As of 1 July 2024, non-charities with income tax exemption status will be tested for eligibility every year, including testing if the organisation's purpose fits Division 50 of the ITAA97 (ATO). This meeting proposes necessary amendments to the current Rules (Constitution) for the SBCRC to ensure the new ATO tax changes being implemented as mentioned previously, do not impact the SBCRC's ability to operate effectively.

Our organisation plans to apply to be identified as a registered Charity by the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC).

Digital Commonwealth statutory declarations in myGov Changes to the Statutory Declarations are now in effect and new ways to make a Commonwealth statutory declaration have been introduced. People can now create a Commonwealth statutory declaration in a new end-to-end digital process in myGov, without needing an approved witness.

The new myGov digital statutory declaration uses the Australian Government's Digital ID to verify the identification of the person making the declaration. The new myGov statutory declarations follows changes to statutory declarations that came into effect on January 1 that gave Australians more choice in how they create these important legal documents.

Australians can now complete a Commonwealth statutory declaration in three equally valid and legally effective forms:

- through the myGov platform and myGov ID Digital ID
- digitally using electronic signatures and video-link witnessing
- and the traditional, paper-based method.

Mobile Service Centres have disabled access and customer Wi-Fi to assist in creating myGov accounts and accessing online services. See the below poster for more information.







Jila Kujarra: Two Snakes Dreaming is a cross-cultural collaboration between Warnman artist Desmond Taylor and Boorloo-based textiles practitioner Mariaan Pugh, commissioned by Fremantle Arts Centre in partnership with Martumili Artists.

Taylor and Pugh have worked together to transform Taylor's *Niminjarra* paintings, usually seen on canvas or paper, into highly tactile textile works, animating the important *Niminjarra Jukurrpa* (Dreaming).

Niminjarra is the two brothers transforming into a snake so they can come back home to Ngayartakujarra (Lake Dora). They were in training for ceremony, those two brothers, but they were kept too long, and nobody was there to release them. They waited then they decided to transform into snakes to travel back to where they came from, because their mother was waiting for them.

This is Jukurrpa (Dreaming story).

Located approximately 830 kilometres north of Perth, Shark Bay is a wonderland of world-class natural attractions, the clear turquoise waters are ablaze with multi-coloured sea life and stretching beyond the white sandy beaches are spectacular rust-red sand dunes.

The Shire is seeking a Revenue and Administration Officer to provide financial services including invoicing, accounts receivable, bank reconciliations, and other office tasks as required. A position description can be found on Council's website www.sharkbay.wa.gov.au .

The ideal applicant will need to demonstrate relevant experience in the accounting functions of accounts receivable, and bank reconciliations. 

Are you up to date with your bowel cancer screening?

Cancer Council WA is calling for more West Australians to complete the free lifesaving bowel cancer screening test, with figures showing only four in 10 eligible Australians are participating in Australia's National Bowel Cancer Screening Program.

Bowel cancer is Australia's second biggest cancer killer. Many people don't realise it kills more Australians each year than breast, prostate, or skin cancer.



When you receive the test, don't put it in the cupboard and forget about it delaying can easily become ignoring, forgetting, ultimately not doing.

The test is quick, simple and you can complete it in the comfort of your own home. Over 90 per cent of bowel cancer cases can be successfully treated if caught in the early stages.


But how do you know when?

Use the free SunSmart Global UV App!

The sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation is the major cause of skin cancer. UV cannot be seen or felt and can damage your skin on cool or cloudy days. The sun protection times tell you when UV is forecast to reach 3 and above, that's the time to be SunSmart.

Two sides of the sun

SunSmart relaunches graphic campaign Two sides of the Sun to educate people living in the Midwest/Gascoyne regions that it is UV not hot weather that causes skin damage. When the UV is 3 or above, protect yourself!

Australia has the highest rate of skin cancer in the world, yet it is highly preventable by using sun protection. There were nearly 200 deaths from skin cancer in Western Australia in 2020 and more than 117,000 skin cancer treatments in 2023.

