# **Executive Officer's Report**



Recent queries from community members has encouraged our staff to investigate voluntary cancellation or winding up of association proceedings. Thanks to information provided by the Associations and Charities Branch of Consumer Protection we can advise the following.

#### MEMBERS CLOSURE OPTION

If the Association has members and is able to convene a meeting then it can use the following process to voluntarily cancel its incorporation.

Step 1: The committee must determine that the association is solvent and whether it has any surplus assets (funds, equipment or property etc.) remaining after settling its debts or liabilities.

Step 2: If it is determined that the association has surplus, the committee must prepare a plan setting out how it intends for its surplus to be distributed. When preparing the plan, the committee must take into account that the nominated beneficiary (or beneficiaries) must be suitable according to the associations rules and to be eligible under the Act must be one of the following:

- an association incorporated in WA
- a company limited by guarantee that is registered under the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth) (the Corporations Act) (i.e. is registered with the ACNC)
- a company holding a current licence under section 151 of the Corporations Act
- a body corporate that holds a licence under the charitable collections Act.

The committee may find the online search facilities from ASIC, ACNC and AssociationsOnline useful for finding out the legal structure of a proposed beneficiary and determining whether they may be consider eligible.

Step 3: Once the committee's resolutions are made, a general meeting of members must be called where members are asked to vote on two resolutions:

- One resolving to voluntary cancel the associations incorporation; and
- One approving the committee's proposed distribution plan.

Step 4: If the two resolutions are passed by special resolution (75% majority of members present at the meeting) the Association must lodge an application for voluntary cancellation (Form 6N) within 28 days of the special resolutions being passed. You will be asked detail on the Form the wording of the special resolutions, the date of the meeting and the particulars of distribution plan that was agreed to by members.

Step 5: Consumer Protection will consider the distribution plan and if approved notify the Association as of when it can begin to implement the distribution plan. The Association will also be provided with a certificate that it must complete after the distribution plan is completed.

Step 6: Once the assets have been distributed, the association completed the certificate certifying that the surplus property has been distributed in accordance with

the distribution plan and return the certificate to Consumer Protection. The contents of this certificate should be determined by a resolution of the management committee or association at a general meeting and the Association is asked to include date of this resolution on the certificate.

Step 7: Upon the return of the certificate and confirmation that no assets remain in the Associations name, Consumer Protection may cancel the association's incorporation. The Association will receive written advice on the date the associations cancellation is effected.

#### NO MEMBERS CLOSURE OPTION

However, if the Association has no members or is otherwise unable to convene the meeting to voluntarily cancel then it can be reported as being Defunct using our 'report a defunct association' online form.

The Commissioner is compiling a list of defunct associations and will in due course consider whether making an order to cancel their incorporation is appropriate. Please be mindful that the process of ordering the association cancellation is prescribed under the Act and requires several notices to be issued each with statutory waiting times. As a consequence completing this process can take up to 6 months to be completed, once it is commenced.

Should an order to cancel the association Associations incorporation, then any property held in its name is deemed vested with the Commissioner and she must give directions about its distribution and use. 

## **Waste Collection Requirements in Denham**





#### One Bin Only

Only one bin will be collected per household, unless approved by the Shire prior to collection.



#### **New Pick Up Route**

The Shire of Shark Bay is now providing the Roadside Rubbish Collection service. The route is currently being optimised and pick up times may have changed.

Please put your bin out the night prior to ensure your bin is collected.




#### **Overflowing Bins**

Bins overflowing with rubbish will not be collected. Ensure that the lid on your bin is able to remain shut at all times to ensure no wildlife can access



#### **Rocks On Lids**

Bins using rocks to keep the lid secure will not be collected as they can damage the truck.





#### **High Winds**

Let's take care so our town stays tidy.



#### Incorrect Items

Do not put items such as bricks, heavy timber or steel in the bin. These materials can damage the collection equipment and your bin. The bins are for domestic waste only.



#### Damaged Bins

Bins that are broken, cracked, or missing lids/wheels will not be collected. It is your responsibility to ensure repairs or replacement.



To purchase a new bin or parts, contact the shire on 9948 1218, email admin@sharkbay.wa.gov.au or visit the Shire office.

It is the property owners responsibility to arrange bin repairs & replacements. Renters, please contact the Owner or Property Manager.

### Waste Disposal Local Health Laws

All owners and occupiers are responsible for your bins and what goes in them

#### Bin Receptacles

- · keep your bin lid closed, except when depositing rubbish or cleaning it
- except for a reasonable period before and after collection time, keep your bin on the premises and located either behind the street alignment as close as practicable to the street alignment of the premises but so that it does not obstruct any footpath, cycle way, right-of-way or carriage way,
- ensure that the premises is provided with an adequate number of receptacles.

