

# **Executive Officer's Report**

### Overdue annual information statements

More than 12,500 associations in Western Australia are overdue with lodging an annual information statement with Consumer Protection.

As a result, Consumer Protection has recently sent out emails to over 7,000 associations requesting they lodge the overdue statements. Some associations have never lodged a statement with Consumer Protection and may no longer be operating. Defunct associations can have their incorporation status cancelled and be deregistered by Consumer Protection.

Please act immediately if you are contacted by Consumer Protection staff about an overdue information statement. Lodging a statement is relatively easy and it confirms that the association is still operating and meeting its obligations under the Act.

### Grants

Inspiring WA are delighted to announce that grants of up to \$8,000 are available for organisations wishing to run a STEM (science, technology, engineering or mathematics) engagement initiative between July 2023 – January 2024.

They're specifically looking for Initiatives which can; Cater to regional and remote communities, First Nations communities, and women & girls, promote women in STEM, or promote First Nations contributions to STEM.

The increased funding reflects our commitment to funding projects with ongoing and lasting impacts. Up to 20% of the grant is available to cover project management costs to support your organisation in delivering an engaging program.

### Shark Bay Fiesta

The 28<sup>th</sup> annual Shark Bay Fiesta has come to a close with our hard working team catching up on plenty of sleep and finally getting our houses, lives and work schedules back in order. Our community is drawn together to host this event, running events collaboratively thanks to grant funding and financial assistance, sponsorship and donations from commmunity, local and regional businesses and governement organisations. The event brings large economical benefits to Shark Bay, not just at local shops but by allowing avenues for community groups and individuals to fundraise or make some money.

It's still the early stages of wrapping up the event finances however over the last few years we break even. This year we have seen around \$75,000 worth of income alone come through the CRC for the Fiesta. We are thrilled with the success of the event especially the financial rewards our local community groups received fundraising. Reports of finances and participation results back from community groups and activities include;

 \$2,970 of funds were raised through catering and a raffle to assist with travel costs for local student Kealee Poland to particpate in her WA State Basketball team as she was recently selected.

- Shark Bay P&C Association -\$1,697.72 from a money board and catering lunch and dinners.
- Shark Bay Bowling, Sport & Recreation Club is still calculating their profits but took \$407 from bar sales at the Bingo event held in their Club.




- Katrina Steadall & Lisa Storman cooked up a storm for
- the 85 people who attended the High tea ticketed event. Shark Bay Arts Council - made and sold 12 headpieces for the High tea with an additional 3 sold on the day. An easy \$150.
- The Cancer Council Biggest Morning tea cancer fundraiser raised \$458.50 with a special thanks to Lisa and Pedro for kindly donating plant prizes for a raffle.
- \$109.80 was raised on our Pirate Day fundraiser at Kindy Gym which has all been donated to the official Pirate Day fundraising group raising funds to support childhood brain cancer research.
- \$390 was raised for a Real Futures Youth Program in our community.

    - 30 kids day canvas paintings
    - 88 attended the High tea
    - 22 adults at the watercolour workshop
    - 22 kids & parents at the kids watercolour workshop
    - 17 attended the Sleep & Wellness presentation by Red Cross
    - 37 competed in daily fun challenges
    - 277 people experienced the virtual reality RAC Rescue helicopter experience
    - 8 joined in the Sea Shantie singing workshops
    - 7 made their own no sew bags
    - 57 to the Outdoor Clnema for National Volunteer Week
- Over 15 markets stalls for the weekend.
- Over 800 meals were served.

These above organisations and groups did an amazing job catering or hosting fundraisers, especially when they can't predict the attendance numbers which is subject to weather the majority of the time.

A big thank you to all our sponsors with acknowledgement to the Shire of Shark Bay for contributing \$8,000, Recfishwest for their Catch & Release fishing support of \$5,500, Real Futures \$5,000 contributions for free community workshops and the Gascoyne Development Commission for their \$500 contribution. We had plenty of other amazing financial and goods support from local, regional and state businesses as well as fishers which is all used to subsidise everything over the course of the week including the free entertainment.



# Joint planning for & management of Malgana Country parks & reserves (Shark Bay/Gathaagudu)

We recognise and acknowledge Malgana people as the traditional owners of Shark Bay/Gathaagudu and pay our respects to them, their culture and Elders past and present.

