

On the horizon

Our CRC has applied for grant funding to host in April 2023 a water and paint wars challenge games day on our town oval during Youth Week which falls during the April school holidays. 

- how to go about making a complaint.

Another organisation keen to participate on the day is Geraldton Regional Aboriginal Medical Service (GRAMS) as they wish to offer their support services (for any youth) targeting common issues including drinking, smoking, vaping etc and supplying information and resources for both youth and their parents about these health topics.

Ngala Parenting Connect in Carnarvon are keen to committ and join us for this fun day and we are waiting to hear back from Head Space in Geraldton, Joblink Midwest and Real Futures Denham. Our plan is to have all these organisations present and engaging with the youth while they participate in the paint wars, games and challenges.

The Shire of Shark Bay is located in the Shark Bay World Heritage Area which is one of three World Heritage areas within WA. Located approximately 830 kilometres north of Perth, Shark Bay is a wonderland of world-class natural attractions, the clear turquoise waters are ablaze with multicoloured sea life and stretching beyond the white sandy beaches are spectacular rust-red sand dunes.

The Shire is seeking a Town Services Officer, Country Services Officer, and a Waste Management Officer. Position descriptions can be found on Council's website www. sharkbay.wa.gov.au.



Celebrating the end of 2022

Our school has such a lot to celebrate – despite the challenges of COVID, we have had an amazing year. Our Public School Review was a wonderful acknowledgement of the school's planning and the staff team's commitment and we love looking back at the end of a year and seeing the progress that students have made.

These successes have been the result of enormously hard work and commitment and have been achieved despite a very tight budget over the last few years. We have successfully implemented new programs through our Primary classes and seen student achievement shoot up, but have not, until now, been able to fund all the additional support we would like to see for our high school students. This is about to change. From 2023 onwards, our school will be funded in a way that fully recognizes the complexity of our school and the needs of our high school students as part of that. We will be implementing significantly increased learning support in the high school room, along with more enrichment, more fun and more outings. We will be recruiting to add to our team early next year, and will be selecting staff who can help us ensure we meet our high aspirations for all students. We also expect, over the course of 2023, to be able to expand our staff team and develop a 'settled' pattern of classes, with no more than 2 year levels per class, although, due to recruiting during term 1, we may start the year with a different structure initially - please bear with us as we bring all our best plans to fruition! We encourage all families to be actively involved in school next year, through the P&C, Council and all school events - we have some wonderful opportunities now and value your input.

2023 will be a very exciting year in which our long-held wishes for the school become more fully realized and we can provide for Shark Bay families a 'boutique' K-12 school, with small classes and dedicated adult care to nurture every student to achieve and thrive at their very best.

Premier's Reading Challenge

This year the Premier of WA challenged all school students to read 12 books from 5 May to 9 September. Altogether, students logged more than 300,000 books. There is nothing more important

than reading and we congratulate Shark Bay students who took part, especially those who completed the challenge and recorded 12 books: Korey, Phoenix, Levi C and Faran. Well done!

ComCen? Present! There's no time of the year these phones aren't ring-ting-tinglin', so our helpful Triple Zero call takers have put their holidays on the line to answer your calls. What do you do if you see smoke or flames, but no crews in sight?

- Check www.emergency.wa.gov.au to see if it's been reported already - it will show up in the 'Incident' list.
- Not in the list? Bad news, it may not have been reported. Good news, you can report it!
- Call Triple Zero (000). This step is crucial to ensuring that resources are swiftly sent to incidents.

Need SES assistance? This dream team also manage calls to 132 500, which usually surge during storms, cyclones and flooding.

Thank you to all those from our emergency services family who are on station, on call or standing by, ready to keep our community safe at the drop of a (party) hat.




Eastern States Deployment

There are 64 SES Units in Western Australia. Since mid-October, SES volunteers from more than half of the WA SES Units members were deployed to assist with the response to the Eastern States floods. Members from our Shark Bay unit were asked if they were available to assist, however were unable to commit to a stint away before the Christmas and New Years break.

4WDina

There continues to be plenty of visitors and locals treking into our National Parks and beach areas and experiencing a few issues. Currently the track into the Frances Peron National Park for example is proving challenging for many as the extremely soft sand in certain areas is causing plenty of unprepared adventurers to get bogged. Many are not equipped with any offroad gear, nor have they let down their tyres to suitable levels or even in some instances lowered them a little further to make recovery easier.







