than can make a huge difference to each student's long term prospects. The way that missed days add up to the equivalent of missed years is startling:

- Absent average 5 days a term = 90% attendance rate = 1 year of school missed
- Absent average 1 day per week = 80% attendance rate = 2 years of school missed
- Absent average 1.5 days per week = 70% attendance rate = 3 years of school missed
- Absent average 2 days per week = 60% attendance are = 4 years of school missed.

There is no 'safe' threshold of absence. Attendance matters for achievement and every day counts.

Bilya Kaatijin Incursion

It was lovely to welcome the theatre group Yirra Yaakin to perform Bilya Kaatijin on 10th August for our Primary students. Bilya Kaatijin connects stories from Noongar land (southwest Western Australia), Wonguktha land (the northern Goldfields), Aotearoa (New Zealand) and the Kikuyu people of Kenya (Africa), to teach us about the importance of water to First Nations people around the world. Journeying through the globe Koya the frog, Yaakan the turtle and Maali the swan take us through the gnamma holes to learn important lessons that will help save Bilya (fresh water) back on Noongar Boodjar. Through each character's journey the show teaches its audiences about the importance of accepting others, the power of empathy and the importance of caring for the earth.

Spare Parts Theatre Incursion

The Puppeteers from Spare Parts were back this year on August 11th with their wonderful show Hachiko - The Loyal Dog. Following the performance, which all students K-12 enjoyed, the Primary students had workshops in puppet-making and in performing, which made for a really great day of immersion in the Arts.



Pink Snapper Closure

Freycinet Estuary, an inner gulf of Shark Bay, will be closed for fishing for pink snapper from Monday, 15 August until 30 September 2022 (inclusive)

This closure provides protection for pink snapper while they aggregate to spawn, and is critical for sustaining breeding stock for these long-lived and slow-growing fish.

Shark Deterrent Rebate

The Western Australian Government is offering a rebate of \$200 to Western Australian residents that purchase a scientifically-proven and approved personal shark deterrent device.

The world-first subsidy launched in May, 2017, was originally for 1,000 devices, but given the popularity of the program, funding has been extended.

Rebates are currently available when purchasing an Ocean Guardian FREEDOM7TM, Ocean Guardian FREEDOM+ SurfTM (Bundle) and/or the Complete RPELA Kit or RPELA Unit – Device Only.

Retailers of approved deterrents must first register with the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development. The rebate will then be applied at point of sale by the registered retailer. These servicing our region include; Batavia Coast Dive & Watersports, Geraldton

Getaway Outdoors, Geraldton

Mr Dive (online retailer - mrdive.com.au)

Ocean Guardian (online retailer - ocean-guardian.com) underwater.com.au (online retailer)

There are several commercially available personal shark deterrent products on the market, but not all have been scientifically proven. Only devices that have gone through rigorous scientific testing and have been proven to significantly reduce the chance of an interaction with a white shark are eligible for the rebate.



It is the intention of the Western Australian Government to add additional products to the Shark Deterrent Rebate when suitable products have been scientifically tested and verified.

It is recommended that those interested in purchasing an approved device review the specifications carefully to ensure it is suitable for their desired use.







Bowel Cancer Screenings

Bowel cancer is the second most common cancer diagnosed in Western Australia, so we are shining a light on why bowel cancer screening is so important.

Bowel cancer often develops without any symptoms and can grow in the bowel for years before spreading to other parts of the body. Bowel cancer can occur at any age, but the risk increases significantly from the age of 50.

Screening for bowel cancer is incredibly important as the screening test can help find bowel cancer before you notice any symptoms. If found in the early stages, treatment is much more likely to be successful.

Here are four things you might not know about bowel cancer screening:

1. Australia has a free national screening program

The National Bowel Cancer Screening Program (NBCSP) is funded by the Australian federal government to help Australians check for bowel cancer in its early stages. The NBCSP sends free home test kits to Australians aged 50-74 with a listed address on the Medicare registry or Veterans Card. Eligible Australians will be sent an invitation to screen every two years from when they turn 50. You can order a free replacement kit if yours has expired or gone missing.

