Executive Officer's Report



The Department of Transport (DoT) has jsut advised they will soon announce the launch of the new safety equipment regulations for recreational vessels in WA.

The introduction of the new WA Safety Equipment regulations is a response of a review process that has taken place over a period of years. DoT conducted the review to ensure that WA has a contemporary safety equipment regime that maximises safety for the boating community.

DoT will be running a state-wide education campaign regarding the changes featuring recently retired AFL footballer and marine biologist David Mundy telling boat owners 'It's time to get on board'.

The new key laws affecting recreational vessels, personal watercraft (PWC), tenders and sailing dinghies include:

- Carriage of an appropriate lifejacket for each person on board a vessel when on the water in WA.
- Compulsory wearing of a lifejacket (Level 100) when more than 400 metres offshore in unprotected waters for children aged between one and 12 years and for everyone on board when the vessel is less than 4.8 metres.
- When required, use of a GPS enabled emergency position indicating radio beacon (EPIRB), or GPS enabled personal locator beacon (PLB) phased in over five years.
- Five-year transition to more reliable VHF and HF radios required when four nautical miles offshore.

Further regulations will follow to capture windsurfers, kiteboards, and paddlecraft, for the moment the current regulations for these craft will continue.

The following frequently asked questions have been extracted directly from to DoT website and relate to upcoming changes to the required safety equipment for recreational vessels including PWCs and paddle craft, sailboards, tenders, sailing dinghies and other non-registrable craft.

When will the new safety equipment requirements apply?

It's planned that the new laws will be in place prior to summer 2023/24. The reforms will be implemented in two stages with changes for registered vessels taking effect first, and followed by changes for windsurfers, kiteboards and some paddle craft.

Lifejackets

My vessel is 4.8m exactly, will the lifejacket wearing rules apply to me?

Vessels 4.8 metres and larger will only be required to carry a lifejacket for everyone on board when operating beyond 400 metres in unprotected waters.

The lifejacket wearing rule only applies on vessels less

than 4.8 metres. For example, if your vessel is 4.79 metres, everyone on board will be required to wear a lifejacket when the vessel is operating beyond 400 metres in unprotected waters.

But if you have children on board, the vessel length doesn't matter. All children aged between one and 12 years must wear a lifejacket when on board any vessel operating beyond 400m in unprotected waters.

Will it be compulsory for children to wear a lifejacket on vessels and craft?

Children aged one to 12 years on board any vessel will be required to wear a lifejacket (minimum level 100) when the vessel is operating in unprotected waters.

Children on board personal water craft (PWC) will be required to wear a lifejacket (50S minimum) at all times.

I like to kiteboard, windsurf, and ride on my paddle craft; will I need to wear a lifejacket?

Yes, paddle craft, kiteboards and windsurfers are non-registerable vessels so you will need to wear a lifejacket (50S) minimum when operating beyond 400m of shore. These rules will come into effect in Stage Two.

If I'm surfing a break further than 400m from shore, will I be breaking the law if I don't wear a lifejacket?

You are not required to wear a lifejacket while operating stand-up paddleboards, non-motorised surfboards, or body/boogie boards.

Vessel and craft requirements

What is a registrable vessel and a non-registrable vessel?

A registrable vessel is:

 any vessel that is or may be propelled by mechanical power, including vessels ordinarily propelled by sail

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only, and

 used wholly for recreational use or sporting activities and not for hire or reward.

All registrable vessels must be registered with DoT if they are in or are used in any navigable waters.

Non-registrable vessels include sailboards, kiteboards, non-motorised paddle craft, tenders and sailing dinghies. These vessels are not required to be registered with DoT.

Stand-up paddleboards, non-motorised surfboards and boogie boards are not considered to be registrable or non-registrable vessels and are not subject to any safety equipment requirements. However, you're encouraged to consider your safety and appropriate equipment for the conditions.

I only use my boat on the river, or on lakes for water skiing. Will I be affected by the safety equipment changes?

Yes. It's planned in the 2023/24 summer boating season, with the new laws in place, all recreational vessels will be required to carry a lifejacket with a minimum buoyancy of level 100 for each person on board in all waters.

