Executive Officer's Report

Community Resource Centre

Office reopening

Gascoyne Development Commission

Following the success of the Round 6 Regional Economic Grants earlier this year, GDC Grants Officer Courtney Whitehead is encouraging Gascoyne Businesses to think ahead for next year.

The Regional Economic Development Grants (RED Grants) program is a \$50.85 million over nine years (2018-19 to 2026-27) State Government initiative that invests in local projects to stimulate economic growth and development in regional Western Australia.

Up to \$250,000 is available for individual projects that contribute to increasing or sustaining jobs, expanding or diversifying industry, developing skills or capability, increasing business productivity and attracting new investment to the regions.

Fire Plans

Does your household have a house fire emergency plan? Have you thought about what you all would do if you had to escape quickly?

Many often comment when asked this question, get out as quick as you can or get down low and go go go. However have you sat down with your household and discussed where for example you all might safely meet when outside so you are all accounted for?

Fire crews have documented that sometimes parents escape to the front yard from a house fire safely and after time realise their children are missing and venture back into the burning house to save them. Often the children have escaped through the back door and are quite safe waiting in the back yard thinking the exact same thing, where are my parents?

Your ability to get out of your home during a fire depends on advance warning from smoke alarms and advance planning. Fire can spread rapidly through your home, leaving you as little as one or two minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds.

Escape planning tips;

Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible exits and escape routes. Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including windows and doors. Also, mark the location of each smoke alarm.

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.
- · When you walk through your plan, check to make sure

- the escape routes are clear and doors and windows can be opened easily.
- Choose an outside meeting place (i.e. neighbor's house or a mailbox etc) a safe distance in front of your home where everyone can meet after they've escaped. Make sure to mark the location of the meeting place on your escape plan. You could even have one in the front and or back yard to account for smaller children who might not be able to climb fences etc to make it to a front meeting point.
- Go outside to see if your street number is clearly visible from the road. If not, paint it on the curb or install house numbers to ensure that responding emergency personnel can find your home.
- Have everyone memorise the emergency phone number 000. That way any member of the household can call from a neighbor's home or a mobile phone once safely outside.
- If there are infants, older adults, or family members with mobility limitations, make sure that someone is assigned to assist them in the fire drill and in the event of an emergency. Assign a backup person too, in case the designee is not home during the emergency
- If windows or doors in your home have security bars, make sure that the bars have emergency release devices inside so that they can be opened immediately in an emergency. Emergency release devices won't compromise your security - but they will increase your chances of safely escaping a home fire.
- Tell guests or visitors to your home about your family's fire escape plan. When staying overnight at other people's homes, ask about their escape plan. If they don't have a plan in place, offer to help them make one. This is especially important when children are permitted to attend "sleepovers" at friends' homes. A great place to display the plan for example is on the back of the toilet door.
- Be fully prepared for a real fire: when a smoke alarm sounds, get out immediately.
- Once you're out, stay out! Under no circumstances should you ever go back into a burning building. If someone is missing, inform the 000 emergency operator when you call. Firefighters have the skills and equipment to perform rescues.

The Shire of Shark Bay is located in the Shark Bay World Heritage Area which is one of three World Heritage areas within WA. Located approximately 830 kilometres north of Perth, Shark Bay is a wonderland of world-class natural attractions, the clear turquoise waters are ablaze with multi-coloured sea life and stretching beyond the white sandy beaches are spectacular rust-red sand dunes.

The Shire is seeking a Revenue and Administration Officer to provide financial services including invoicing, accounts receivable, bank reconciliations, and other office tasks as required. A position description can be found on Council's website www.sharkbay.wa.gov.au .

The ideal applicant will need to demonstrate relevant experience in the accounting functions of accounts receivable, and bank reconciliations. Strong interpersonal and communication skills with the ability to work autonomously and as part of a team is essential. This role requires high skill competency in Microsoft Word and Excel. Conservation Matters



Last summer, confirmation of Nationally significant migratory shorebird populations added to our understanding of just how special the Shark Bay World Heritage Area is and how important it is at a global scale. Some of the birds that come to our shores have travelled over 12,000km all the way from Alaska, flying non-stop for 9 days! 17 species were recorded, ranging from the sparrow-sized Red-Neck Stints to the largest, Eastern Curlews, with a bill as long as their body.

