

Shire President's Report

Grant Funded Projects and Submissions - In ProgressWork is continuing on the following local community programs;

- Installation of hard shade shelters foreshore adventure park
- Matting and beach wheelchairs to improve accessibility to town beach area
- New reticulation and resurfaced lawn areas town oval
- Installation of additional solar streetlights and CCTV cameras.

Funding of \$70 000 has been confirmed from the Department of Transport for the dual use pathway along Stella Rowley Drive and this project continues to be implemented, which will ultimately extend and complete this pathway.

Phase 3 of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) funding will also support a much-needed upgrade of the air conditioning systems in the Discovery Centre.

Senior Shire staff have been exploring options to expand Denham's social housing infrastructure, including additional aged pensioner units, utilising the \$4.1m in funding secured through Round 2 of the Social Housing and Economic Recovery Package grant.

Funding has been requested for the following projects;

- An application for funding of \$100,000 was submitted in November 2022 to Live Music Australia for a Beats in the Bay Festival 2023.
- The outcome of several additional funding applications to conduct a Beats in the Bay Festival 2023 are still awaited from Horizon Power, Lotterywest and the Tourism WA Regional Events Scheme.
- An application for \$2,361.314 to the Coastal and Estuarine Risk Management Program for an upgraded/ extended seawall along the Denham foreshore has been partially successful, with \$1.76m being awarded by the Federal Government. We are currently awaiting an announcement from the Minister regarding the outcome of the remaining funding application.

The Crew in Blue

A busy month since the last Inscription Post, Easter, the Total Solar Eclipse and school holidays have passed without any major incidents.

We would like to thank all of the community groups that assisted and were on standby during this busy period. Thank you also to FESA Shark Bay for organising a joint exercise, which also included St John Ambulance Shark Bay, SES Shark Bay, Monkey Mia Airport and us. These exercises are invaluable for our ongoing preparedness should an major incident occur.

We would also especially like to thank St John Ambulance Shark Bay that have donated two defibrillators to us to be placed in our vehicles, allowing us to respond better prepared for a possible medical emergency. The work that SJA Shark Bay do is remarkable and we would like to encourage community members to volunteer for this vital service, and help to lighten the load of the few that perform this role currently.

You would have noticed increased Police presence in town and surrounds. This is in an ongoing effort to keep you safe when travelling on the road and during the peak period involving the total solar eclipse. Due to its success, the extra support will continue to occur from time to time in the area.

We are working with the Shire of Shark Bay in an effort to increase the CCTV availability in the townsite. This is in an effort to combat the increase in reported anti-social behaviour that is occurring generally after dark at the foreshore, skatepark and in the vicinity of the basketball courts/recreation ground. We would encourage people to continue to report these incidents, so that action can be taken

BAITING TO PROTECT NATIVE WILDLIFE

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's *Western Shield* program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.

Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered award angerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.

WIRRUWANA NEWS UPDATES FROM DIRK HARTOG ISLAND NATIONAL PARK AUTUMN 2023

With seven threatened and priority native animal species now established on Dirk Hartog Island National Park, see how the science team is working smarter not harder to keep tabs on them all and prepare for new arrivals.

Seven species of Australian native animals have now been returned to Dirk Hartog Island National Park as a result of the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions' ecological restoration project *Return to 1616*. Given that wild populations of many of these animals are extinct on the mainland – it begs the question - where have they all come from?


Many species like hare-wallabies, dibblers, Shark Bay bandicoots, Shark Bay mice and greater stick-nest rats have only survived the impact of feral animals thanks to the safe haven offered by feral free islands off the coast of Western Australia. Re-establishing native animals on Dirk Hartog Island has been made possible by careful management of these isolated populations.

Whilst we're lucky to have these surviving populations to draw upon in order to repopulate safe areas like Dirk Hartog Island National Park, how many animals can safely be removed in order to create a new population? The answer isn't simple. Not too many and not too few – that's the 'Goldilocks equation'. It's important to take enough animals with adequate genetic diversity to successfully breed a new population elsewhere.