During consultation, the community strongly supported increasing lifejacket carriage requirements.

Will my tender need to carry safety equipment under the new laws?

Yes, following the introduction of the new rules, tenders will require safety equipment but following the introduction of Stage Two, tenders will join the non-registrable vessel category and those requirements will apply.

Did you know you need to register your tender if you use if for any other purpose than lifesaving or for transport to and from your larger registered vessel – such as for fishing?

Once your tender is registered, the safety equipment requirements for registerable vessels will apply.

I windsurf in the ocean. Will I need to carry safety equipment on me if I travel further than 400m from shore?

Yes. Once the new rules are in place, safety equipment requirements for non-registrable vessels will apply.

Is a sea kayak that is 3.7m in length with a battery powered motor (and sometimes without a motor) required to be registered?

A kayak or any vessel that has a motor fitted or a fitting for a motor must be registered.

Will I be permitted to take my personal water craft (PWC) to Rottnest for example?

Yes. The length of a vessel will no longer determine how far it can travel from the shore.

Currently, vessels less than 3.75m in length are not permitted to navigate further than 5 nautical miles from the nearest point at low water mark on the mainland shore.

However, the length of your vessel should not be the only consideration when determining how far you can safely operate from shore.

Consider the weather conditions, vessel capability and safety equipment requirements when deciding how far to travel from the shore.

Am I required to carry the same safety equipment on my PWC as other registrable vessels?

A PWC is a registrable vessel so you will be required to carry the applicable safety equipment.

However unlike other registrable vessels, everyone on board a PWC will need to wear a lifejacket (minimum level 50S) at all times.

Distress beacons

Under the new safety equipment requirements, EPIRBs must be GPS enabled.

How do I tell if I need to upgrade my existing EPIRB? A GPS enabled EPIRB will be:

- labelled to indicate if it has GPS capability by the initials GPS or the letter G; or
- have an identification number or hex ID that includes the term '3 echo'.

All Personal Locator Beacons (PLB) on the market are GPS enabled.

You will have five years from the commencement of the new laws to upgrade to a GPS enabled EPIRB.

Under the new safety equipment requirements do I have to wear my EPIRB?

No. EPIRBs should be kept in an easily accessible location on your vessel. However, you can choose to wear a GPS enabled PLB instead of carrying an EPIRB. The PLB will need to be worn by at least one person on board the vessel.

Can PLBs be an acceptable alternative to EPIRBs?

Yes, however the PLB will need to be GPS enabled and worn by at least one person on board the vessel.

What is the benefit of a GPS enabled distress beacon compared with a non-GPS enabled distress beacon?

A GPS enabled distress beacon (EPIRB and PLB) will direct emergency services to within 120m of your location compared to 5 kilometres with a non-GPS device.

Where can I dispose of my old EPIRBs and PLBs?

Old and unwanted EPIRBs and PLBs can be:

- Handed in for safe disposal at any DoT regional office or at the Shark Bay CRC (we will pass them on to DoT officers.
- Left in marked bins at Battery World stores around Australia (disposal fees may apply.)
- Disarmed by following the manufacturer's instructions.

Flares

Under the new safety equipment requirements do I need to carry flares on my vessel?

Yes. When operating any vessel more than 400m from the

shore in unprotected waters, you will need to carry:

- 2 in date handheld orange smoke flares, and
- 2 in date red handheld flares.

An electronic visual distress signalling device (EVDS) may be carried instead of flares if a GPS enabled EPIRB is also carried, or a PLB is worn.

Currently, only 2 EVDS meet DoT's requirements:

- 547 Orion Electronic SOS Beacon Locator
- ACR Electronics ResQFlare

Under the new safety requirements, will I be able to use the parachute/rocket flares that I have?

Yes, if you have parachute/rocket flares, you will be able to use them until 3 years from the date the new laws commence.

How do I dispose of old flares?

You can dispose of old flares at any DoT regional office, at the Shark Bay CRC (we will pass them on to DoT officers) or Household Hazardous Waste program centres.

Which Electronic Visual Distress Signals (EVDS) are approved for recreational vessels?