Their identification and counts couldn't have happened without excellent community support. To continue this crucial environmental monitoring work we need your help. Join us next January, in a community workshop for enthusiastic birdwatchers who want to build their skills in shorebird identification, and then possibly help in our annual surveys. The training includes:

- 2-3hr workshop 12:30pm Sunday 14th January 2024 at the DBCA Office, 61 Knight Terrace, Denham.
- 1 or 2 x field trips afterward to local roosts.

EMERGENCY

If you call the Shark Bay Health Centre after hours you will be transferred through to Health Direct where a Registered Nurse will ask you a number of questions to determine whether you need further emergency assessment by the Shark Bay nurse. If you require further assessment, your call will be put through to the local nurse.

Examples of an EMERGENCY include:

- Breathing difficulties
- Chest pain
- Severe abdominal pain
- Bleeding that can't be controlled with first aid
- Convulsions and fits
- Deep lacerations
- Eye or ear injuries
- Uncontrolled high fever
- Loss of consciousness
- Pregnancy bleeding or onset of labour A very sick child

BAITING TO PROTECT **NATIVE WILDLIFE**

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's Western Shield program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.



Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered dangerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.

Local Unit

Here we are at the start of yet another year. I trust you all had a happy Christmas and were able to enjoy some time off. 2023 flew by without too many incidents for our local unit but the year wasn't without its challenges. We are excited to announce that our recent acting District Officer Natural Hazards, Elsa Alston had been appointed in the role on a permanent basis. This is a major boost to units in our area as Elsa brings a wealth of knowledge to the role and as a recent Unit Leader in Carnarvon can relate first hand to the challenges directly facing Units and members. Elsa begins officially on the 2nd January.

There are quite a few training opportunities coming up this year with 3 courses earmarked for our Unit to host. As more members are also attaining their trained assessor qualifications the possibility of in house training is becoming more accessible to units. Obviously training is the major factor in a successful Unit we are excited for the year to come.

Our unit recently joined with members from Marine Rescue Shark Bay and Shark Bay Police to complete bushfire safety awareness training. This course was to enable DFES members outside a fire capacity the ability to enter a fire ground to run logistics and assist our bushfire fighters. Our main focus would be to move vehicles, transport firefighters to and from the fire ground, run food, water and supplies etc. Just as when we are deployed to a storm or a search capacity, there are many jobs required for an operation to run smoothly and we look forward to being able to assist when required.

If any of this appeals to you we are always ready to welcome new members with open arms. We meet the first and third Wednesday of every month with our first training back for the year being the 7th February.

YOUTH in Emergency Services (YES) Challenge

Recently, over 60 emergency services cadets from cross the state gathered at Langley Park to participate in the Youth Emergency Services (YES) Challenge, as part of the Mining Emergency Response Competition (MERC).

Challenge drew cadet teams from John Tonkin College (Mandurah) Emergency Services Cadet Corps (ESCC), Moora YES, Northam YES, Quinns Rocks YES, and Two Rocks YES, all eager demonstrate their emergency response skills.



Watched closely by adjudicators from Mandurah State Emergency Service and Dwellingup Bush Fire Brigade, the YES Challenge featured seven teams engaged in two emergency scenarios designed to test their teamwork, leadership, first aid and communication skills. The first scenario unfolded as a fire erupted from an explosion at a chemical warehouse near an airport, requiring swift and coordinated action from the cadets to assist injured workers and extinguish the fire. The second scenario involved a multi-casualty vehicle and bus crash challenging the cadets to respond effectively.

The skill level demonstrated by the cadets was extraordinary and the competition was tight with only a few points between all teams. Congratulations to the John Tonkin College (Mandurah) ESCC Cadets for taking out the top prize. The YES Challenge provided an excellent opportunity for cadet units to showcase their emergency service skills while also fostering teamwork and camaraderie.