2. The simple home test kit could save your life.

Bowel cancer often develops with no symptoms and if left untreated, can spread to other areas of the body. The test kits are designed to detect small amounts of blood in your poo. If blood is detected, then further tests are required (usually a colonoscopy) which is used to diagnose many bowel conditions including bowel cancer. Bowel cancer screening is the best chance of finding a bowel cancer in its very early stages. When detected early, more than 9 out of 10 bowel cancers can be treated successfully. That's why this home screening test is so valuable – now is the time to tick bowel screening off your to-do list.

3. Bowel screening really is easy!

People are often surprised by how quick, simple, and hygienic the test kit is. What's best is you can complete the test in the comfort and privacy of your own toilet! All you need to do is collect a small sample of two consecutive poos and return them in the reply-paid envelope to the laboratory for testing. The test kit comes with step-by-step instructions but there is also a Test Kit Helpline if you need any further help. Your



results will be sent to you and your nominated doctor in the mail about two weeks after you post your samples. Make sure you put the kit somewhere close to the toilet, so it's easy to reach when you are ready to use it.

4. Your loved ones are more likely to complete the test if you encourage them.

Now you know how important bowel cancer screening is, you can help spread the word and encourage your eligible friends and family to complete the test kit. They might just need a gentle nudge and it could save their life!

Shark Bay SES

There are many different types of search and rescue techniques used in emergency situations all across the world. In SES we often find our volunteers involved in land, air, flood boat and vertical rope rescues just to name a few.

Of late during our weekly Monday training sessions here in Denham we have been discussing, practising and perfecting our general rescue skills should we ever find ourselves needing to utilise these in a situation.

Rescue methods we have been practising and are used by SES personel include;

- single human crutch (used when the casualty is conscious, often seen in sporting games when one person assists to remove an injured player from the field/ court etc)
- two human crutch (two people are on either side of the casualty supporting their body weight as can be seen in the below right image)





- piggy back or pick a back (casualty is conscious and only used for rescuing children or small adults as their body weight is supported on the rescuers hip or back)
- the fore and aft method (two rescuers using correct manual handling techniques carry out a unconscious or conscious casualty with a variation of leg/foot holds considered as per below)






removal down stairs (dragging casualty backwards protecting head and arms from hitting objects which is often used to recover heavy casualties)



removal down a ladder (can be used to assist a conscious or unconscious casualty as seen in the following photo). Remember to take note of the type of ladder used as fibreglass and aluminium ladders have rungs that are closer together compared with wooden that are further apart.



- two handed seat (used by two rescuers)
- three handed seat (used by two rescuers with the spare hand steadying the casualty)
- four handed seat (the casualty must be conscious)

Marine Rescue Shark Bay


Marine Rescue Shark Bay is pleased to announce that the contract to build Tamala Rose's replacement vessel has been awarded to Dongara Marine. Work will soon commence on a 12 metre RHIB style vessel with an enclosed walk around cabin powered by triple 300hp OXE diesel outboards.

Delivery is expected in May 2023 after sea-trials and handover are completed. This vessel will be fitted with state of the art technology. Internet connectivity will allow Water Police to send search patterns directly to the chart plotters via email. FLIR night vision cameras and radio direction finders for locating epirbs will mean we have the tools to carry out our search and rescue role at a very high standard. Over the last few years this group has been responsible for retrieving 11 people from the water after their vessels had capsized, at least 7 of these were in life threatening situations. I can guarantee that our new boat will also save lives during its expected 15 year service life.

Five of our members took Tamala Rose to Carnarvon last weekend to join the annual MARSAR exercise run by DFES. Geraldtons brand new RV Mimosa and Carnarvons RV Lady Daph were also involved in searching for and locating dummies and flotsam that had been deployed to simulate a yacht which had sunk with 4 people on board.