Our recommendation is

only encouraging those 4WDs with high clearance and low range gears to trek through our beach and 4wd areas. Also the recommended psi level of your tyres should be reduced to around 18-20psi when engaging 4wd. Should you get into trouble you could always lower your tyres further to around 14-15 psi.

Our emergency vehicle is equipped for such recorvery missions and includes tyre deflators, an air compressor, pressure gauges, winch, max traxs, satellite phone, GPS, shovels and plenty of spare water. All off this equipment depending on your budget are great ideas for birthday presents for those keen offroad adventurers.

To ensure our volunteers are trained in 4wd recovery, SES volunteers are welcome to nominate and attend one of the many SES coordinated 4wd training courses often held in Kalbarri to learn skills and utilise different equipment to recover from different 4wd scenarios. Even our most experienced drivers have been building their capacity, knowledge and skill base in these training sessions.





EMERGENCY WARNING



Did you know?

Skin cancers (including melanoma) are the most common cancers affecting both women and men in Western Australia. In 2017, 874 Western Australian men and 593 Western Australian women were diagnosed with melanoma.

The majority (55-70%) of melanomas are detected by patients themselves, or their partners.

Common symptoms of skin cancer include:

- · A new spot or mole on your skin
- A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores
- Any spots, freckles or any moles changing in size (width), thickness (height), colour, or shape over a period of weeks to months.

Get to know your skin and what's normal for you, particularly if you're over 40 years of age. If you notice any of these symptoms or any other unusual changes tell your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker. It doesn't mean you've got skin cancer – often they turn out to be something less serious. But it's important to get checked.

If it is skin cancer, the earlier it's found, the greater the chance of successful treatment.



How to check your own skin

Reduce your risk



Consumer Watch

Safety advice for Christmas gifts given to children With Christmas over for another year, many children are happily enjoying their new gifts.

While it is always exciting for children to receive fun gifts to play with, they may pose some safety risks, so it is a timely reminder for parents to be aware of key safety issues with some products.

Button or coin batteries are found in many toys and novelty gifts that produce light and sound effects, but they are also found in household items such as remote controls, watches, calculators, torches, LED candles and kitchen and bathroom scales.

If a button battery is swallowed by a child and becomes stuck in their throat, an electrical current is immediately triggered by saliva, causing a chemical reaction that can result in severe burns in as little as two hours and can be fatal.

In Australia and globally, there is a growing number of injuries and deaths from button batteries, particularly in children aged 0-5 years, who have a tendency to place small objects in body orifices such as their mouth, ears and nose.

Parents should regularly examine items in their home powered by button batteries, particularly if purchased from overseas as it may not be child-resistant. The compartment that houses button batteries needs to be child-resistant, such as secured with a screw, so a children can't access it. If a product becomes damaged or broken, a button battery may come loose and be easily ingested by a curious child. Parents should wrap the button battery in sticky tape to make disposal safer, and immediately dispose of it in an outside bin. New button batteries should also be kept out of sight and out of reach from young children at all times.

Another gift that children may have received for Christmas is a trampoline, but they come with a number of safety risks as well, particularly if they're not properly maintained.

Trampolines are designed for one child to use at a time and should be checked regularly to make sure the mat doesn't have holes, the frame is not bent, the leg braces are securely locked and the springs are intact and securely attached at both ends.

Parents should also consider adding safety padding on the frame and springs to avoid injuries if a child accidently hits the frame or springs, as well as a safety net to prevent falling off the trampoline.

Living with History

Pack up yout troubles

When war broke out in 1939, men flocked to the recruiting offices. For many of them it was not so much a sense of patriotism but a desire to survive. Australia had just been through the Great Depression and jobs were still scarce. To men who had spent years carrying their swags and begging for food, six bob a day and tucker sounded pretty good! Most of them had personal knowledge of the way their fathers were treated on their return from the "War to end all wars". They were under no false impression as to what their future would be so they just lived for the present.

The early camps were pretty rough. Those billeted in the animal pens at the Showgrounds considered themselves lucky. It seemed to be Army Policy that anyone with previous culinary experience was automatically barred from work in the cookhouse. Most meals consisted of stew, served out of a blackened cauldron by a sweaty ex-shearer or some such. In my experience, an orderly officer only once entered the mess to ask if there were any complaints. In all fairness, he was a very young and inexperienced officer and he never made that mistake again.