Although locally Shark Bay currently doesn't have a Youth cadets program across any emergency service organisation, discussions continue amongst groups to possibly establish one to ensure the longevity of our local volutneers.

Free mammograms for women in Denham

BreastScreen WA's FREE screening mammogram service is coming to Denham from 12/02/2024 - 15/02/2024 and the mobile clinic will be located at the Shark Bay Recreation Centre car park.

Women 40 years and over with no symptoms are eligible for a FREE screening mammogram. Breast cancer is the most common life threatening cancer for women and 1 in 7 women in Australia will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Having a screening mammogram (breast x-ray) every two years significantly increases the chance of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduces the amount of treatment required. More than 75% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50. Research shows that screening is most effective for this age group.

BreastScreen WA's Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie, said screening mammography was the most effective method for early detection of breast cancer. "Screening every two years is vitally important to increase the chance of a breast cancer being detected when it is too small to feel or be noticed. Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that the breast cancer is small and more treatable". "A free screening mammogram is one of the best things that women can do to look after their health. Breast screening saves lives and only takes 20 minutes," said Dr Wylie.

Screening mammograms may detect 70-90% of breast cancers. Any woman with a persistent change in a breast should contact her doctor immediately. Dates may be subject to change.

Truck Driving in the 1940s

The first road train in the world was built by Kurt Johannson in 1947 and was driven by myself Nugget doing the Alice Springs to Darwin run. 100 tonnes-1000 miles-100 hours. My pay rate was 7 pound a week and all the bully beef you could eat! It had a cyclone stretcher on the top of the cab for the driver with a tarp in case of rain! Wind wasn't a problem with a maximum speed of 20mph overdrive! Every two hours you had to pull up and walk up and down kicking 72 tyres to check them!

Monday morning, I walk across to the depot from the old cottage where I live with three other drivers. The truck is still loaded with asbestos; I got in too late on Friday to unload. The PT Samson goods yard is not open weekends unless there is a ship in. I go into the off ice and get the first bad news of the week. The boss tells me to load timber!

They are building a township at Wittenoom so timber is coming up by the shipload. Its in assorted sizes and lengths and is dumped hell west and crooked all over the goods yard. Loading it is back-breaking and time consuming. There are a couple of casual workers waiting to help me. There are always a few around. They work the ships and pick up a few hours loading and unloading the trucks. The steady, reliable ones make quite a good living and enjoy the carefree lifestyle.

We head off on the twelve miles to the port. The Public Works is building new asbestos storage sheds there and has promised elevators for unloading. For the present though it's all hard work. The asbestos fibre is in jute sacks, twenty to the ton. We have to pick each bag off the truck and carry and stack them in the shed. When we finish unloading we have a smoke while inspecting the timber stacks and then start loading. We have a short break to boil the billy and have lunch of bread and tinned meat. By mid afternoon we have what I think is a fair load. I then have to spend an hour tying down the load with wire ropes. I know I' II lose some; you cannot hold the bloody stuff. There is a rumour that a grazier on the Tableland is building a new shearing shed with material that falls off the trucks; I quite believe it.

I head back to Roebourne, drop the truck at the depot and head home to shower and change my dusty clothes. While I'm doing this my Aboriginal offsider will top up the fuel and load our tarps and other gear. Peter Munda is my offsider. He is an ex-police boy. He's a good worker and is always neat and clean. He and I are good mates. He cannot help me load at the Port, as the union will not allow Aboriginals to work there.

The truck we drive is an ex-army Diamond T tank recovery vehicle, modified for cargo work. It has an enormous, slow-moving diesel motor connected to two gearboxes, but has a top speed of only twenty miles an hour. The truck has a 24-foot tray and we pull a 32-foot tri-axle trailer. We have the power to pull much heavier loads but could not get the extra trailers around some of the bends on the road. In the Northern Territory, the same vehicles were pulling one hundred tons, on four trailers, from Alice Springs to Darwin. I walk back to the depot and after checking everything and picking up loading cart notes from the office, we head down the hill and across the concrete crossing over the Harding River.

Quite often, there are Aboriginals waiting opposite the native camp looking for a lift up the road. If at all possible, we always let them hop on the load. They are not fussy and they distribute their swags,



kids and dogs on top quite happily. However, this trip we have no passengers.