Denhams new OIC, Sergeant David Gannaway and police from Carnarvon were the Incident Management Team coordinating the exercise from the Marine Rescue radio room. Dummies were tagged with a description of their injuries and condition, and all were transported back to shore for a simulated handover to waiting ambulance crews. These exercises allow us to practice our skills in realistic scenarios so that when these situations occur for real in our area we are better equipped to respond and give ourselves the best chance of a favourable outcome.

Conservation Matters

Born to be wild... on Dirk Hartog Island National Park!

So far, 2022 has been a pretty good year for the Dirk Hartog Island National Park Return to 1616 Ecological Restoration Project. The science team has kept the ball rolling with the reintroduction of native animal species and monitoring of established populations. But best of all, many of the native animals found during monitoring are new offspring! They have been born on the island - born to be wild! And to top it all off, there has been above average rainfall, supporting the plant growth needed to provide habitat and food for the island's inhabitants to enthusiastically repopulate.

Fauna updates

<u>Rufous hare-wallabies</u> are now found over a large portion of the island from Cape Ransonnet to Turtle Bay and <u>Banded</u> <u>hare-wallabies</u> continue to steadily expand their range which runs from as far north as Herald Bay having been released as far south as Surf Point.

<u>Shark Bay bandicoots</u> are breeding like... well, breeding like bandicoots and are now found from south of Notch Point to Withnell Point in the north of the island and may reach Turtle Bay in the near future.

Shark Bay mice began their reintroduction journey to the island last year and those first island pioneers have now been joined by 50 more of their kin from Bernier Island. This now completes the reintroduction numbers for this species, and they appear to be making an enthusiastic job of re-

establishing themselves on the island.

The translocation of the <u>greater stick-nest rats</u> is also complete now following the logistically challenging journey of 60 'stickies' from East and West Franklin islands, South Australia. This was a significant achievement and was made all the more remarkable given that it was undertaken during the peak of Western Australia's COVID-19 'wave'. Their journey to Dirk Hartog Island is aimed at increasing genetic diversity of their Western Australian counterparts. Although 'stickies' continue to be elusive in dodging the more standard monitoring methods like trapping, newly introduced technology allows them to be scanned with something like a supermarket bar code scanner at the entrance to their stick nest. This, together with photographs collected from remote cameras, is showing promising signs of success for this species.

And last but most certainly not least, more dibblers bred in the captive breeding facility at Perth Zoo will be flying up in mid-October to join the 93 dibblers previously translocated from Perth Zoo to Dirk Hartog Island.

You can help protect fledgling native animal populations

With the ongoing success of the threatened native animal reintroductions on Dirk Hartog Island National Park, it's

a timely reminder to prepare well if travelling to the island by boat. We can all be involved and 'do our bit' to help protect this internationally significant wildlife restoration project. Please leave your pets at home when visiting the island by boat.

Shore birds nesting season is upon us



The great shorebird nesting season is upon us. Each spring through summer, Oystercatchers, Plovers and Terns flock to beaches all over Australia's coastline to lay eggs in a shallow scrape in the sand. We understand the home lives of shorebirds in other parts of Western Australia but as yet what where and when it all happens in Shark Bay is less well understood.



We do know that elsewhere along the coast the nesting season for the Fairy terns (Sternula nereis nereis) has begun. Here in the bay, over the next couple of months, some of our beaches are going to become their nurseries. These birds nest

on the ground above the high water mark. Nesting on the beach is precarious and consequently in many parts of Australia their numbers have vastly decreased and they are now 'vulnerable'.

Shorebirds won't nest on all the beaches that we can use. They require special conditions to use a beach as a home. Temporarily, while they are using the beach, we can think of these special beaches just like nurseries...not ideal places for off road driving or letting our dogs chase the birds for exercise.