In other words, despite the tale of Noah's Ark where animals went in two by two, it takes a lot more than two dibblers to produce a healthy new population. It's just as important to not take too many animals, as this would undermine the future survival of that source population. It's therefore essential to know the size of a source population before translocations can occur.

Many factors can affect the size of an animal population. For instance, animals species living in arid environments are adapted to take advantage of good rainfall years.

Breeding during good rainfall years can lead to a boom in population size, whilst numbers decline during drought in what is commonly called a 'boom/bust' cycle. Understanding how vegetation and habitat is responding to changing

environmental conditions, and where a population is in that boom/bust cycle, is critical to solving the Goldilocks equation for each species.

Whilst island populations have provided a welcome pool of animals to help repopulate Dirk Hartog Island National Park, studying animals on offshore islands creates a unique set of challenges. The logistics of obtaining the information needed to solve the Goldilocks equation is an order of magnitude more complex when working on remote islands.

Some of the source populations of animals already reintroduced to Dirk Hartog Island National Park have come from far afield, such as Shark Bay mice that came from Northwest Island in the Montebello Islands

The grasswrens have landed!

Western grasswrens (*Amytornis textilis*) have undergone one of the largest range contractions of any Australian bird species since European colonisation. Formerly occurring from Shark Bay right across Australia to the Eyre Peninsula in South Australia, they are now only found in Shark Bay and the Eyre Peninsula.

Although locally extinct on Dirk Hartog Island as a result of habitat degradation by sheep and goats and predation by feral cats, healthy populations persist on the nearby Hamelin Station, a property that is owned and managed by Bush Heritage Australia, as well as Francois Peron National Park managed by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions.

The western grasswren is an unusual species behaving much more like a mammal than a bird! Rather than flying, they prefer to bound from bush to bush staying close to the ground. Not being strong fliers, they are unlikely to ever be able to recolonise Dirk Hartog Island National Park without some help.

Scientists estimate that the island is capable of supporting up to 8,000 pairs of grasswrens. Given their habitat is improving with excellent vegetation regrowth following the removal of goats and sheep, the time is ripe! So in October 2022, the carefully planned and precisely coordinated "operation grasswren" swung into action.

This first ever translocation of any grasswren species was the culmination of several years of collaborative work by staff in DBCA's *Return to 1616* project, scientists from Biodiversity and Conservation Science, as well as their Denham-based colleagues from the Parks and Wildlife. Service's Gascoyne District. Also, forming important components of this collaboration were ecologist and field staff from Bush Heritage Australia as well as PhD student Aline Gibson Vega from the University of Western Australia.

Prior to this work, there was very little information available on western grasswrens. Initially their cryptic habits meant they were more easily heard than seen and difficult to catch. Over time however, capture methods have been refined, paving the way for their reintroduction. Scientists now have a better understanding of western grasswren genetics and breeding biology which has helped to plan their translocation and greatly increased their chances of successfully establishing a new island population.

Also based on this research, their journey from Hamelin Station and Francois Peron National Park to Dirk Hartog Island National Park was timed to allow adult birds to finish breeding for the year and their offspring to reach an age where they can survive on their own. Captured using specifically designed nets looking much like a spider web called 'mist-nets', they were then flown to the island via helicopter and quickly released within only hours of capture.

This translocation completes the seventh species to be returned to Dirk Hartog Island. In the short term, their survival will be monitored using transmitters attached to some of the birds but later on, their progress will be monitored by recording western grasswren calls using Audio Recording Units.

Stickie detective work

Reintroductions of the greater stick-nest rat to Dirk Hartog Island National Park began in 2021. As for other species released on the island, the Return to 1616 team needs to check on their progress to see how well they're establishing themselves in their new home. But keeping tabs on stickies using traditional methods is tricky as they can be a secretive, 'trap shy' species. Time to think outside the square and try a new toolkit.