Joint management is a partnership between traditional owners and the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) to work together to care for and provide ongoing protection and management of Country on Western Australia's conservation estate. Malgana Aboriginal Corporation and DBCA have commenced work towards the joint management of existing and proposed parks and reserves of Malgana Country within Shark Bay.

### Indigenous Land Use Agreement and Joint Management Agreement

Malgana and DBCA are currently negotiating an Indigenous Land Use Agreement (ILUA) to agree how jointly managed parks and reserves will be used and managed. A Joint Management Agreement (JMA) will also be negotiated outlining how Malgana and DBCA will provide recommendations and make decisions about managing conservation estate, including protecting Malgana sites and values.

Conservation estate to be jointly managed

The existing reserves in Shark Bay proposed to be jointly managed include Francois Peron National Park, Dirk Hartog Island National Park and Shell Beach Conservation Park.

Proposed areas where the creation of jointly managed conservation reserves are being considered include:

- South Peron,
- Ex Nanga pastoral lease
- Part ex Carrarang pastoral lease
- Part ex Yaringa pastoral lease
- Part ex Pimbee pastoral lease


Most of the areas under consideration are also within the Shark Bay World Heritage Area.

There are also proposed parks and reserves on Nanda Country, south of Useless Loop Road, within the Shark Bay World Heritage Area, that are being considered for joint management, via a separate process with Nanda Aboriginal Corporation.

### Joint management plan

Joint management also includes the development of a joint management plan which considers the natural, cultural, visitor use, community, economic and resource use values of the existing and proposed parks and reserves and outlines long-term management objectives and strategies to protect these. The joint management plan will be the guiding document for the existing and new parks and reserves, outlining how the values will be protected, the overall management approach and what activities can occur.



The joint management plan will be developed in consultation with the community, to Photo - Steve Reynolds, DBCA incorporate community ideas and aspirations. There will be various opportunities for



input from the community during the preparation of the draft joint management plan. The community and stakeholders will also have a say on the draft joint management plan when it is released for a two-month public comment period, and preparation of the final management plan will take those comments into account.



# BAITING TO PROTECT NATIVE WILDLIFE

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's *Western Shield* program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.



Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered dangerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.



Although it has been a relatively quiet month on the callout front with just two calls for assistance to search for a missing prospector halfway between Mount Magnet and Cue, the team has still been quite busy. We also donated sand bags towards the sand art that occured on the beach during the Creality event on the 7<sup>th</sup> of May. It was all hands on deck to set up the catering area for this year's Fiesta which is something the Unit has done for a number of years now. We donate the use of our marquees for the event which are part of the equipment from our search trailer that would normally be used to set up forward operating bases during search and rescue operations, or just to supply some shade for our volunteers while on deployment. It's always a welcome refresher for us to re familiarise ourselves with the equipment and to test our knot tying skills.

We have also taken delivery of some new tools and equipment that will expand our search and rescue capabilities. One piece of equipment we are super excited about is a sling shot to help launch ropes over buildings to assist setting up our roof safety system when doing our roof repair work. I'm sure this will make for some fun training sessions as we are told they take a bit of getting used to before you master them.

There are a few training opportunities coming up throughout the region,

with members heading away for search training and some leadership training. One of our members is also heading away next month to complete a trainer assessor course. Once completed this will open a whole new training avenue with our Unit to be able to hold a lot more local training to ensure members stay up to date.

A huge thank you to everyone that supported WOW day this year. Although it was celebrated on the 17<sup>th</sup> of May, we held our event a week later to tie in with the Shark Bay Fiesta. Thanks also goes to Red Cross that came along to hold a wellness and sleep presentation. It was great to see all the orange worn amongst the crowd including an entire boat crew who entered the fishing competition.

# **Living with History - Bonfire**

After the war the local race meetings were revived in all the Nor'West towns. They were the social event of the year and people thought nothing of travelling hundreds of miles with their horses to the various meetings.

The races were for grass-fed horses and amateur riders, so a lot was left to the honesty of the racing fraternity. Most meetings were dominated by the squattocracy as they had the horses to pick from and the money to train them. The price of wool was up, money was plentiful and some of the men who considered themselves the cream of local society were not averse to resorting to a bit of skulduggery - such as employing rubbed-out jockeys as riders and trainers, and stabling the horses to feed them up for weeks prior to the races.