#### What should NOT go in your bin

- more than 70 kilograms of rubbish or refuse,
- hot or burning ash,
- oil, motor spirit or other flammable liquid,
- liquid paint or other solvent,
- bricks, concrete, building rubble, earth or other like substances,
- drugs, dressings, bandages, swabs or blood samples unless placed in a sealed impervious and leak-proof container,
- hospital, medical, veterinary, laboratory or pathological substances containing blood unless placed in a sealed impervious and leak-proof container,
- syringes, needles, surgical hardware, broken glass, sharps or other sharp objects unless placed in a sealed impervious leak-proof and impenetrable container.
- cytotoxins, radioactive substances and dangerous chemicals,
- sewage, manure, nightsoil, faeces or urine,

**Inscription Post** 

- any object which is greater in length, width, or breadth than the corresponding dimension of the receptacle or which will not allow the lid of the receptacle to be tightly closed, or
- rubbish or refuse which is or is likely to become offensive or a nuisance, or give off an offensive or noxious odour, or to attract flies or cause fly breeding unless it is first wrapped in non-absorbent or impervious material or placed in a sealed impervious container

## 4 WAYS TO RECYCLE IN DENHAM

#### 1: GET A 10C REFUND

Return eligible containers to Yadgalah Aboriginal Corporation Mobile Drop Point and receive a 10c refund.



Collect eligible containers and drop them in marked bins at the Shark Bay Recycling Centre. 'Onion bags' are available for free at the Op Shop and CRC to help you collect containers.

#### 3: OUT AND ABOUT

specially marked collection baskets along Denham Foreshore.



Bring non-eligible plastics, glass, and cardboard to Shark Bay Recycling Centre and sort them into marked yellow-top bins. The Shire is working on securing recycling partnerships for transport and processing.

#### WHAT HAPPENS WHEN I **DONATE MY 10C CONTAINER?**

When you recycle through the Shark Bay Recycling Centre or marked collection baskets:

- 5c is donated ABC to Foundation important for social programs in remote communities.
- 5c is used by the Shire of Shark Bay to fund future local recycling and sustainability efforts.



# Protea Lodge (formerly known as Midwest Cancer Hostel)

Protea Lodge is home away from home accomodation for regional families whose loved ones are undergoing cancer treatment at the WA Country Health Service Midwest Cancer Centre.

The \$1.38 million facility is located on Geraldton Health Campus, directly behind the Midwest Cancer Centre, ensuring easy access to cancer treatments, support, information and education for patients and carers spending time in the motel style units.

#### Accommodation

Protea Lodge offers seven motel style units including one wheelchair accessible room and potential for family rooms to be created using inter-connecting doors. Please note these doors will remain locked unless approved prior to arrival.

Any additional equipment/special needs should be identified and discussed when requesting a booking.

Please note that nursing and care services are not provided at Protea Lodge. You must be able to care for yourself or have a carer in attendance during your stay.

#### Laundry

A communal laundry with washing machine and dryer is available on site. Washing Powder is not provided by Protea Lodge.

#### Cleaning

Each unit will be professionally cleaned prior to your arrival. It is your responsibility during the stay to be respectful of others and maintain the facilities to a suitable level of cleanliness including emptying full bins and cleaning dishes.

#### Transport

Transport to and from the facility is the responsibility of the patient. Taxis to the Geraldton Health Campus are readily available. Patients are also able to take advantage of onsite parking and use their own vehicles.

#### Each unit offers

- · Twin single beds linen and towels provided
- Air conditioning
- Ensuite bathroom
- Kitchenette including fridge, microwave .. kettle, toaster and sandwich maker \*
- Telephone for emergency services only
- Television
- · Private patio

A complimentary tea and coffee pack will be available in your unit on arrival.

\*Please note there are no cooking facilities in the units. Meals will need to be purchased from local suppliers or you will need to bring your own prepared meals or supplies to barbeque. There is an undercover communal barbeque located in front of the hostel is available for hostel residents to enjoy.

#### Local information

In each unit you will find a folder with helpful information relating to facilities and services in the area including location



of local shops, pharmacies and recreational activities in Geraldton.

#### Patient Asisstant Travel Scheme (PATS)

All Midwest Cancer Centre clients who live outside of Geraldton will be entitled to PATS support for accommodation and travel should they need to stay at Protea Lodge for medical reasons. You should follow the PATS application process at your local health service. The Midwest Cancer Centre can assist with making accommodation bookings and liaising with your local PATS staff.