Skippers operating beyond 400m from shore in unprotected waters will have the option to carry an EVDS instead of flares, if they also carry a GPS enabled EPIRB or wear a GPS enabled PLB. Currently, only 2 EVDS meet DoT's requirements:

- 547 Orion Electronic SOS Beacon Locator
- · ACR Electronics ResQFlare

Do you know if EVDS will also be approved for domestic commercial vessels?

The new safety equipment requirements only apply to recreational vessels and craft in WA.

For more information about safety equipment for commercial vessels please contact the Australian Maritime Safety Authority.

Marine radios

At what distance from shore will I need a marine radio on board my vessel?

You will need to carry either a HF or VHF marine radio on any registrable vessel when operating more than 4 nautical miles from shore in unprotected waters.

Can I still use my 27MHz radio?

27 MHz marine radios will be phased out over a 5-year period from the date the new laws commence.

27 MHz marine radios do not perform as well as modern VHF marine radios and the monitored coverage by search and rescue organisations is significantly less than that of the VHF spectrum.

We encourage you to update your radio as soon as possible to ensure your safety on the water.

Recommended safety equipment

Fire extinguishers, bailers, bilge pumps and anchors are recommended under the new requirements but no longer required by law. Am I still able to carry them?

Yes. While many boats come with this equipment as standard,

skippers will be encouraged to carry fire extinguishers, bailers, bilge pumps and anchors.

Why are anchors 'recommended items' under the new safety equipment requirements?

The effectiveness of an anchor depends on the vessel type, anchor type, seabed, depth of water and sea conditions.

For some types of vessels, carrying and using an anchor is not practical, even during an emergency. For other vessels, anchors are used as part of normal operations and will be carried regardless of if they are required to or not.

It is up to you to determine if you need to carry an anchor and line. Find out more about choosing an anchor on our anchors page.

Why are bilge pumps or bailers 'recommended items' under the new safety requirements?

The type and capacity of the bilge pump or bailer required depends on the type, buoyancy, and size of your vessel.

For example, some vessels have self-draining decks or are constructed to have positive buoyancy even if they are filled with water. Other vessels have compartments where water is difficult to detect without an alarm and cannot be cleared using a bailer.

It is up to you to determine if you need to carry a bailer or bilge pump.

Why are fire extinguishers 'recommended items' under the new safety requirements?

The fire risk on board a vessel depends on the type, size, and construction material of the vessel.

The type of fire extinguisher required will also vary depending on the source of the fire and capability of the person responding to the fire.

It is up to you to determine if you should carry a fire extinguisher.

4 WAYS TO RECYCLE IN DENHAM

1: GET A 10C REFUND

Return eligible containers to Yadgalah Aboriginal Corporation Mobile Drop Point and receive a 10c refund.

2: DONATE YOUR CONTAINERS

Collect eligible containers and drop them in marked bins at the Shark Bay Recycling Centre. 'Onion bags' are available for free at the Op Shop and CRC to help you collect containers.

3: OUT AND ABOUT

Drop eligible containers into specially marked collection baskets along Denham Foreshore.



Bring non-eligible plastics, glass, and cardboard to Shark Bay Recycling Centre and sort them into marked yellow-top bins. The Shire is working on securing recycling partnerships for transport and processing.

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN I DONATE MY 10C CONTAINER?

When you recycle through the Shark Bay Recycling Centre or marked collection baskets:

- 5c is donated to ABC Foundation for important social programs in remote communities.
- 5c is used by the Shire of Shark Bay to fund future local recycling and sustainability efforts.













Waste Collection Requirements in Denham

The Shire of Shark Bay is now providing the Roadside Rubbish Collection service. The route is currently being optimised and pick up times may have changed. Now is also a good time to familiarise yourself with Waste Collection Requirements in Denham.



One Bin Only

Only one bin will be collected per household, unless approved by the Shire prior to collection.



Overflowing Bins

Bins overflowing with rubbish will not be collected. Ensure that the lid on your bin is able to remain shut at all times to ensure no wildlife can access



Rocks On Lids

Bins using rocks to keep the lid secure will not be collected as they can damage the truck.

Look up Bin Lid Closers online for ideas on keeping your bin lid closed.