Diagnosis and treatment of skin cancer is estimated to cost the WA health system approximately \$172 million per year. Two sides of the sun was originally launched during the summer of 2021/2022 and the latest phase of this campaign has just been launched and shows us that there are two sides of the sun; a pleasant and nurturing side, and a dangerous side which can lead to skin damage and skin cancer.

campaign hopes motivate people to use multiple protection strategies during outdoor activities when UV levels reach 3 or above. UV not heat causes skin damage and UV can still be high on cool or cloudy days - it is different to heat and can't be felt. Protect your skin in five ways - Slop, Slop, Slap, Seek & Slide.



The campaign will run from February - May 2024 on radio (including digital audio), out-of-home and online channels (including social media and search activity).

Find Skin Cancer Early

Common skin cancer symptoms:

- A new spot or mole on your skin that is red, pale or pearly in colour
- A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores
- Any spots, freckles or any moles changing in size (width), thickness (height), colour, or shape

Get to know your skin and what's normal for you, particularly if you're over 40 years of age. If you notice any of these symptoms or any other unusual changes, tell you doctor without delay.

If it's skin cancer, the earlier it's found, the greater the chance of successful treatment.

SES STATE EMERGENCY SERVICE

A big shout out to everyone who ventured outside in the lead up to ex-tropical cyclone Lincoln and conducted a rain dance because we well and truly needed some fresh rain! Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) reports from the Shark Bay airport documented they only received 5 mil of rain over the cyclone/severe weather watch period with several home gauges in Denham reported to have received 8 - 10 mil of rain. A shame the cyclone didn't have the strength to develop and stablise to give us a little more rain.

As the lead combat agency for cyclone, SES began working with local and regional agencies to prepare and guide our community. Department of Fire & Emergency Services (DFES) meetings in partnershp with the BOM meteorologists meant we were watching the cyclone incredibly closely. All meetings were documented by our team and scribed on our emergency management room boards (as per the picture below) to guide all involved with predications and

conversations. For the vast majority of the cyclone, BOM reported to our team Shark Bay's risks were mostly reported to be;

 if the system was to develop slowly, it would push further west than the issued BOM 2 pm fee 24 0 Core of the Carrette Carr


track maps (increasing Shark Bay's risks)

- possible heavy rainfall which would be experienced mostly on the south/western side of the system with the highest falls concentrated to the centre of the system
- gale force winds with stronger winds located on the eastern side of the system
- storm surge of less than 1m above higest astronomical tide (HAT) predominantly in the eastern gulf. Monkey Mia high tide predictions were 1.81m at 1:18am on the morning of Sunday 25/02/24 so it could have meant a tidal movement of less then 2.81m upon the weather system was passing.

The Shire of Shark Bay team played a huge part in working with our personnel to keep our community informed via



social media and community text messaging, contacting local tourist parks and fielding concerned tourist phone calls, organising our local evacuation centre incase it was activated by the Department of Communities to be opened,



providing sand and manning the bagging station to fill any sand bag requirements as well as monitoring and closing if required local roads and camping areas.

Department of Biodiversity, Conservation & Attractions staff acted on the blue alert and closed National Parks including moving campers out of the Frances Peron National Park as well as the Steep Point area (which was full at the time). They were also able to access valuable statistical data and graphs generated from collegues in America who calculated tidal surge movements based on the cyclone specifications that may impact the Shark Bay area.

Many other agencies were involved, gave their contibutions during Local Emergency Management Committee (LEMC) meetings as well as following their own situation procedures. Thank you all for your contributions as it was a real life training session and practice for us all.

In general the community was incredibly prepared and welcoming to the idea of some rain as was our SES team. What was a stand out for me personally was the efficiency and teamwork of our small local SES team. Everyone turned out and started preparing without being asked;

- organising unit stores (drinks and food)
- sourcing fuel stores and testing emergency equipment
- gathering important local contact information & scribing along with meetings on boards
- organising team meals
- conducting assets and resources lists and much more.

The event and our teamwork impressed one local individual who thrived with the logistical operations of this situation and post event has singed up as our newest

SES volunteer. We couldn't ask for a better outcome!





Consumer Watch

Cash is king... or is it?

"Businesses have to accept legal tender." It's a comment we hear a lot at Consumer Protection, so I wanted to take the opportunity to clear this up and let you know what the law says about it.