The fifty-odd miles to the foot of what is known locally as the Big Hill is not too bad. Modern motorists would never think of travelling it in anything but a four wheel drive, but we reckon it's pretty good. It was even graded a couple of years ago. Several dry creek crossings slow us up a bit so it takes about three hours to reach Snake Creek at the foot of the hill. By this time, it's that time of day when lights are not much good but it's too dark without them.

While I'm checking the load and our 22 tyres, Peter gets the tucker box off the load and puts the billy on. Luckily, we have no flats so after a quick meal of bread and more tinned meat, Peter packs up the tucker box and spreads his swag on top of the load. No flash sleeper cabs in those days.

The next seven miles winds up through Devil's Elbow. The Switchback, Graveyard Pinch and finally Mt. Herbert. If we don't have any trouble it will take us about one and a half hours. A couple of trips ago we found Ron Thomas stuck on the Graveyard with a broken axle. With no room to get past him I had to creep up behind his trailer in dead low gear, and use the Diamond T's massive bumper bar to bulldoze the whole works up to the top. The old truck's extra power came in handy that night.

Mt Herbert is the last bad pull. The road winds around the hill and up at a one in seven grade. The old teamsters used to stop at the top of the hill to chain the back wheels of the wagon. They fitted steel shoes under the wheels and dragged them down. It was the only way to stop the wagon rolling over the team. The wagons weren't the only ones to come to grief. If you look over the side you'll see the remains of Band R's big Studebaker Truck. It stalled, ran back over the side and burned. Jack Barrett jumped just in time. The next couple of miles onto the Tablelands are winding enough to break a snakes back, but no bad grades.

A stop at the top to check tyres, then off again. The road on the tableland is pretty level but there are numerous dry creek crossings, which necessitate changing down a few gears. All drivers smoke. It keeps you awake. You get pretty adept at rolling cigarettes while driving. We did not take pills in those days. Lack of sleep plays funny tricks; sometimes you see things that are not there. Ron Armstrong slammed the brakes on one night; he swore he had run over a woman pushing a pram. This was at Number Eight Bore half way to Wittenoom. I pull up every couple of hours, check tyres and wash my face in cold water from the tank slung under the truck.

I pull up at Mount Florence Station shearer's quarters. When I turn the engine off I can hear a tyre going down. It's a back trailer wheel, so after a few heartfelt words, I get the jack and tools out. Peter wakes up and hops down to help.

Doug Francis, who is foreman grader driver and everything else of the tablelands Road Board, is camped at the quarters. He wakes up and makes a billy of coffee and I yarn to Doug, I ask Peter how he feels.

"I'm right mate," he says and so I get up on the back and Peter takes over. We have seventy miles to go. After awhile I doze off. When I wake it is breaking day and we are just turning round into the timber yard off the town site. There is no one at work yet so we boil the billy and chuck a tin of sausages on the fire. After breakfast there is still no sign of anyone. Timber is bad loading at this end too. The bloke in charge is a surly type who always has an excuse for not giving you any labour to unload.

We undo all the ropes and as no one appears we start shoving timber off both sides. After two hours of hard work we have most of the load off. The timber boss then appears and complains that it's inthewrong place. Quite a few hot words are exchanged and he takes off threatening all sorts of things. A couple of chaps then appear. They say to take no notice of the so and so and help throw the rest of the load off.

We head off for the mine, which is about six miles up the gorge. There are eleven shingly creek crossings in the six miles. When the gorge runs the workers camp at the mine is cut off.

We pull in alongside the mill to load asbestos. The MacRobertson Miller pilots say they can pinpoint Wittenoom from one hundred miles away by the column of blue dust over the mill. If you go in the mess for a meal you have to sweep the asbestos off the table and seats. Mac, the mill boss, is a decent sort. He gives us a couple of New Australians to help load. Mac does not know it yet but in the next thirty years asbestos will kill his entire family. The floor of the mill is at the height of the truck bed so it's just a matter of shouldering the bags out on to the truck. The trouble is you can hardly see in the mill for dust and very shortly you're coughing and spitting out blue clots of it. The workers are given primitive masks but they soon clog up. The baggers are on contract, so they cannot afford to stop work.