High Winds

Let's take care so our town stays tidy.



New Pick Up Route

The Shire of Shark Bay is now providing the Roadside Rubbish Collection service. The route is currently being optimised and pick up times may have changed.

Please put your bin out the night prior to ensure your bin is collected.



Incorrect Items

Do not put items such as bricks, heavy timber or steel in the bin. These materials can damage the collection equipment and your bin. The bins are for domestic waste only.



Damaged Bins

Bins that are broken, cracked, or missing lids/wheels will not be collected. It is your responsibility to ensure repairs or replacement.

Waste Disposal Local Health Laws

All owners and occupiers are responsible for your bins and what goes in them

Bin Receptacles

- · keep your bin lid closed, except when depositing rubbish or cleaning it
- except for a reasonable period before and after collection time, keep your bin on the premises and located either behind the street alignment as close as practicable to the street alignment of the premises but so that it does not obstruct any footpath, cycle way, right-of-way or carriage way.
- · ensure that the premises is provided with an adequate number of receptacles.

What should NOT go in your bin

- more than 70 kilograms of rubbish or refuse,
- hot or burning ash,
- oil, motor spirit or other flammable liquid,
- liquid paint or other solvent,
- bricks, concrete, building rubble, earth or other like substances,
- drugs, dressings, bandages, swabs or blood samples unless placed in a sealed impervious and leak-proof container,
- hospital, medical, veterinary, laboratory or pathological substances containing blood unless placed in a sealed impervious and leak-proof
- syringes, needles, surgical hardware, broken glass, sharps or other sharp objects unless placed in a sealed impervious leak-proof and impenetrable
- cytotoxins, radioactive substances and dangerous chemicals,
- sewage, manure, nightsoil, faeces or urine, any object which is greater in length, width, or breadth than the corresponding dimension of the receptacle or which will not allow the lid of the receptacle to be tightly closed, or
- rubbish or refuse which is or is likely to become offensive or a nuisance, or give off an offensive or noxious odour, or to attract flies or cause fly breeding unless it is first wrapped in non-absorbent or impervious material or placed in a sealed impervious container



Student progress and achievement

We have enjoyed some great family and sporting events and other enriching activities for students recently. These help create a really positive environment which supports teaching and learning. We aim to unleash our students' full potential so that they can have fulfilling, successful lives in both academic and non-academic ways.

Although tests like NAPLAN are not a 'big deal', and this year are of limited value in tracking individual progress, they do provide a very useful snapshot of how well our students are meeting or exceeding academic expectations. We don't compete with other schools, we want students everywhere to do well, and we collaborate with other schools, but we do use averaged data from other schools as a benchmark to check that our teaching and learning programs are progressing well and being effective. In this year's NAPLAN results, it is clear that our students are doing very well indeed compared with normed data, and that gives us all reassurance and confidence in our programs.

One of the aims of our current Strategic Plan is for our staff team to have stronger and more effective connections with other staff across our area. We can share practice, advise each other in areas where we have more experience, and amplify our efforts by working consistently across the region.

Miss Parsons, Ms Bec and I recently visited Exmouth DHS for a couple of days. This enabled us to participate in financial professional learning with other network schools, for Miss Parsons to work-shadow the Early Years staff and Ms Bec to focus on student services and support while I participated in the network principals' planning session. We all benefitted a great deal and brought new ideas back. Our feedback, being more advanced in delivering the literacy programs now being adopted across the network, was also sought. As a group of schools, we now have much more commonality in the ways we teach, which will make it easier for teachers to work together and share practice remotely.

The Desert Coast Network plans link very well with our own Strategic Plan and include a strong thread of Sustainability. We are excited that the group of network schools will send principals and other staff to visit Shark Bay School for a couple of days in term 3 next year, to meet all our staff, see our programs in action and further develop our regional approach to sustainability and long-term welfare for our students. We aspire for the Desert Coast Network to be a leader across the state in making effective change for a better world.

