Executive Officer's Report





Reducing financial red tape for associations

The Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safey Consumer Protection recently released the Associations Newsletter (Issue 31) and advised financial reporting thresholds for community groups, associations etc will be increased under new regulations aimed at reducing the burden on WA's incorporated associations.

The revenue bands will be increased as follows:

- Tier 1 currently less than \$250,000, will become less than \$500,000.
- Tier 2 currently \$250,000 to \$1 million, will become \$500.000 to \$3 million.
- Tier 3 currently more than \$1 million, will become more than \$3 million.

This proposed change is part of the State Government's commitment to red tape reduction and sees the thresholds become consistent nationally.

The current three-tier system of reporting is based on the association's revenue. It is designed to minimise the obligations on small associations, while ensuring larger associations are accountable to their members for their financial management. The new regulations, currently being drafted by Consumer Protection, will bring WA in line with the national reporting requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC), providing simplicity, clarity and consistency.

Tackling Indigenous Smoking (TIS) program

The Tackling Indigenous Smoking (TIS) program aims to improve the health of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people by reducing the prevalence of tobacco use through health promotion activities.

Kate the Health Promotion Practitioner and Tackling Indigenous Smoking Project Officer at GRAMS - Geraldton is offering their TIS services to work with organisations to review and/or develop smoke free polices and provide smoking education and cessation support resources to your team.

There are legal obligations in relation to workplaces and smoking with which compliance is critical to avoid prosecution. However, there are more benefits to a comprehensive smoke-free policy than avoiding legal action from workers.

A smoke-free policy encompassing all indoor, outdoor, garden areas and carparks creates a healthy work environment by substantially reducing the risk of exposure to second-hand smoke. A policy that is supportive and non-discriminatory can create a space where smokers feel supported to quit.

Creating a smoke-free workplace could benefit your organisation and community members in the following ways:

- Decrease employee absenteeism
- Increase work productivity

- Increase staff morale
- Improve health of employees
- Decrease early retirement due to ill-health
- Lower annual healthcare costs
- Lower risk of fire damage, explosions and other smoking-related accidents
- Lower cleaning and maintenance costs
- Reduce risk of worker's compensation claims from passive smoking
- Enhance corporate image
- Reinforce your organisation's commitment to a healthy workplace
- Raise awareness of the health risks of smoking and encourage employees to cut down, quit or manage their smoking

GRAMS is keen to work in consultation with teams to update or develop your smoke free policies to protect both the health of staff, clients and community members.

Safety Equipment

Our office assists Fisheries by providing information (stickers, brochures, tide charts, access to fishing and government websites and fishing licenses) as well as marine safety equipment including off shore flares and now also personal floating device lifejackets (including self inflating jackets).

Congratulations Shark Bay!

As mentioned in the previous report, Denham was crowned the Tiny Tourism Town (population below 1,500) in the GWN7 Top Tourism Awards, which are administered by Tourism Council of WA. The awards recognise and reward towns that demonstrate a strong commitment to encouraging tourism and increasing visitation to their area.


The nomination for Denham was prepared and submitted by dedicated staff at the Shark Bay World Heritage Discovery and Visitor Centre, whose efforts are to be commended, as the application included; an editorial article of 800 words on why visitors should visit Denham and the experiences available, also a short video featuring key attractions and shown to judges and the audience, plus a potential itinerary for the target market.

Councillor Vankova, Deputy President, attended the conference and accepted the award on behalf of the Shire. As the winner of our category, the Shire will receive a \$5,000 advertising prize package from GWN7 an on-air acknowledgement, an electronic logo and framed certificate. The Discovery Centre Coordinator will develop a television advertisement which will showcase the Bay and appear on GWN7 later this year.

Grant Funding

In addition to the funding from Horizon Power announced in June's IP report, the Shire has secured a further \$20,000 from Lotterywest to assist with an inaugural Beats in the Bay Festival, which it is hoped will become an annual event on our calendar.