Arthur, a old Roebourne truck driver, acquired a horse. It was called Bonfire and its pedigree was unknown. Ross, another driver who had some station experience, was to ride it. Bonfire was nominated for the main race on Saturday, which was the Ladies Bracelet. At the Calcutta sweep on Friday night, Arthur bought his horse cheaply as the only people interested in Bonfire were all his mates.

Grass-fed races were only run over four furlongs so it was flat out from the word go. On Saturday, Ron jumped Bonfire out and was never heeded. Arthur proudly led in his first winner.

The prize presentations were held that night at the dance, which was in the cleared dining room of the old Victoria Hotel. When Arthur's coloured wife, Elsie, who all the truckers fondly called Mum, fronted up to receive the Ladies Bracelet, there were a few well-bred noses turned up but, on the whole, it was a popular win.

Arthur had the taste of victory now,

so at the family conference on Sunday he announced that Bonfire was in the cup on Monday. Ron was confident. He reckoned if Bonny did not win it would have to be a good horse that beat him. At the Calcutta Sweep on Monday morning, they had a stroke of luck: Ron's wife Shirley drew Bonfire in the sweep, so with this advantage they managed to buy him.

The Cup was the last race of the afternoon. Arthur and Ron spent the whole afternoon sitting in the stall with Bonfire. I think the little horse was the least nervous of the three of them. When they lined up for the Cup, a smart cheeky type on a favoured Port Hedland horse tried to jostle and upset Bonfire but when the starter said go, Bonny went. It was Bonfire first, the rest nowhere.

At the Race Ball that night, when Arthur lined up to receive the Cup in his usual dress of well-washed dungorees and flannel it put a bit of a damper on proceedings. The main celebration, however, was in the Front Bar of the Vic. Every trucker and lumper in town had backed Bonfire. That was the year they changed a lot of the rules. It's hard for a battler to win nowadays!

# Keep your wits when buying tickets

Live sport and music lovers will be spoilt for choice in the coming months, as Western Australia gets set to host to a slew of major international events.

Competition for tickets to the likes of the FIFA Women's World Cup, Coldplay and P!NK has been fierce, so it's never been more important for WA consumers to stay on the ball when trying to secure their own seat or spot.

We have no doubt ticket scalpers and scammers will come crawling out of the woodwork to offer tickets on resale sites or online classifieds that either don't exist or are at illegally inflated prices.

That's why your safest option is to always buy tickets through the authorised ticketing agent, or via its authorised resale site if you miss out.

Before snapping up tickets to any event, it's important to check whether they come with a 'resale restriction.' If they do, it means you cannot sell them for more than a 10 per cent mark-up and you may have issues transferring them into a different name should you no longer be able to attend. When advertising tickets with resale restrictions, resellers must also remember to include the original ticket cost (including booking fees) and details of the seat row and number.

Event goers can rest assured that when major concerts or sporting competitions are advertised, our compliance officers proactively monitor resale sites and online classifieds for fake tickets and to ensure genuine resale tickets comply with the legislation, in addition to investigating complaints about misconduct.

Following one such investigation earlier this year, Consumer Protection issued five \$2000 infringement notices to scalpers who illegally advertised tickets to the Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC 284) event for up to 430 per cent more than they originally paid for them.

We want consumers to help us stop ticket scalpers and scammers in their tracks. The first thing to do if you've bought a ticket that doesn't comply with the law is to ask for a refund from the supplier or individual seller. Failing this, you may be able to seek a chargeback from your bank if you paid by credit card.

# Breaking the bonds that tie tenants to landlords

When you walk away from a tenancy, an important next step is working out how the security bond paid at the start of the lease will be distributed between tenant and landlord.

Tenants may be relying on getting back the money to help with finding a new place to live, while landlords may need some – or all – of the funds to cover damage or cleaning costs.

In 2022, only 36 per cent of tenants received all of their security bond back, according to new figures from the Bonds Administration Branch at Consumer Protection. A portion of the funds was paid out to around 51 per cent of tenants, while 12 per cent relinquished all of the money.

In other cases, neither the landlord nor tenant have laid claim to what was rightfully theirs at all – as the \$4.15 million in unclaimed funds sitting with the Bonds Administrator and Department of Treasury currently shows.