We can help to care for these at risk birds by getting to know more about the homelives of our shorebirds in Shark Bay including the Fairy terns. Over the next few months be on the lookout for them.

- If you see them on the beach above the hightide mark, keep well clear
- Temporary measures to help protect these birds

increase their chance of breeding success. We can help by sharing the space and be respectful of any temporary signage and fencing.

- Let's keep our dogs leashed and away
- Let's avoid driving four-wheel drive vehicles on the beaches where they are, particularly at high tide
- If you see a bird nesting on the beach (they will be hanging out above the hightide mark), report it to the DBCA office here in Denham and maintain your distance
- Let's avoid walking through flocks of birds or causing them to take flight. Disturbance burns energy, which could have implications for breeding or migration

Living with History

First Job

When my father died at an early age I regret to say I turned into the sort of kid who today blames his obnoxious behaviour on everything except himself. In my day the verdict was that there was "nothing wrong with me that a good hiding wouldn't fix". Unfortunately there was no one at home capable of giving me that hiding. Eventually I made such a nuisance of myself that I achieved my object. I was allowed to leave school before the leaving age of fourteen and shipped off down the southern wheat belt to a job on the farm. This was as far away as various interested parties could send me.

There was a small community there, mostly related, who had moved over here from the Victorian Malley, where their farming methods had turned the country into a dust bowl, They had learned nothing and were now in the process of doing the same thing here. The farms were only about one thousand acres and were mostly run just by the family and perhaps one poorly poid farmhand. This was during the Great Depression and jobs were scarce. My wages were ten shillings or one dollar a week and keep. My boss and his brother on the next farm killed one sheep a month between them. The rest of our diet consisted of rabbits, porridge made of ground wheat and home-grown vegetables. There were a few milking cows. The milk was separated and the cream churned into butter. This, together with any eggs from the free range chooks, was sold in town by the farmer's wife. There was an old tractor on the farm but most of the work was done with horses. It was my job to feed and groom these gentle giants and I became very fond of them. The way they acted with me I think they felt the same way. There was a huge Clydesdale stallion that had to be kept in a separate stall. He had the reputation of being savage but after awhile we became friends and I could do anything with him. Working hours were from daylight, when I gave the horses their first feed, till about eight o'clock, when they had their last one, with general farm work in between.

Sunday I had off, except for tending to all the animals unless the boss could think of something that could not be put off till Monday. I had no contact with the family after work. If they went to town or any social event I was left home to look after the stock. There was an old dog on the form. No one seemed to own or care for him. I used to trap rabbits to feed him. He used to follow me around and sleep by my bed. Sometimes he and I slept with the stable with the horses. We all seemed to enjoy each other's company. After I had been there about 6 months I asked the boss for an accounting. There were no



paydays on forms then. You drew money if you needed it and were paid up if you left or went on holidays. I got a vague answer and from then on the boss started finding fault with everything I did. I got the idea he wanted me to leave and to give him an excuse not to pay me. Things came to a head one morning when I was stacking some



bags of wheat in the shed. I heard a shot and on investigating I found that he had shot the dog. He said that it had killed a chook. The poor old hound couldn't have caught a chook! I was not fully-grown but I was toughened by hard work and very angry. The farmer shortly found himself flat on his back with a bloodied nose and watching me smash his rifle on the gatepost. I collected my few belongings and, followed by the farmer's threats and curses, I took off. I walked twelve miles into town and turned myself in to the local Policeman. Like most country cops he was a thoroughly decent man. After hearing my story he took me into his house, asked his wife to feed me and left. He returned after a couple of hours to inform me that there would be no charges against me and that he had all the money owed to me. He also offered to find me a better job. I thought it over for awhile but then thanked him and said it was time to move on. The action of that decent country cop left me with the only pleasant memories of that district and its inhabitants. I did hear later that the big stallion I had befriended had put the former in hospital. The news cost me no sleep.