Below are just some of the grant funded local road and community infrastructure projects that Shire staff are



currently undertaking;

- Dual use pathway Stella Rowley Drive to the lookout plus adjacent to Town Hall
- Installation of an additional gazebo and signage at Little Lagoon Creek
- Purchase and installation of hard shade structures at the foreshore adventure park
- · Installation of additional solar street lighting
- Creation of accessible for all access at the Recreational Centre and installation of an automatic door for the Town Library, plus expansion of electronic locks to Rec Centre and Town Hall.
- New reticulation and resurfaced lawn areas at Town Oval and Foreshore

nbn Sky Muster Plus satellite service now offers more data

People connected to nbn Sky Muster Plus satellite service can now access video streaming for

16 hours a day - between 12am (midnight) and 4pm and use Virtual Private Networks (VPN) without it counting toward their monthly data allowance.

This means between the hours of 4pm and 12 am midnight, only video streaming and VPN use will count towards a user's monthly data allowance.

Activities like online shopping, internet banking, sending and receiving emails, audio streaming, video calling, and Wi-Fi calling will NOT count towards a user's monthly data allowance for the full 24 hours.

This is a major improvement for customers and responds to their calls for more data, plus it comes at no extra wholesale cost.

For existing nbn Sky Muster Plus users, the changes will automatically be applied.

New customers and existing nbn Sky Muster customers can enquire about upgrading to nbn Sky Muster Plus by calling their preferred internet service provider.



We like everyone else however are extremely disappointing with the actions taken by a few who seen fit to damage a vehicle later in the evening at the event. This brings me to a point that we have raised many times in the past, and certainly I am sure some have heard me speak about many times to them and others. Please, secure your property by locking your doors, do not leave personal items out on view and lock your vehicles along with not leaving things on display. Over the holidays we had a number of items stolen from around town along with other tasks involving properties around town. These incidents do not only occur during holidays they are only increased due to the higher number of people in town. It is worthwhile remembering that we have a large number of short term rentals in town, this means that people who visit our town do not only stay at the caravan parks and other accommodation along the front. They are vacationing in homes all over town and by not securing your property and leaving things out the front. You are trusting that everyone who passes by are like you and would never take from another. Unfortunately that is not the case and we ask that you make it harder for crooks by not leaving things on show and securing your property.

Over the course of last month we have charged four people with drink driving, now that number may not seem high but for a town this size with our population I can assure you it

is high. Now if you ask me a single person charged is one too many, and as police officers we have heard all the excuses and old wives' tales about one drink an hour and having some food before etc. The truth is that the only way to ensure you do



not put your life and everyone else on the roads life at risk. Is if you are driving do not drink alcohol, that is the only way to ensure you are not going to be over the limit. We often have people question us as to why we conduct RBTs early in the morning believing that no one would be intoxicated that early. REC Centre Contract renewal:

The Shark Bay Community Resource Centre (SBCRC) has approached the Shire of Shark Bay to continue with the management contract of the Shark Bay Recreation Centre into the future.

The SBCRC has been successfully managing the opening of the Recreation Centre on behalf of the Shire since February 2013. During our tenure, the SBCRC has engaged with 48,336 people at the facility. With the impacts of COVID over the past years since 2020, the hours were effected although it is evident through the total hours that SBCRC staff and volunteers have endeavoured to keep the community engaged in various activities where possible and within any Government guidelines. Total hours in 2020 – 2021 (June) = 614.5 hrs and 2021 – 2022 (June) = 831.5 hrs.

Afterschool Sports Sessions

Afterschool sports sessions continue on Monday and Wednesday afternoons with Tianna or one of our other casual staff. Fisheries WA

Fisheries and Marine Officers from the Northern, Gascoyne and Midwest regions combined for a targeted compliance operation in popular Ningaloo Marine Park recently.

During Operation Greyby, our officers uncovered 28 recreational, and two commercial fishing offences from land and water-based patrols.

They used Patrol Vessel Houtman, three smaller boats, plus vehicles including quad bikes, which gave the operation flexibility to suit conditions and fishing activity.

Feedback from land patrols was positive, with no offences detected and people travelling with their catch showing that they were aware and supportive of the rules that help keep fishing sustainable.

Most of the illegal activity encountered was out on the water, including 13 offences of fishing in a sanctuary zone and three people detected spearfishing for a prohibited species.

There has been a significant increase in non-compliance since 2020 due to extra fishing pressure in the region, with more offences picked up this year than at the same time last year.