Businesses can choose which payment types they accept. It is legal for a business to specify the terms and conditions that they will supply goods and services. This includes whether they will accept cash payment.

However, you must be made aware of these terms and conditions before you make a purchase. This could be a clear sign at the register or door stating the business does not accept cash, or the staff verbally informing you that you can't pay with cash.

We know a lot of people like to pay with cash to avoid credit card surcharges. The good news is there are rules about this too. Card surcharges are permitted under the Australian Consumer Law, however the fee must only reflect what it actually costs the business to process the payment, such as bank fees or terminal costs. If a business charges a payment surcharge, it must be able to prove the costs it is based on.

If there is no other way for you to pay without incurring a surcharge, then the business must include the fee in the total cost. For example, your local café charges \$5 for a coffee, but they do not accept cash, and all card payments are surcharged. Then it is not possible for you to buy that coffee at \$5. If the surcharge is 1% then the price displayed must clearly be \$5.05 so you can easily tell how much your coffee really costs.

While the costs associated with taking card payments is obvious, there are also costs for dealing in cash. Handling cash costs businesses in time and wages.

Remember, purchasing goods or services is entering into an agreement with a seller. You do not have to agree to make the purchase if the payment methods aren't acceptable to you. But, it is legal for the business to refuse to accept cash so long as they have made this clear.

If you believe a business is breaching the rules, it's best to broach it with them first. Should negotiations fail, contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54, or consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au.

Click and wait – who's responsible for delivery issues?

A lot of us love a bit of online shopping. The convenience and fast delivery times are all part of the lure. Online stores

like Temu, Amazon and Shein are great for a bargain but who do you approach to get help when delivery is delayed or even worse... it never arrives?

Based on the complaints Consumer Protection receives, we know a lot of people believe they need to



take delivery issues up with the courier service. But that is not always correct.



The online retailer is responsible. They are the ones who hold the contract with the courier service.

Under Australian Consumer Law (ACL), goods or services must be supplied to consumers within a reasonable amount of time or within a timeframe the retailer has indicated. The law also applies to online retailers here and overseas. However, the law is much harder to enforce internationally, so keep this in mind when doing your online shopping.

The retailer should not be accepting payment for items they cannot supply, or when they know, or should have known, they would not be able to supply the item in a timely way.

If the retailer claims to have posted the item, they are responsible for resolving any issues with the company used to deliver your item, such as Australia Post or the courier.

So how do you fight back when you've been waiting weeks for your item?

In the first instance, contact the retailer and attempt to resolve it with them. If that gets you nowhere consider seeking a charge back on your credit card via your bank or payment provider. This highlights the importance of only paying through secure methods, our advice is to never pay via bank or wire transfer as you cannot get your money back.

If your item arrives damaged, surely that is the courier's fault? It's not. The retailer has an obligation under the ACL to supply a product of acceptable quality.

Depending on the extent of the damage, you may be entitled to a refund, repair or replacement. The retailer should also cover the return postage costs.

Before you return the product to the seller, take a photo of the damage for your own records.

If your complaint involves Australia Post or Star Track you can lodge formal complaint with the Postal Industry Ombudsman.

Four fishers hit with court fines totalling more than \$14,200

In Shark Bay Magistrates Court on Friday (9/2), four men were found guilty of breaching the bag limit for pink snapper and the statewide possession limit for fish fillets after going fishing near the northern end of Dirk Hartog Island in May last year.

Three men from Baldivis aged 59, 54 and 49 and a 28-year-old Waikiki man were each ordered to pay \$3,554.84 for their offences.

They had jointly caught and retained 20 whole pink snapper, which were found when they returned to the Denham boat ramp on the afternoon of 5 May 2023.



When Fisheries and Marine Officers from the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development conducted an inspection, they located the 20 pink snapper, as well as 51.32 kilograms of fish fillets, which were in a freezer in a vehicle belonging to one of the men. The statewide possession limit is 10 kilograms per person and one day's bag limit of whole fish.

Each man was charged with being in possession of more than twice the limit of category one fish and taking more than twice the bag limit of pink snapper. Each fisher had exceeded the daily bag limit by three.

The court heard in a witness impact statement by DPIRD Senior Principal Research Scientist Dr Gary Jackson that pink snapper remained a key 'indicator' species monitored and periodically assessed by DPIRD.