#### Department of Veteran Affairs (OVA)

Department of Veteran Affairs (OVA) Gold Health Card and White Health Card -Specific Conditions holders travelling to Geraldton for cancer services are eligible to access Protea Lodge.

Bookings requests should be made via the Midwest Cancer Centre by contacting 08 9956 2480 Monday to Friday between 8:00am - 4:00pm.

## **Conservation Matters**







#### Gathaagudu Dugong Surveys

Dugong aerial surveys have finished in Gathaagudu (Shark Bay) after a 10-day flying campaign from DBCA and Malgana Rangers wrapped up in June. From up high in the sky, DBCA is leading this very important project in partnership with JCU: James Cook University, Australia





 TropWATER who are conducting research on dugong across Australia.

The survey team took to the skies in a light aircraft, flying at a low 500 feet and only 100 knots in order to discern a dugong from a dolphin or a whale, and identify adults from calves. The aerial survey allows scientists to understand distribution, numbers and trends over time; previous surveys estimate population size to be over 10,000 animals, one of the largest in the world - contributing to the Outstanding Universal Values for World Heritage listing of Shark Bay.

The team could only fly during daylight and in low wind conditions to increase the visibility from the air. The aircraft was also fitted with cameras to collect over 500,000 images over the entire World Heritage Area. Audio recorded from the observers in the plane will be used to generate the population estimate, and also in an effort to train artificial intelligence to correctly identify animals from the images!

Dr. Holly Raudino, Marine Fauna Scientist with DBCA, says the population has remained relatively stable since the 1980s, though observations during a partial survey

conducted in 2012 showed a lower proportion of calves and juveniles following the 2011 marine heatwave. Researchers are interested in whether this has significantly changed population dynamics in Gathaagudu. While it is too early to tell from the data collected this year, early thoughts from her seat in the plane is that the numbers look comparable and there have been sightings of big, healthy calves.

DBCA Malgana Ranger Neilisha Oakley says the research was also helping to map the distribution and range of the dugongs across the Shark Bay World Heritage Area. Initial results from Gathaagudu and subsequent surveys in the Exmouth Gulf suggest the dugong are heading further north for the winter, much like the population of Western Australians over school holidays. With the help of Malgana rangers and with plans for exchanging information and knowledge with traditional owners, this monitoring is helping scientists better understand these endearing marine animals and will support future conservation and joint management.

# **Living with History - Modern Values**

When I started on the Roebourne- Wittenoom run, I was advised to take note of any tips given by Arthur, an elderly driver. Arthur had been on the road since he carted wool from the tablelands with camel teams. Arthur had some Spanish somewhere in his ancestry and was married to a coloured lady. They had a large family and were well respected in Roebourne.

In those days, the roads were never officially closed, no matter how much rain fell. If you got bogged you dug your own way out. When things were bad, it was a good idea to travel in convoy. If there was a way to get around a boggy spot, Arthur knew it. If he thought the water level in a creek was too high, we camped until it went down. Everyone carried a well stocked tucker box and a rifle. We helped each other through and if the road was really bad we camped at night. It did not pay to travel in the dark; you could get yourself into real trouble.

The management at Wittenoom turned a blind eye to a few bottles of beer missing from the loading. They knew the battles we had to get their stores through. Four or five days to do the 200 odd miles was not considered out of the ordinary on a wet road.

There were no two-way radios or any other communication then. When we left town, that was the last contact the boss had with us until we got back. There were two transport firms in Roebourne in those days, but if someone was in trouble it didn't matter who he



drove for, you helped him out. If you met someone on the road, be he trucker or traveller, you stopped for a yarn.

It was hard in those days, but I think it was much better. Today, everyone is in too much of a hurry to help. If you break down these days, you need to move well off the road or you'll get run over. If you leave your vehicle, there will be nothing left when you get back. Fifty years ago, you could walk away from your truck and leave your wallet on the seat. It would be there when you returned.

#### Consumer Watch

#### Boarders and lodgers have rights too

Rising rents and a lack of available homes have prompted many Western Australians to seek out share houses as a way of keeping a roof over their heads at a price they can afford.

Before taking on a housemate, or becoming one yourself, it's crucial that everyone understands the arrangement they have agreed to, as the law applies differently to boarders and lodgers than it does to co-tenants or sub-tenants.