Marine Rescue Shark Bay

Marine Rescue Shark Bay's Tamala Rose replacement subcommittee has completed their Request for Quote tender documents. These have been sent out to the 5 boat builders who are contracted by DFES to supply rigid hull inflatable boats to the States rescue groups. Tenders are to be returned by the 3rd of August and the contract will be awarded after the final review process has been completed.

The committee has decided upon a 12 metre vessel with a full walkaround cabin powered by triple 300hp OXE diesel outboards. Diesel outboards were preferred so that the vessel could be refueled using the bowser at the commercial jetty, which would save many volunteer hours.

Diesel outboards are a relatively new technology, but they have several benefits over the petrol alternative. Fuel consumption is substantially less which gives the vessel much greater range. Maintenance intervals are out to 200 hours which is double that required by petrol outboards. These two factors add up to a significant cost saving over the operational life of the motors. Currently these motors are priced at about \$100,000 each which may put them beyond the budget allocation and a petrol alternative will





Living with History

A Desert Mystery

The death of two men on the Talawanna track reminds me of an experience I had in that area in the late fifties. Our main roads camp was situated between Ethel Creek and Mundiwindi. I received word from Head Office in Carnarvon that the owner of Talawanna Station, who evidently knew people in high places, wanted a road suitable for road trains built into his property in order to truck cattle.

I had never heard of Talawanna and had no idea where it was in the world. The PMG linesman at Mundiwindi said he had a rough idea where it was and the description of the area was not at all encouraging.

In those days main roads foremen were permitted to own their own work utes for which we were paid mileage and I had just bought a new Holden ute.

I decided to take Geoff, the grader driver, with me and so we loaded up our swags, tucker box and plenty of extra fuel and water without which you never travelled in that country. Our final stop was at Wolgan Station owned by a tough old character named Joe. Joe insisted we stop for a meal and a yarn. After awhile Joe said he had something to show us. He conducted us to a pen made of heavy logs about four feet high. As we neared the pen, the biggest pig I had ever seen reared up and put his front feet on the top log. Joe said the monster ate a full kangaroo carcass every day. I quite believed him. If that pig ever got out I did not want to be anywhere in the area.

After a few directions from Joe we left on a rough track heading East. Our next stop was at Billinooka. This was another outback property owned by Bill, a humorous old bushman. Bill's homestead was built completely of bush timber. Living quarters, kitchen, harness room and smithy were all under the one roof. Sundry chooks and dogs also resided there. Bill's staff, an elderly aboriginal couple, had their own dwelling a short distance away.

As it was getting late we decided to stay the night. After a meal of corned beef, which Bill happily informed us, came from one of his neighbour's bullocks, we settled down for a yarn. On hearing the object of our trip Bill was a bit dubious. He said as far as he knew the bloke who had Talawanna had no cattle. He said there was a well and a rough bush shed there, which the man used as base for his prospecting trips out into the desert. He had been known to speak of a huge copper deposit he had found. This whole business was starting to sound a bit suspect. It looked like we might be getting conned into building a road to transport mining equipment.

We left Bill early next morning and headed further east. The track got worse and encroaching bushes were doing horrible things to the paintwork of my new ute. About midday we got bogged in a wide, sandy creek and had to let the tyres down to get out. Then we had to pump them up by hand. No free air out there! Late that afternoon we reached our destination. It was as Bill had described it except there was noone there.

There was a fairly new windmill on the well and the tank and trough were full. There was no sign of anyone being there lately. From some harness in the shed I got the idea that this bloke used camels, so he must be an experienced desert traveller. We camped there overnight and began the return trip the next day.



After spending a couple of hours in the sandy creek we arrived back at Bill's place. It was not late but as we had a couple of punctures to mend I decided to stay there the night. After tea I got Bill talking. He had been in the area most of his life and was a mine of information. In his younger days he had made several trips out into the desert and was quite confident that there were mineral deposits out there waiting to be found. He was also adamant that it was no place for the inexperienced. In his own words, "That country was a killer. If you mess up you don't get another chance."

The next day we stopped at Wolgan for a meal and a yarn with Joe. I did not visit the pig! We arrived back at camp that night. In those four days I saw some very interesting country and met a couple of very decent old bush battlers. I wrote a report and sent it to Carnarvon and that was the last I heard of it. It is interesting to note the rich gold deposit at Telfer was found in that country. Some of the old timers up there even maintain that it is the one that Lassiter was searching for when he died out there.