Strict new management arrangements were implemented in 2018 to assist the stock to rebuild. These included a large reduction in the commercial annual catch quota and three-month spawning closure around northern Bernier Island.

The most recent stock assessment in 2022 indicated that while the pink snapper stock is recovering, it is still below the required biomass level.

In addition to the management of commercial fishing in the Gascoyne Coast Bioregion, current management arrangements for recreational fishing include a Recreational Fishing from Boat Licence, the spawning closure around northern Bernier Island (1 June to 31 August each year), daily bag and boat limits, and minimum legal lengths for some key species.

The impact statement also noted that illegal recreational fishing is detrimental to the sustainability of pink snapper and other important demersal stocks in the Gascoyne Coast Bioregion.

DPIRD's Acting Director Regional Compliance for the Midwest and Gascoyne, Ben Doncon said the heavy fines handed down in the case were appropriate and indicated the seriousness of the fishing offences.

"Pink snapper is one of the most important species in the Gascoyne Coast Demersal Scalefish Resource that supports commercial and recreational fishing activities between Kalbarri and Exmouth," Mr Doncon said.

The 'Morning Star' Meets Saturn!

Early morning risers in March will be treated to an impressive display as the planets come together for a cosmic dance! On the 9th March, a beautiful view of the Moon, appearing as a thin slither, and Venus, are just a few degrees apart on the eastern horizon. Joining them is Mars, appearing as a red star-like object above the pair. You'll have to be up early in the morning to catch it though!

Keep watching...on following mornings, you'll see Venus appear to move further away from Mars and head towards Saturn. By the 22nd, Venus and Saturn will be just a half a degree apart!

When and where to look: 5am, from 9th March and very low to the eastern horizon. Use the image to the left as your early morning

Why Does the Date for Easter Change Every Year?

Did you know the equinox is central to the changing date of Easter each year? The date of Easter changes because it is based on the lunar calendar. Easter falls on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the March equinox. This year the March equinox falls on 20th March. The first full moon after the March Equinox is on 25th March which means Easter Sunday is on 31st March.

The New Recruit

Early in 1940, there were about one thousand new recruits billeted on the Claremont Showgrounds. Mess gear and some uniforms had been issued, but not much else. One day I was ordered to act as a guard for the paymaster when he held pay parade. I was issued with a rifle and bayonet. It looked like a relic from some long past war. The bloody thing was as tall as me! It was a joke! Here was this kid with an oversized rifle and a hat that kept falling down over his eyes, protecting the paymaster and his cashbox, while a lot of sixfoot, tough miners and bushmen filed past. They all saw the humour of it and one bloke caused me some embarrassment when he impaled an apple on the bayonet. One hot afternoon, about sixty years ago, a few of us were enjoying a quite beer in Jack Clarke's Yalgoo Pub. During the course of conversation, Les the barmon mentioned that Charlie, a local identity, had been put on the "dog act". In those days, a person who's drinking was deemed to be harmful to them could be put on a prohibited list, commonly referred to as the Dog Act. Their names were posted up in licensed premises.

Just as we were discussing this bit of news, a wild eyed figure, shot in the door, brandishing a plug of gelignite, complete with spitting fuse. He informed us that as he could not get a drink, he was going to blow the bloody pub up. This resulted in a unanimous decision to vacate the premises quite rapidly. We all retired to the other side of the road to await the expected explosion. When



nothing happened, after a reasonable time, we cautiously approached and peered in a window. What we saw was Charlie just finishing off the last of the drinks so hastily abandoned on the bar. It seemed that his bomb was a hoax, there was no detonator.

The next problem was that a count of heads revealed that Les was missing. During a moment of quiet, sounds of distress could be heard coming from the cellar, which was under the barroom. Investigation revealed that Les, finding himself at the rear of the crowd trying to leave by the door, had lifted the cellar trapdoor and jumped down. Trouble was, when he landed, he broke his leg! We rescued him and carted him off to the cottage hospital, then woke Jack, from his afternoon siesta, to take over the bar.

Apart from Les's leg and Jack's disturbed rest. there were no serious consequences, the whole business was regarded as quite funny. Things like that did happen in those days.