After we have loaded and tied down we go into the change room for a shower. This is a dark gloomy place full of dirty clothes and boots, but it's theonly place available. By this time it's too late for lunch in the mess so we head out. A chap has asked for a lift out but we cannot take him. He has to have a clearance from the company and if we break the rules our boss could lose his contract.

Loaded with twenty tons it's a slow trip back out to the town site. We pull up there and find we have another flat. We change the wheel and as we have no more spares I decide to mend the two flats, better now in daylight than in the middle of the night. When this is done and all the gear stowed away it's getting late. We pull out and by the time we reach Windamurra mill twelve miles out, it's dusk, so we stop for tea. After tea Peter says he'll have a camp so he can relieve me later on.

I pull into Mt Florence to see if Doug has any mail but he is not there. A native Stockman comes across from the camp and says Doug has hooked his truck behind

the grader and moved down the road. I move on and just past the abandoned Tambray Station I see Doug's camp alongside the road. It consists of a cyclone stretcher alongside the truck. I pull up and Doug gets up and puts the billy on. After a mug of coffee and a yarn I've got my second wind so decide not to wake Peter.

Next stop is the top of Mt Herbert. It pays to check everything before heading down, and make sure you are thoroughly awake. There's plenty of smart gear work in the next seven miles. You can't rely solely on your brakes and it doesn't pay to miss a gear change, cowboys don't last long on this road. An hour later I pull up at Snake Creek to find I have got another flat. While I'm getting the jack and tools out Peter wakes up. We change the wheel and my mate takes over while I try for a couple of hours sleep.

I wake up when the truck stops at the native camp. Peter gets off and I drive across the river and park at the depot. As I walk across the cottage it is breaking day. While I'm having a shower, one of my mates calls out to me, do I want some steak and eggs for breakfast? Do I what! It's a change from tin dog.

After a leisurely breakfast and a smoke it's over to the depot, to report into the office and start the same routine for the second time this week.


Saturday it is half a day servicing the truck and then we get paid. I collect fourteen pounds ten shillings or twenty nine dollars. This is for two trips at seven pounds per trip and ten shillings for the three pence per ton bonus for asbestos carted.

Peter collects three pounds per trip and I feed him on the road. Compared to his mates Peter is well off. For this princely sum I have lumped one hundred tons of assorted cargo on and off the truck, worked about one hundred hours mostly without sleep and driven eight hundred miles.

Strangely enough we thought we had a pretty good job. There was always some youngster waiting to start on the trucks with their father or brother. Some of those kids were driving when they were fourteen years old.

Of eight drivers who worked together over a period, I am the only survivor. The asbestos killed the rest of them years ago.



Consumer Watch

Danger on the road: Protect yourself from unlicensed car dealers

Unlicensed motor vehicle dealers are a danger to the community and they're illegal. The vehicles sold can be riddled with problems, possibly making them unroadworthy. This puts you and other road users at risk, which could result in a serious accident or even death.

These so-called 'dodgy dealers' also don't offer warranties that are required by law on their second-hand vehicles. This means if you have mechanical issues after your purchase from these illegal operators, you won't be protected in the same way you would if you had purchased from a licensed car dealer. The unknown cost to repair your vehicle is the risk you take by purchasing from an unlicensed dealer.

Illegal traders generally do not repair any faults in a car once sold, leaving you out-of-pocket and possibly stuck with a lemon.

In 2023, Consumer Protection successfully prosecuted six unlicensed vehicle dealers in WA, with \$106,000 in fines issued. The most recent prosecution saw Alix Alchikh Ebrahim Aljilani of Thornlie, fined \$47,600 for buying and selling more than 100 cars in a seven month period. This sizeable penalty reflects the serious nature of the offence and we're warning more prosecutions will follow.

If someone sells or exchanges four or more vehicles in any 12-month period to or with people that are not dealers, they're carrying on a business and need to be licensed.

Unlicensed car dealing creates an uneven playing field in the marketplace and undermines the integrity of the motor vehicle industry in WA.