With this huge unclaimed sum relating to tenancies that ended since 1990, we have been urging tenants and landlords (both past and present) to conduct a simple check on the Service WA app or the Treasury website to check whether they are owed any of this money.

When it comes to getting your own bond back, the property condition report (PCR) signed by all parties at the beginning of the tenancy is a key document that can be used to determine what damage, if any, occurred throughout the tenancy in case there is any disagreement. For this reason, we also recommend tenants take photos of the property when they move in and include those photos with the PCR when it is returned to the landlord or agent.

All bonds must be lodged by the landlord or property manager with the Bond Administrator within 14 days of receiving the money, meaning landlords have no right to keep any amount paid as a security bond, unless agreed by the tenant or stipulated in a court order.

We offer a free conciliation service to tenants who are in dispute with their landlord over the return of their bond, or if a dispute can't be resolved, either party may make an application for orders to the Magistrates Court of WA.

# **Country Stargazing**

### Have You Seen the Emu In The Sky?

One of the most incredible objects to see in the night sky is the Aboriginal constellation of the Emu In The Sky. It lies within the band of the Milky Way and its shape is outlined by dark areas of the night sky, not the stars. The Emu is best seen throughout winter in dark country skies and is spectacular, spreading right across the evening sky.

To find it, first locate the Southern Cross constellation above the southern horizon. Two bright stars directly above due south are, "the Pointers" to the Southern Cross. The Southern Cross is to the right of "the Pointers".

On the left-hand side of the Southern Cross, try to find a dark oval shape, called the Coalsack Nebula. This is the head of the Emu with the beak pointing downward. The long neck stretches to the left through the middle of "the Pointers". The body and legs of the Emu stretch halfway across the horizon towards the east.

When to look: 8.30pm, mid-June.

### Which direction to look: South.

South Western Australia's Indigenous people lived by six seasons. When the Emu is seen high in the sky, it indicates weather is changing and getting colder and wetter. This season is called Makuru and was a time to move inland for

# **Fisheries - DPIRD Media**

This month may just be the busiest month of the year for recreational fishing in the Shark Bay region, as holidaymakers head north for warmer weather. Shark Bay's inner gulfs are one of the most popular destinations for boat-based fishers in Western Australia and ensuring fishers are sticking to the rules is vital to maintaining the fishing experience.

One of the attractions of the Shark Bay inner gulfs pink snapper resource is that it offers recreational fishers the opportunity to catch trophy-size fish in a unique setting. However, there are specific fishing rules in place during this period to help preserve each of the separate breeding stocks of pink snapper in the gulfs to ensure future fishing experiences.

A pink snapper closure is in place for May, June and July in the Eastern Gulf to provide protection for the breeding aggregations which occur during this period in that area, which is critical for sustaining this stock. In addition, to protect the Freycinet Estuary stock, pink snapper fishing is not allowed in this location between 15 August and 30 September (inclusive).

It is important to note that these rules are in place because there is limited mixing between the pink snapper stocks in Shark Bay's three inner gulfs and the wider-ranging oceanic population, so being small and reproductively isolated makes all of the inner gulf stocks vulnerable to overfishing.

Director for Regional Compliance in the Midwest and Gascoyne, Mick Kelly said with the current peak season attracting fishers to the region right now, it's important for

them to note the recreational fishing rules for the inner gulfs are different to the pink snapper rules that apply in all other areas of the Gascoyne.



"Recreational boat-based fishers in Shark Bay's inner

gulfs can land two pink snapper per day per licensed fisher, provided they are at least 50 centimetres long," Mr Kelly said. "If you catch two pink snapper, you can take three other demersal finfish within the total mixed species bag limit.

"In other areas of the Gascoyne, outside Shark Bay's inner gulfs, the minimum size limit for pink snapper is 41 centimetres and the bag limit is three, but the mixed species bag limit is five.

"Fishers need to be aware that the inner gulf rules apply when landing pink snapper at a boat ramp such as Denham, even if the fish were caught outside the inner gulfs.

"Earlier this month, DPIRD Fisheries Officers inspected a group of people fishing at Shark Bay who had all exceeded their daily limit by more than twice the legal limit. The four people involved are facing prosecution for exceeding their possession limit of fillets and whole fish."

The rules for fishers are available in the Recreational fishing guide 2023. A map of the Shark Bay region and the respective pink snapper closure dates are available on page 60 of the guide.