If you pay rent to stay at someone else's house, then you're likely to be considered a lodger. If meals are supplied too, you're probably a boarder. Because neither boarders nor lodgers are technically considered 'tenants', they aren't covered by the Residential Tenancies Act 1987 (which protects co-tenants and sub-tenants), but instead have rights under both common law and the Australian Consumer Law (ACL).

Under the ACL, the property must be fit for purpose, meaning it must be safe, habitable and meet your needs as discussed with the landlord at the beginning.

Should a major problem arise with your boarder or lodger arrangement – such as a serious issue (or a series of smaller issues) that would've stopped you moving in – the landlord must fix the issue in a reasonable time.

In rooming or boarding arrangements that continue over a number of years, there may be changes to the services that were initially agreed upon and the landlord must let you know about them as soon as possible. For major changes the landlord must seek your consent to continue with the change, or offer you a new agreement at a lower cost.

The landlord is also not allowed to making false or misleading representations about the property or services, such as claiming there is air-conditioning when there isn't, or agreeing to provide a wide variety of meals when they don't. If you have a problem with the property or the services provided, contact your landlord directly in the first instance to give them the opportunity to fix the problem. If this doesn't work, we may be able to help negotiate an agreed outcome. If you are not sure whether you are a boarder, lodger, co-tenant or sub-tenant, contact Consumer Protection consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au or 1300 30 40 54 to discuss. In some circumstances it may be necessary for a court to make a binding decision about which one you are.

#### Spot the clues of fake online reviews

Word of mouth recommendations in the real-world can be a useful tool when deciding which product or service to buy, however the same can't always be said when seeking out this type of guidance online.

Nearly 40 per cent of consumers turn to the internet to read user reviews as part of their research, according to an investigation by consumer advocacy group CHOICE, but it may not be immediately obvious whether the experience you're reading about belongs to a genuine customer or has been written by the business itself, a disgruntled exemployee or even a competitor.

Scammers also appear to be in on the action, promoting jobs on encrypted message platforms and social media that falsely promise to pay their victims for clicking on links to write fake reviews.

Fictitious testimonials not only diminish the trust and good faith between traders and consumers, they are also illegal under the Australian Consumer Law, which prevents businesses from creating a false impression about their goods or services.

Consumer Protection has and will take action against companies that publish fake online reviews and testimonials where there is sufficient proof, but in the meantime urges consumers to watch-out for some common red-flags that may help them avoid being duped in the first place.

Look for a spike in highly positive or negative reviews over a short period of time – this could be the work of a company trying to appear more favourable to potential customers, or of somebody else with an ulterior motive.

Compare reviews across the platform or website and look for repetitive language, multiple entries from the same email or IP address, as well as those from similar names.

Generic or one-word reviews that lack specific detail about the business or product could also be a sign of the same material being copy and pasted by Al bots or paid reviewers. Be aware that some platforms require proof of purchase

before allowing reviews to be published, so these may be more reliable than the ones that don't.

# **Country Stargazing**

#### A Meteor Shower and a Super Blue Moon - August Has It All!

Stargazers have plenty to see this month, starting with the Perseids Meteor Shower! It is generated from comet Swift-Tuttle and renowned for producing bright meteors. The shower peaks on the night of the 12th/13th of August but can be viewed several days either side of the peak. The best views will be under dark skies, after midnight. The further north you are in WA, the better you will see this meteor shower.

Meteor showers occur as planet Earth crosses the orbital path of a comet. As comets pass by the sun, the extreme temperatures heat up the nucleus causing debris particles to spread out creating a comet tail. As Earth passes through this debris cloud, we see the fiery spectacle of a meteor

When to look: From midnight to early morning, 12th/13th August.

Which direction to look: Low on the northern horizon.

around Earth is slightly oval shaped or elliptical. So, every month there's a time when the Moon is at its closest distance to Earth (at perigee) and another time when it is at its furthest distance from Earth (at apogee).

Super Blue Moon!



When perigee coincides with the full Moon, it's popularly called a "Supermoon". This 'super' phenomenon will occur on the 31st of

August. To add more cosmic excitement to the mix, it will also be a Blue Moon! This is the popular term for a second full Moon in a calendar month. While the Moon won't actually turn blue, it's still worth going out and observing the Moon, as blue moons only occur once every 2 or 3 years!

## Fisheries - Denham

School holiday roadside checks show good compliance Roadside compliance operations in the State's north during the recent school holidays checked 1862 travellers for fishing offences and found a high level of compliance with WA's fishing laws.

The checkpoint on the North West Coastal Highway near the Denham turn-off involved Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) officers from Denham, Carnarvon, Lancelin, Fremantle and Mandurah with support from Denham and Geraldton police officers.

The operations on 12 and 15 July checked southbound travellers from Karratha, Port Hedland, Exmouth, Coral Bay, Carnarvon, and the Shark Bay area and found the majority abided by the recreational fishing possession limits.

DPIRD's officers weighed fishers' catches and only 10 offences were detected, which included exceeding fillet possession limits and failing to label filleted fish.

Approximately 17 kilograms of excess fish fillets were seized, and those offences will likely be dealt with through infringement and warning notices.

Special operations like roadside checks are carried out around Western Australia each year and will continue to be part of DPIRD's strategy to monitor compliance with the State's fishing laws.

DPIRD's Denham-based Supervising Fisheries and Marine Officer Jack Dawson said it was great to see a large majority of the travellers had not breached catch limits or other fishing rules.

"The overwhelming sentiment from the public was appreciation and many commented that it was great to see our fishing compliance officers doing this kind of work," Mr Dawson said.



"We inspected over 100 vessels that were being towed by travellers."

Anyone who suspects any kind of illegal fishing activity is urged to report their concerns to FishWatch on 1800 815 507.

If you have seen something involving fish or fishing which doesn't look quite right, the FishWatch phone line operates 24-7 for easy reporting, or alternatively use the online form on Crimestoppers.

## STUDY OF CENTURY OLD SHARK BAY CYCLONE SHEDS LIGHT ON PRESENT DAY DANGERS

A historical account of fish being stranded up to nine kilometres inland by a cyclone in Shark Bay a century ago has been used with numerical modelling to help assess current risks from extreme weather to areas on the edge of tropical cyclone zones.

The cyclone struck the area, 750km north of Perth, in 1921 killing two people, flooding the shores of the outer gulf and causing extensive harm to the pearling industry, seagrass meadows and freshwater wells which remained saline for decades.

The research paper, The utility of historical records for hazard analysis in an area of marginal cyclone influence published in Communications Earth and Environment, reconstructed the cyclone partly through extensive surveys of State and national archives including accounts by a pearling inspector. It also involved using a ground-breaking approach, Quantified Historical Data Framework, to do a structured analysis of archival information to evaluate the authenticity, consistency and relevance of reports of the extreme weather event.

Dr Jenny Shaw, Research Director for the Western Australian Marine Science Institution, worked on the paper in collaboration with researchers from the Nanyang Technological University in Singapore, The University of Western Australia, University of Sydney, Griffith University, Baird Australia and Minderoo Foundation.

Lead author Associate Professor Adam Switzer from Nanyang Technological University's Earth Observatory of Singapore said the study engaged a diverse team of historians, geoscientists, marine biologists and engineers, showing the need for multidisciplinary collaboration to tackle complex issues such as the risks of cyclones and storm surges in a warming world.

The study noted tropical cyclones were likely to shift poleward in a warming climate and some researchers had suggested the trend was particularly obvious in the Southern Hemisphere.

"This approach provides researchers worldwide with a valuable framework for leveraging historical documents to derive actionable modeling parameters, benefiting areas that face similar challenges," Associate Professor Switzer said.

Dr Shaw said the study of the cyclone, which struck what is now a World Heritage site, found it had a major ecological impact in a similar way to TC Yasi in Queensland in 2011.

"A recurrence would likely have considerable long-term knock-on effects to ecosystem functions and services, particularly as the seagrasses of Shark Bay contribute to several World Heritage values," Dr Shaw said.

One of the accounts of the cyclone, found during a search of archives, was by Pearling Inspector Wally Edwards, who witnessed the cyclone and its aftermath.

He described seeing ship groundings, inundated coastal wells, flooding, an altered coastal landscape and sharks and fish stranded inland.

Longer term impacts included livestock losses, declines

in the shells used in the pearling industry and reports that dugongs were seen less frequently in the years after the cyclone.

The researchers said a similar cyclone, assessed to be between a category four and five, would inundate the town of Denham flooding critical infrastructure and damaging important industries.

Dr Joseph Christensen, from UWA's School of Humanities, said the study uncovered detailed information about the historic event.

"By employing the Quantified Historical Data Framework, we were able to establish a detailed and quantified understanding of the 1921 storm surge, including its timing, nature and ecological consequences," Dr Christensen said.

The authors said the approach had important implications for land use planning, emergency management and environmental management of Shark Bay and other sites of marginal cyclone influence.

# BAITING TO PROTECT NATIVE WILDLIFE

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's *Western Shield* program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.



Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered dangerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.