Weapons and equipment were in short supply. Dorky, an old sweat who had lied about his age to join, swore that the rifle he was issued with was the same one he had carried on Gallipoli. Some weapons were taken off war memorials, cleaned up and used for training. Of course, they could not be fired but they made us look a bit more martial.

Most of the instructors were exdiggers. They understood the men and knew how to get the most out of them. A lot of the officers were a different matter. They were members of the Militia, known as "Saturday afternoon"



soldiers". Their attitude was that the rank and file were there to carry out any order given, no matter how stupid. Even so, early in the war the men had worked out ways to handle these types. Dumb insolence, mule like stupidity and even a strike or "Jack up" soon got the message to them. Most of them changed their ways, took advice from the old NCO's and became good officers. The others wrangled transfers and took refuge in office jobs, where they remained until after hostilities, when they emerged as true survivors, complete with good jobs and benefits.

After a shaky start and mostly due to the efforts of a hard core of officers and veterans the various units gradually emerged as a true fighting force. Though few in numbers, in comparison to the rest of the world, our record as an army of fighters was second to none.

BAITING TO PROTECT NATIVE WILDLIFE

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's *Western Shield* program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.



Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered dangerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.





Well it's only six years since reintroductions began and things are getting exciting! Exceptional winter rainfall the last two years has promoted good plant regeneration, providing good food and shelter for our intrepid native animal 'trailblazers' and you might well be wondering how they are faring! So, let's do a 'stock-take' to see how the island is progressing along its reintroduction 'road to recovery'.

Rufous hare-wallaby translocations were completed in 2019 and they are now found over a large portion of the island from Cape Ransonnet at the southern tip to Turtle Bay at the island's northern tip. Banded hare-wallaby reintroductions were completed in 2018 and they continue to steadily expand their range which currently covers much of the lower half of the island north to Herald Bay.

Shark Bay bandicoots released between 2019 and 2020 are breeding like - well, breeding like bandicoots. They can be found almost everywhere from Notch Point in the south, to Withnell Point. Rapidly heading north, they appear to be hell bent on covering the island in their tell-tale diggings, droppings and footprints, and will likely reach Turtle Bay in the near future.

Greater stick-nest rats and Shark Bay mice both began their reintroduction journey to the island last year and those first island populations have now been given a genetic diversity 'booster shot' this year with 'top-up' translocations from other island sources.

This now completes the reintroduction for these two species, and Shark Bay mice appear to be making an enthusiastic job of re-establishing themselves on the island. 'Stickies' continue to be elusive, dodging the more standard monitoring methods, however newly introduced technology allows them to be 'scanned' like a food item at a supermarket checkout as they enter and leave their nest without them even knowing. This new monitoring technique, together with photographs collected from remote cameras, is showing promising signs of success for this species.

Dibbler reintroductions have been ongoing since 2019 and as the numbers of dibblers bred at Perth Zoo and released on the island climb higher, their translocations are likely to end in the near future. And last but most certainly not least, western grasswren translocations were carried out in October this year in a highly organised translocation effort that went like clockwork, completing the seventh of the planned 13 native animal species to be released on the island. Stay tuned to hear their journey in the next Wirrruwana News in early 2023.

Jet setting stickies

Once found right across Australia from Shark Bay to New South Wales, greater stick-nest rats (or 'stickies') are now extinct on the mainland, persisting only in a few fenced enclosures and on several feral animal free islands. To even up the conservation odds for this threatened species, they were returned to Dirk Hartog Island National Park in May last year, making the journey from the nearby Salutation Island in Shark Bay.

In May this year, the *Return to 1616* fauna team took translocations to a new level in an ambitious leap forward to boost the genetic diversity of this new population of guinea-pig sized native rodents.

Backed by many months of planning and logistical lubrication, our intrepid band of fauna scientists and volunteers headed interstate to the remote East and West Franklin Islands off South Australia. Here they joined forces with PhD student Kelly Williams from La Trobe University and staff from the South Australian Department for Environment and Water, including the legendary greater stick-nest rat expert and award-winning ecologist Peter Copley.

The mission? To successfully capture up to 60 individuals from the world's only remaining naturally occurring population of stickies on Franklin Islands, and relocate them to Dirk Hartog Island (Wirruwana). This fresh injection of DNA will genetically reinforce the population, increasing their chance of survival in the future.