The newest tool in the science team's detective toolkit is showing promising results. Before release onto the island, all of the stickies were microchipped to allow individuals to be identified. The science team has been collaborating with Latrobe University to trial a new, passive scanning device they have developed called Wildtrack, that acts in a similar way to supermarket bar code scanners.

When a stickie walks close enough to or over an antenna placed on the ground, their microchip is scanned and the animal's individual number is uploaded to a database. This provides information on the individual and can be used to monitor survival, distribution and if enough microchips are detected, the system may be able to help determine population size.

Traditional spotlighting at night has been used to detect animals but thick vegetation can make this method less effective. To improve detection and reduce impact on the stickies, infra-red night vision scopes have been found to improve the science team's detective work.



Camera traps have proven their worth as another low impact monitoring method. These can be set to face bundles of sticks and twigs called 'protonests' that were provided to the stickies when first released on the island. Female stickies love to build and improve their nests and, in some instances, these cameras have revealed some amazing imagery of stick-nest rats building nests. Other ways to gather information on the distribution of stickies around their home include looking for tracks and animal droppings (or scats). If the scat is fresh enough, it can be genetically analysed to identify the individual that produced it and research is currently underway to determine if this can be used to gauge population numbers.

Piecing together all of the clues from hours of detective work using combinations of these methods, has created a mountain of data that is pointing towards a very promising future for the greater stick-nest rat on the island.

Marine Rescue Shark Bay



The new 12m vessel build is progressing well in Geraldton.







Living with History - Stella Rowley

When I came here to Denham in the early 60's, we were pretty isolated. Any rain closed both the road and the airstrip. The then Flying Doctor service had few and smaller planes and were often busy elsewhere. Stella Rowley, our resident nurse, often had to cope with no advice or assistance.

I was working for Planet Fisheries when the management decided to build a large coolroom using local labour. Part of the construction consisted of a double wall between which a mixture of chemicals was poured. It was supposed to set into an insulating foam. Trouble was no-one told us, that while setting, it gave off lethal fumes. Very soon four workers were suffering flu like symptoms. Then Desy, the elderly foreman, collapsed.

Stella contacted Carnarvon by phone and was advised to get him to the Overlander where they would meet her with a doctor. They had further to come but had mostly bitumen. We had none and no ambulance either! The best vehicle

available was Bill, the publican's, new Ford station wagon. We loaded Desy on a mattress in the back, together with Stella and some make shift oxygen supply I knocked up in the factory workshop and Bill took off!



Bill told us later that Desy's heart stopped twice on the way out and Stella managed to bring him back. The Carnarvon ambulance was waiting at the Overlander. They would not risk our road but they got Desy to hospital in time. That was just one of the lives that Stella saved!



Consumer Watch

Avoid being billed for paper bills

Next time you spot a bill in the letterbox, it could be worth looking into whether you're being charged extra to receive this correspondence in the mail and how you might avoid paying the fee if so.

A growing number of service providers now charge a fee to cover the costs of printing and posting your bill. That list recently expanded to include Telstra, which reportedly cited 'environmental reasons' as the reason many of its customers would need to pay \$2.20 each time they received a bill in the mail after 20 May 2023.

Not all of Telstra's customers will need to pay the paper billing fee – those who have a valid health care, pension concession or Department of Veteran's Affairs card are exempt. The charge will also not apply to customers who don't have an email address or access to an active internet service, as well as those who require special bill formats, such as braille or large print.

There are numerous reasons why other companies may elect to not charge fees, such as those customers who receive income support or are on a hardship program.

The best way to find out if you are eligible for an exemption is to contact each of your providers to ask if you qualify for an exemption from paper bill fees, and how to apply.

If you're not eligible, then the easiest way to avoid paying a paper billing fee is to switch to online billing and receive your bills by email or via the company's app or website.

Over the course of a year, these charges for paper billing all add up, especially for people on a low income. By opting out of paper billing or claiming the fee exemption, you could save a considerable amount each year.