Year 3-4 Assembly and Bookfair Parade

Thanks to our librarian Miss Tish for organizing Book Week and the Bookfair Parade. It was a pleasure to see the creativity of our families and the evident love of reading. The students looked amazing! Our Year 3/4 class entertained us at Assembly on 11.8.23. They have been investigating





After Hours Emergencies

EMERGENCY

If you call the Shark Bay Health Centre after hours you will be transferred through to Health Direct where a Registered Nurse will ask you a number of questions to determine whether you need further emergency assessment by the Shark Bay nurse. If you require further assessment, your call will be put through to the local nurse.

Examples of an EMERGENCY include:

- · Breathing difficulties
- Chest pain
- Severe abdominal pain
- Bleeding that can't be controlled with first aid
- Convulsions and fits
- Deep lacerations
- Eye or ear injuries
- Uncontrolled high fever
- Loss of consciousness
- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour
- A very sick child

Marine Rescue Shark Bay

August was a busy month for the team at Marine Rescue Shark Bay. Two members went to Geraldton for a weekend of Sea Survival training. Part of the course involves inflating and hopping into a life raft. This is usually done at the Marina, but the water was so cold they used the heated pool at the Aquarena instead.

Three volunteers spent most of one night responding to flare sightings West of The Block on Dirk Hartog Island. They were aided by the Challenger Search and Rescue jet which flew up from Perth. Nothing was sighted except for some migratory whales which looked like an upturned vessels hull on the aircrafts electronic surveillance equipment. We suspect that the campers on shore had mistaken the bright planet Venus for a flare as it was setting and glowing red, low in the West.

Cape Rose became stranded on a sand bank at the entrance to Big Lagoon whilst trying to find a couple who had broken down in a small inflatable boat. The couple managed to walk their boat back to their campsite and the Rescue vessel floated free on the incoming tide.

Another long night operation was a recovery tow of a twin

hulled vessel which set off a distress alarm when they broke down fifteen miles southwest of Steep Point. The size and weight of the cat meant a best towing speed of about six knots in the open sea and 12 knots once back inside the Bay. It was a long slow trin



Thanks to all our volunteer members who have put their own lives on hold and used their time and skills to help others when called upon.

Tamala Rose is coming out of the water on the Shire jinker for another hundred hour service for both motors. A boat broker from Perth has been engaged to sell her and has been to Denham for an appraisal and test run.

The new vessel build is progressing well at the Dongara Marine facility in Geraldton alongside sister ships for Marine Rescue Exmouth and Dampier. We are seeking input from the community to come up with a suitable name for our new vessel. If you have any ideas, you can send them in via email to vmrsharkbay@westnet.com.au. Delivery at this stage is expected to be in December 2023 which is fast approaching.

Conservation Matters





June this year saw yet another milestone achieved by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attraction's (DBCA) Return to 1616 project with the translocation of brush-tailed mulgara to Dirk Hartog Island, Wirruwana. This brings the total number of species that have now been returned to the island to eight!

The Return to 1616 science team translocated 100 brushtailed mulgara from Matua Kurrara Kurrara National Park, north east of Wiluna, with the help of Tarlka Matuwa Piarku Aboriginal Corporation's (TMPAC) Wiluna Martu Rangers. The mulgara's journey from their remote outback location began with a plane flight to Denham.

On arrival in Denham, the mulgara were given world-class service with a connecting flight to Dirk Hartog Island by helicopter. The entire journey of over 800km to their new home took only four and a half hours.

Our newest recruits are small native carnivores and have moved from a mainland national park of over 800,000 hectares in size to an island of just 63,000 hectares (albeit Western Australia's largest island). Although their new home is smaller than the one they left behind, there is one very big difference: there are no feral cats! Dirk Hartog Island National Park has been free of feral cats for more than five years now, and that's a huge advantage for the brush-tailed mulgara. This - together with a few years of good rainfall means the population of small native animals on Dirk Hartog Island is slowly building up. So, in addition to moving to a safer place to live, there is also abundant food for our pintsized predators to eat!

A small number of brush-tailed mulgara were given radio collars to enable the science team to track their progress. Obviously intrigued by their new home, the mulgara kept the science team well and truly 'on the hop' as they explored their new island home. All this hard work paid off however, as the mulgara that were recaptured a few weeks later (to have their radio collars removed) showed promising signs that they

were settling in to the neighbourhood well. As an additional bonus, despite the mulgara's sharp teeth, all science team fingers were present and accounted for, although a few received painful nips. Scan this QR code to see a brush-tailed mulgara being released.

The brush-tailed mulgara use those teeth to good effect, and not just on the science team members. When times are good and food is abundant, mulgara are able to 'bank' excess food in the form of fat stored in their tails. The more fat that is stored in their tails, the fatter and more sausagelike their tails appear, and the better their ability to survive leaner times. This is just the start of a safe, secure new life for the brush-tailed mulgara in the Bay. The science team have a big job ahead monitoring their progress along with the seven other species of native animals that have already been returned to the island as part of the Dirk Hartog Island National Park Return to 1616 Ecological Restoration Project. Return to 1616 is funded by the Gorgon Barrow Island Net Conservation Benefits Fund and the brush-tailed mulgara translocation has been made possible with input from the TPMAC Wiluna Martu Ranger Program.

Our feathered Northern-Hemisphere visitors, the Shorebirds, are returning!

Over the summer of 2022/23 the Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions DBCA in conjunction with Bird Life Australia and Volunteers within Shark Bay conducted a thorough census of visiting migratory Shorebirds in the Shark Bay World Heritage bioregion.

The results were impressive and internationally significant. DBCA staff and community volunteers counted, over 5,000 migratory shorebirds amongst a total of 14,749 shorebirds, across 20 sites in January. These birds breed in the Arctic tundra, wetlands and mountain slopes of Alaska and Siberia, and then escape the harsh northern winter migrating annually to the rich feeding grounds of Shark Bay, amongst other significant sites in Australasia. For some, this means a non-stop flight for almost two weeks, covering 13,000km.

As a result of the census, for the first time nationally significant populations were recorded in Shark Bay of a number of threatened and endangered species, including Eastern Curlew, Bar-tailed Godwit, Ruddy Turnstone, Great Knot, Red-necked Stint, Sanderling, Grey-tailed Tattler and Common Greenshank.

After such lengthy migration during which the birds can lose up to half their body weight, they need to feed and rest without disturbance to regain strength and body condition. They are highly specialised in their feeding, and require just the right conditions of water depth, sediment type and prey items. These conditions can change around the bay each year, meaning that some sites may be better than others in any given year - for them it is not simply a matter of moving elsewhere down the beach.

While we work together to develop suitable strategies to continue to protect the birds and their important feeding habitat from the threats of changing coastal conditions, increased visitation and feral animals, there are some simple ways that we can all help.

Respect roosting shorebirds by giving them peace and


space. Right now and throughout Spring they are arriving and individuals landing here may have just flown almost the length of the world. When the birds are disturbed by us, our cars, our dogs, or our drones we put their ability to fatten up for the long flight back at risk.

In many of the same locations, our resident shorebirds, such as the Fairy Terns and Pied Oystercatchers, are beginning to nest. These birds lay eggs on the beach above the highwater mark. Although we are endeavouring to post signage at the more significant locations to let people know they are there, the eggs and chicks can be very hard to see. The birds may not have too many choices in locations that support their feeding and nesting, but we can walk our dogs and drive our 4wds elsewhere with just a small bit of effort. At the beginning of summer, we plan to have some shorebird identification community workshops which will support anyone wanting to participate in the great Annual East Asian - Australasian Flyway census in January. Please come along and help us protect these truly remarkable birds.

Consumer Watch

Don't be taken for a ride buying a used-car

There's a lot to consider when buying a used car, such as your budget and what type of vehicle will suit your needs, but of utmost importance is ensuring you don't drive away with a lemon.

We recently issued a warning against licensed car dealer Ventura Autos, after receiving 136 complaints about the selling of unroadworthy vehicles, in breach of the Australian Consumer Law.

During their compliance inspections of the Welshpool business, our automotive officers issued 43 defect notices on vehicles being sold for issues such as non-compliant tyres, windscreens, oil leaks and seatbelts.

When purchasing a vehicle, consumers rightly expect they will receive a car without any significant problems. That's why we have released an easy-to-follow used car buyer's checklist in partnership with the Motor Trade Association of WA.