You can protect yourself from dodgy unlicensed car dealers by doing some simple checks. Before buying a car, check that the seller is licensed by asking to see their Motor Vehicle Dealer's Licence. If you are unsure whether the person you are buying from is licensed, visit Consumer Protection's licence and registration search.

Go through our car buyers checklist at www.dmirs.wa.gov. au/buyingacar. This checklist empowers you to know what to look out for when shopping around for a second-hand car and gives you the best chance at driving away with a safe and reliable vehicle. Also remember to spend \$2 on Personal Property Securities Register check at ppsr.gov.au to ensure the vehicle hasn't been written off, isn't unregistered or has money owing on it.

Refunds, returns, repairs and gift cards: know your

What happens when you don't like the socks Grandma gives you for Christmas? Or what if Santa delivers your little one a broken tov?

Under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL), consumers

have rights when it comes to gifts that are faulty, unsafe or not as described.

Australian retailers must offer a remedy such as a refund, replacement or repair, even if the gift was on sale. If the problem is minor, a business can offer its choice



of a remedy, but if the fault is major - you get to choose. You do not have to accept a credit note instead of a refund and no longer having the packaging is not a reason to refuse you a remedy.

When it comes to making a claim on faulty gifts, proof of purchase is required. This can be a receipt (or photograph of), a credit or debit card statement, a lay-by agreement, a warranty card with details about the purchase or some combination of these which supports your claim.

So long as you can reasonably demonstrate that you or the gift giver purchased an item, a business may be breaking the law if it denies your right to a refund, repair or replacement for an item that fails to meet a consumer guarantee.

But what about those socks from Grandma? If a gift is not your preferred colour, is the wrong size, or you got the same gift twice, it's considered a "change of mind" and is not covered by the ACL. The business does not have to offer you any form of remedy, but if they choose to do so, it is out of their goodwill. For this reason, it is up to the business as to whether they will exchange it, offer a refund or provide store credit.

It's important to know most gift cards and vouchers must have an expiry period of at least three years. This is the law. Gift vouchers are like cash – if you lose one, you can't claim a replacement, so keep cards in a secure place until you are ready to go shopping.

Finally, if a gift failed to turn up in time for Christmas, you may be entitled to a remedy but it is best to contact the retailer to resolve the issue first before lodging a complaint with Consumer Protection.

If issues can't be resolved with the retailer, then lodge a formal complaint on the Consumer Protection website. Enquiries can be made by email consumer@dmirs.wa.gov. au or by calling 1300 30 40 54

Country Stargazing



2024 will bring a 'cosmic treasure trove' of stunning astro events throughout the year. We can look forward to more amazing meteor showers, a special line-up of planets, Super Moons and more!

To bring in the new year, January has two lovely conjunctions to look for, starting with brilliant Venus sitting only 5 degrees from the thin slither of the Moon. The time is 45mins before dawn on the 9th, looking to the east. This is followed by a stunning meeting of the half moon and Jupiter in the evening sky on the 18th.

For constellations, Orion the Hunter is a famous summer constellation and is up in the early evening to see now. First thing in the evening, look directly to the east. The brightest star you'll see is Sirius. Directly to the left of Sirius is what is often referred to as the "Saucepan". The "Saucepan" is part of the Orion constellation. There are three bright stars in a fairly straight line that make up the base of the saucepan and a handle sticks out at the top right.

Orion has been known since ancient times. In Greek mythology, Orion is a hunter. His image is upside down in the southern hemisphere! The three bright stars of the base are Orion's belt, and the handle is his sword.

And how about looking at some galaxies! The Large and Small Magellanic Clouds (sometimes abbreviated to LMC and SMC!) are galaxies outside of our own Milky Way Galaxy and form a stunning spectacle. From Earth, they look like two faint clouds in the southern night sky. We are



super lucky here downunder as they are only seen from the Southern Hemisphere.

The best time to see the Magellanic Clouds is when there's no moonlight. Look to the south from 8.00pm, between 10–15th January.

Pop these dates into your cosmic diary and have a star-filled New Year!