The two islands are home to the most genetically diverse population of stickies remaining on Earth and they share the dense, low-lying shrubby habitat with southern brown bandicoots and a notably large population of tiger snakes! A conservation jewel in the Nuyts Archipelago Wilderness Area, the islands are also used by Australian sea lions and various bird species including Cape Barren geese, little penguins, and short-tailed shearwaters whose deep and easily collapsible burrows pepper the terrain like a minefield. Public access to these islands is strictly prohibited to protect these sensitive species and their habitat, and the stickie collection trip was timed to ensure shearwater burrows were unoccupied.

With the weather only allowing a short window of opportunity, a helicopter delivered the team and their equipment to the islands where they established a beach camp along a sheltered cove.

Using thermal imaging, night spotting scopes and spotlighting equipment, they quickly established that a healthy population of stickies was present. The mission could go ahead as planned!

On dusk over the next two evenings, the eager team collected their catching nets and ascended the coastal slopes to reach their guarry. The team braved steep terrain, dense bushes, collapsing shearwater burrows and tiger snakes each night to capture and select their intended quarry of 30 "keepers" by midnight. Individuals were selected based upon size, sex, reproductive status, and condition, before being gently carried back down the slope to the beach camp. A grand total of 24 females and 36 males were collected, and after

receiving a microchip to allow future identification, DNA samples were taken, and their weight and size recorded before being placed into individual wooden transport boxes. These were custom-made by inmates at the Albany Regional Prison Cabinet Shop and lined with a small amount of luxurious pet bedding material for extra comfort. In-flight catering was provided with a mix of freshly sliced apple, carrot, sweet potato and sunflower seeds before their dawn helicopter flight to Ceduna. From here, they boarded a chartered plane heading up, up and away, bound for Monkey Mia Airport in Western Australia. A final helicopter flight to Dirk Hartog Island concluded their whopping 2,160km journey in only nine hours!

Our travellers were kept in airconditioned comfort on arrival while they underwent final health checks. With their journey at an end, their travelling boxes were opened and placed inside new homes or 'proto-nests' (preconstructed piles of intertwined sticks) at a nearby coastal release site. While all of these new island inhabitants will have to face perils posed by native birds of prey, snakes and goannas, they are free to establish a new colony safe from feral cats.

After SO much effort by SO many scientists, conservation staff and volunteers who have come together to add one more "piece of the puzzle" and progress one of the world's most important conservation projects. It's good to know how you can help.

As this small population struggles to establish a new community, take care when you visit Wirruwana and observe the following advice on how to keep them safe.

You can help!

Two years of above-average winter rainfall has provided good food and shelter for the fledgling, new native animal populations that have been returned to Dirk Hartog Island National Park, and they appear to be doing well. It's early days though, and populations of these animals are still small and fragile. Losing even one animal can have a detrimental effect.

Earlier this year, dog footprints were found close to the release site of greater stick-nest rats! After all the hard work that has gone into returning native animals to the island, this is something that no scientist ever wants to see. Whilst it's generally well understood that dogs are not permitted in national parks, it's particularly important on Dirk Hartog Island. It only takes a few seconds for a dog to have a serious impact on a small, newly introduced population of precious, threatened native animals.

Giving each individual animal as much protection as possible can have a really positive effect and it's good to know that we can all 'do our bit' and help protect this internationally significant wildlife restoration project. Helping these fragile populations is easy. Watch the island protection video and

You can help these precious native animals on their road to recovery by avoiding driving from dusk to dawn when they are active to keep them safe.


From little things, big things grow. Every small protection measure that visitors take while on the island adds up to a bright future for these vulnerable Australians.

Our on-water presence in the Gascoyne recently received a boost, with a Fisheries patrol boat permanently based at Carnaryon

The 9.5 metre FD10 is a Naiad-design, well known for its sea keeping abilities while maintaining swiftness and safety on the water. Newly refurbished, it has history as a former sea rescue boat based in Broome.

As a sea rescue vessel, it was formerly named Redbill II in honour of a lugger built in Fremantle in 1903, which made its mark in the pearling industry for decades, but was lost in a cyclone in Broome in April 2000.

As a patrol vessel, FD10 has been fitted with an awesome array of technology to support our officers in the Gascoyne, including an infrared night vision camera to assist in search and rescue operations. The patrol boat's communication assets will also help ensure crew safety and enable real-time intelligence gathering.