The checklist empowers buyers to know what to look out for when shopping around for a second-hand car and gives them the best chance at driving away with a safe and reliable vehicle.

At the top of the checklist is a \$2 Personal Property Securities Register (or PPSR) check using the VIN number found in the owner's manual to see if the car is free from debt, stolen or written-off. There's also advice to have the vehicle checked by an independent mechanic and inspect its log book for signs of regular servicing, any ongoing repairs and odometer readings.

In WA, 70 per cent of used car buyers buy via private sale, but these purchases often don't have the same protections as those vehicles bought from a dealer, which may offer some warranty protection depending on the age and mileage of the vehicle.

Private sales can also be a target for scammers, who offer non-existent cars for sale on online marketplaces, websites and social media platforms. In the past three years, Consumer Protection has heard from 259 consumers who were scammed while trying to buy a car online, including 88 who lost over \$660,000.

This is why it's vital for buyers to be vigilant when shopping online and not hand over their cash before seeing the vehicle in-person and doing a series of checks.

If you're on the hunt for a used-car, consider downloading the new checklist now available on our website at www. dmirs.wa.gov.au/buyingacar to avoid being taken for a ride.

Receipt rules apply to all purchases

Many shoppers like to 'tap-and-go' when paying for purchases, while others like to hand-over cash, but one thing all consumers have in common is the right to receive a receipt if they want one.

Consumer Protection was concerned recently to hear claims that a retailer in WA had denied a consumer's request for a paper receipt, citing 'company policy' and pointing them to their own bank statement for proof of purchase.



If the consumer had later discovered a higher than expected amount had been charged to their account, not having a receipt could mean they were without the evidence needed to dispute the matter.

Under the Australian Consumer Law, receipts must be issued as soon as possible for all purchases of \$75 or more (excluding GST) regardless of whether payment was made by cash or card.

For purchases totalling less than \$75, a customer is still entitled to request and receive a receipt, which must be provided within seven days.

Receipts can either be handwritten, issued by a machine at the point of sale, or as a GST tax invoice, but they must all include the supplier's name, the ABN or ACN (if the supplier has one), the date of supply, the goods or service purchased, and the total price.

When it comes to making a claim on faulty products or services, receipts might be the most obvious proof of transaction, but they are not the only type. Other acceptable forms of evidence can include a photograph of the receipt, a credit or debit card statement, a lay-by agreement, a warranty card showing the supplier's or manufacturer's details, the date and purchase amount, or some combination of these which supports their claim.

Ultimately, so long as you can reasonably demonstrate that you purchased an item, a business may be breaking the law if it denies your right to a refund, repair or replacement for an item that fails to meet a consumer guarantee.

If a business hasn't given you a receipt or bill when they should, your first step should be to approach them to explain the problem. Should they still refuse to provide a receipt, we would like to hear from you on 1300 30 40 54 or consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au

Country Stargazing

Springtime stargazing

Spring is the perfect time to get out under dark country skies and be in awe of the sparkling stars and planets overhead. But that's not all, let's throw in a close encounter between Saturn and the Moon, the Spring Equinox AND Scorpio!

The Spring Equinox is on 23rd September and marks the transition from winter in the southern hemisphere. The number of hours of daylight will almost equal darkness!

Spring is a great time to find the constellation Scorpio! It's a large constellation that forms the shape of a scorpion! It is currently visible throughout the evening, lying directly overhead at around 8pm. Look for a reddish star called Antares that lies in the centre of the constellation. See if you can find the curve of Scorpio's body and the sting in its tail stretching across the sky!



Something interesting: Antares is a super-giant red star several hundred times the diameter of our Sun and is about 600 light-years from Earth.

When to look: after 8pm during spring.
Which direction to look: Directly overhead.

For some fun stargazing, the full Moon makes a close approach to brilliant Saturn on 27th September and the pair will look stunning together. For those with telescopes or high-powered binoculars, check out the beautiful ring system of Saturn.

BAITING TO PROTECT NATIVE WILDLIFE

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's *Western Shield* program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.



Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered dangerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.

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