Also remember to be wary about fake billing scams via phone calls or emails. Scammers sometimes try to trick consumers by sending emails that look like they are from a legitimate company. The email may ask you to send money for an overdue account.

Consumers who are eligible for an exemption but are having trouble getting their exemption request processed should contact Consumer Protection for help by emailing consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au or by calling 1300 30 40 54. Beware the new breed of bank scams

Scammers have been pretending to call or text from financial institutions for years, but it's the latest twist on these banking impersonation scams that should have all consumers on high alert.



The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) raised the alarm after reports to Scamwatch indicated new technology was being used to make scam calls look like they were coming from the bank's legitimate phone number and to allow scam texts to appear in the same conversation thread as genuine bank messages.

These tricks mean it may not be possible for consumers to distinguish a real message or call from those that aren't based on a phone number or message thread alone, and sadly many are falling victim.

Since January 2022, our WA ScamNet team has heard from 20 victims who reportedly lost \$1.9 million to bank impersonation scams. When you consider that's an average loss of almost \$96,000 per person, it's clear just how financially and emotionally devastating these scams can be. One WA victim's bank account was drained of almost \$41,000, after she answered a call from the same number as one listed on the back of her credit card. Posing as a bank employee, the scammer claimed her accounts had been hacked as a ruse to gain control of her finances.

A big red-flag is communications that come with a sense of urgency, such as claims of fraudulent activity or a frozen account. No matter how legitimate the call or message seems, a bank will never ask you to urgently transfer funds. We urge all WA consumers to 'practice the pause' to stop scammers in their tracks. If you receive an SMS with a phone number to call, do not use it. Instead, call your bank direct on a number you have sourced yourself. Likewise, hang up if you receive a call from someone claiming to be from your bank requesting you to transfer money to 'keep it safe'. Ask for a reference number and call your bank back using contact details you have found independently.

Never provide online banking passwords, one-time security codes, pins or tokens to anyone over the phone.

Country Stargazing

It's Milky Way Season!

One of the most incredible objects to see in the night sky is the stunning band of the Milky Way as it makes a starry arc across the night sky.

Astrophotographers often refer to this time of the year, from mid-autumn to mid spring, as the "Milky Way Season"! That's because, during this time of year, we look towards the centre or core of our Milky Way Galaxy. It's dense with stars and stretches across the dark night sky in country WA. Astrophotographers love it!

The Milky Way is best seen when there's no moonlight and you're away from bright city lights. What you're looking for

is a band of cloudy or dusty looking light that stretches from the south east to the south west. It looks like a cloud, but it's actually billions of stars that make up the Milky Way Galaxy, our home in the Universe.

It is worth noting that many people around the world never see the Milky Way, as they live in areas or cities with heavy light pollution. But out in country WA, under a moonless sky, the view is quite simply spectacular and memorable.

When to look: After sunset on moonless nights, 6:30pm, between 12th May - 23rd May. It will also be visible right through to the end of October.

Which direction to look: South.

Another beautiful cosmic view to enjoy will be on the 23rd of May when we have the Venus and Moon show! The Evening Star, Venus, will be glowing brilliantly with the lovely thin slither of the Moon sitting directly below, providing a special duet in the sky.

When to look: End of Twilight on the 23rd of May.

Which direction to look: North west.

After a busy day it is very calming to gaze upon the starry night sky. Make the time to go out and look up at natures astronomical It is a window wonders.



If you call the Shark Bay Health Centre after hours you will be transferred through to Health Direct where a Registered Nurse will ask you a number of questions to determine whether you need further emergency assessment by the Shark Bay nurse. If you require further assessment, your call will be put through to the local nurse.

Examples of an EMERGENCY include:

- Breathing difficulties
- Chest pain
- Severe abdominal pain
- Bleeding that can't be controlled with first aid
- Convulsions and fits
- **Deep lacerations**
- Eye or ear injuries
- Uncontrolled high fever
- Loss of consciousness
- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour
